Resolved: That an advisory council is created to oversee a review and technical revision of the Maine Criminal Code and other statutes establishing criminal offenses. The advisory council shall select and enter into a contract with an outside consultant under section 2 to conduct the review. The advisory council shall review the report of the outside consultant, consult with the Criminal Law Advisory Commission, established pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 12004-I, subsection 52, and make recommendations to the Legislature. The advisory council consists of the following 5 members:			
26 27	1. A person who is a prosecuting attorney licensed in the State, appointed by the President of the Senate upon the recommendation of the Maine Prosecutors' Association;

of the advisory council.

A majority of the advisory council must be present to conduct business, but all votes and other approvals of advisory council actions require the consensus of all 5 members.

7 Sec. 2. Outside consultant; review. Resolved: That the Attorney General shall 8 issue a request for proposals seeking an outside consultant who is a licensed attorney in the 9 State with experience and expertise in criminal law and statutory construction to conduct a review of the Maine Criminal Code and other statutes establishing criminal offenses. 10 Submitted proposals must include a list of staff required to perform the proposed work on 11 behalf of the advisory council under section 1. The advisory council shall assist the 12 Attorney General in drafting the request for proposals and shall interview the applicants 13 and select the outside consultant from the group of applicants. The outside consultant shall 14 conduct a review of the Maine Criminal Code and other crimes established in the Maine 15 Revised Statutes to identify unused and obsolete provisions, clarify confusing language, 16 eliminate inconsistencies, consolidate or eliminate redundant provisions and reorganize or 17 restructure the Maine Criminal Code and other statutes establishing criminal offenses. The 18 advisory council shall review the report of the outside consultant and develop 19 20 recommendations.

- Sec. 3. Departments and agencies. Resolved: That a department or agency of
 the State may make recommendations to the advisory council under section 1 concerning
 a crime under the jurisdiction of the department or agency.
- Sec. 4. Report. Resolved: That, by February 1, 2026, the advisory council under section 1 shall submit a report based upon the review under this resolve and any recommended legislation to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over criminal justice and public safety matters, which may report out legislation to the 132nd Legislature in 2026.

40 2. It narrows the scope of the advisory council's and outside consultant's duties to a 41 technical review of the Maine Criminal Code and statutes establishing criminal offenses.

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1 This technical review involves identifying unused and obsolete provisions, clarifying 2 confusing language, eliminating inconsistencies, consolidating or eliminating redundant 3 provisions and reorganizing or restructuring as necessary.

4 3. It changes provisions concerning advisory council membership in the following ways: adding that the prosecuting attorney on the advisory council is licensed in the State 5 and recommended by the Maine Prosecutors' Association; adding that the defense attorney 6 on the advisory council is licensed in the State and recommended by the Maine 7 Commission on Indigent Legal Services; removing a representative of a statewide 8 organization with a mission of advancing civil liberties; removing a member of the public; 9 adding that the legal educator must have expertise in Maine criminal law and be 10 recommended by the dean of the University of Maine School of Law; removing a 11 representative of a statewide organization with a mission of advancing racial justice; and 12 13 adding the Attorney General or the Attorney General's designee, who serves as chair of the 14 advisory council.

4. It stipulates that a majority of advisory council members must be present to conduct
council business and that all votes and other approvals of advisory council actions require
the consensus of all 5 members.

18 5. It changes the reporting deadline from November 6, 2024 to February 1, 2026.
