An Act to Implement the Recommendations of the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's Report on Boater Safety Education

1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2 3	Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §13001, sub-§6-B, as enacted by PL 2021, c. 656, §2, is amended to read:
4 5 6 7	6-B. Boater safety and education course certificate. "Boater safety and education course certificate" means a certificate or other evidence of completion of a boater safety and education course or an equivalency exam specified or approved by the commissioner pursuant to section 13052, subsection 2.
8	Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §13001, sub-§24-A is enacted to read:
9 10 11 12	24-A. Recreational boating. "Recreational boating" means operating a motorboat primarily for the operator's pleasure or leasing, renting or chartering a motorboat to another person for the other person's pleasure. "Recreational boating" does not include using a motorboat engaged in the carriage of passengers for hire.

SUMMARY

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This bill proposes statutory changes based on recommendations included in the report made by the stakeholder group on issues related to boater safety and education on inland waters of the State to the Joint Standing Committee on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife pursuant to Public Law 2021, chapter 656. The committee has not taken a position on the substance of this bill. By reporting this bill out, the committee is not suggesting and does not intend to suggest that it agrees or disagrees with any aspect of this bill. The committee is reporting the bill out for the sole purpose of having a bill printed that can be referred to the committee for an appropriate public hearing and subsequent processing in the normal course. The committee is taking this action to ensure clarity and transparency in the legislative review of the proposals contained in the bill.

The bill implements recommendations of the stakeholder group by:

- 1. Defining recreational boating as being primarily used for pleasure and excluding from that definition the use of motorboats carrying passengers for hire;
- 2. Applying the boater safety and education course requirement for inland waters to territorial waters defined by the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 6001; and
- 3. Adding exemptions to the requirement of a boater safety and education course to possessors of valid or expired United States merchant marine licensure documents, persons test driving a motorboat as part of a possible purchase, persons renting a motorboat who have completed a temporary boater safety course and noncitizens who arrive by sea and are temporarily using Maine's territorial waters.
