1 SUMMARY

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This amendment is the majority report of the committee. It replaces the bill, which is a concept draft. It requires the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of General Services to inventory all state-owned buildings where state employees perform job duties to determine the presence of asbestos, lead, black mold or other substances that may be harmful to human health. It requires property owners of buildings leased to the State to conduct a similar inventory and report the results to the bureau. The amendment requires the bureau to establish and maintain a database containing the results of the inventories and make the database easily accessible electronically to employee collective bargaining agents, employees working in state office buildings with asbestos, lead, black mold or other substances that may be harmful to human health, individuals who perform maintenance, repair or custodial services, firefighters, the Department of Labor, the Department of Health and Human Services, Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention and members of the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over state and local government matters. It requires the database to be consulted before maintenance of or repair to a state-owned building by a state employee and the provision of protective gear to the employee if appropriate. The department is required to submit a biennial report and may adopt rules to implement these requirements.

The amendment also provides funding for personnel in the bureau to carry out the requirements of this legislation.
