As currently proposed, LD 40 land the principles set forward therein, would significantly impact the ability of Maine's solid waste industry to accept out-of-state waste for recycling and eliminate recycling credits for CDD residuals (fines) used beneficially at landfills for ADC and/or shaping and grading.
