5 6 7 8 9 10 11	The absolute immunity provided by paragraph C shall be is applicable whenever a discretionary act is reasonably encompassed by the duties of the governmental employee in question, regardless of whether the exercise of discretion is specifically authorized by statute, charter, ordinance, order, resolution, rule or resolve, and shall must be available to all governmental employees, including police officers and governmental employees involved in child welfare cases, who are required to exercise judgment or discretion in performing their official duties.

28 29 30 31 32	This amendment makes clear the intent of the bill, which is to eliminate the qualified immunity available under the Maine Civil Rights Act as well as the statutory absolute immunity under the Maine Tort Claims Act for state police officers, marine patrol officers, game wardens, Capitol Police officers, deputies, sheriffs, constables and police officers appointed by municipal officers.

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
