An Act to Improve the Fairness of Adaptive Management Study Moose Hunt Permits by Exempting Those Permittees from the 4year Limitation on Receiving Another Permit

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- **Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §11154, sub-§5,** as repealed and replaced by PL 2017, c. 427, §14 and affected by §19, is amended to read:
- **5. Eligibility.** Except as provided in this subsection, a resident or nonresident who is eligible to obtain a Maine hunting license or who will be eligible to obtain a Maine hunting license by the opening day of the open moose season is eligible to apply for a moose hunting permit. A person who has obtained a moose hunting permit is ineligible to obtain another permit until the 4th calendar year after the issuance of the last permit. This limitation does not apply to subpermittees under subsection 7 or to permittees who received a permit for a moose hunt between 2019 and 2025 as part of an adaptive management study relating to population density and winter ticks and were unsuccessful. A person under 10 years of age on the opening day of the open moose season is eligible to apply for a moose hunting permit and may accrue points under subsection 8 but is ineligible to receive a moose hunting permit.

15 SUMMARY

This bill exempts permittees who received a permit for an adaptive management study moose hunt between 2019 and 2025 and were unsuccessful from the requirement that a person who receives a moose hunting permit is ineligible to obtain another permit for 4 years.
