11 12	Amend the bill by striking out all of the emergency preamble and inserting the following:
13 14	'Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
15 16	Whereas, the federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Public Law 117-2, establishes the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund; and
17 18 19 20 21	Whereas, the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund will be used to provide funds to the State to respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency and to its negative economic effects, including by providing assistance to households and small and nonprofit businesses, aid to affected industries, such as the tourism, travel and hospitality industries, and assistance to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 pandemic; and
22 23 24	Whereas, Maine's nation-leading COVID-19 vaccination rate is helping Maine turn the corner on this pandemic but it is crucial to support employers in getting through this difficult time; and
25 26 27 28 29	Whereas, the economic disruption of the COVID-19 pandemic has made investment in Maine's heritage industries, farming, fishing and forest products, urgent to stabilize these core economic engines of Maine's rural areas. By investing in these industries, the State can help these key economic sectors recover, develop new products and market opportunities and sustain important, good-paying jobs across the State; and
30 31 32 33 34 35	Whereas, health insurance premiums, already a significant expense for small businesses in Maine, worsened during the COVID-19 pandemic. From March 2017 to March 2020, insurance premiums in the small group market in Maine rose by nearly 33%, while enrollment declined by 18%, from 61,200 to 50,200. This Act provides small businesses short-term relief from rising health insurance premiums as those businesses recover from the pandemic; and

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1 **Whereas,** Maine's investment in research and development, a key driver of economic 2 growth, has ranked among the lowest in the nation. The funds in this Act are necessary to 3 overcome that ranking by making strategic investments in forward-looking industries and 4 economic opportunities in emerging industries to grow the economy; and

5 Whereas, the health care industry employs more workers than any other job sector in 6 this State but critical health care worker shortages that existed in this State prior to the pandemic have been exacerbated by the pandemic. These shortages limit access to quality 7 8 care, particularly in behavioral health and long-term care; increase costs; and affect Maine's 9 ability to attract talented workers since quality health care is often a priority for relocation. The funds provided in this Act will expand industry partnerships, build career ladders, 10 promote and encourage opportunities in rural health care settings and support 11 diversification of the workforce; and 12

Whereas, although clean energy jobs are the fastest-growing job sector in the country, Maine lags other New England states in its number of clean energy jobs per capita and Maine's overall shortage of skilled workers is an obstacle to filling these jobs. The clean energy partnership established in this Act supports clean energy and energy efficiency job growth through workforce development programs developed in partnership with industry and education leaders; and

Whereas, Maine is 17th in the nation for demand satisfied by imports, and many small businesses lack the necessary resources to expand their customer bases, and this situation was exacerbated by the disruption caused by the pandemic. This Act establishes a domestic trade pilot program to provide small to medium-sized businesses in this State support to identify and access new markets by providing market data, marketing support and consulting services; and

Whereas, with Maine as just one of 10 locations in the United States to successfully attract new residents to live and work remotely during the pandemic, funding is necessary to further strengthen the attraction and integration of remote workers into Maine communities and is an economic growth opportunity; and

Whereas, the need for critical infrastructure improvements, such as upgrades to water treatment plants, storage reservoirs and pipe distribution systems, exceeds the State's current funding capacity. Funds provided by this Act will address a significant backlog of drinking water projects and help municipalities leverage further federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 funds; and

Whereas, despite the appeal of state parks, as evidenced by the 3,000,000 visitors in 2020 and 63% increase in campground reservations this year, park infrastructure is outdated, lacking funding to be properly maintained and, in some cases, unsafe. The pandemic highlighted the inadequacy of plumbing and sanitation facilities and the need for structural repairs to park roads, bridges, shelters and staff housing. Funds provided by this Act will address capital maintenance and improvement needs and represent the first meaningful investment in state parks in more than a decade; and

41 **Whereas,** in order to allow commercial fishing and aquaculture industries to recover 42 from the market disruptions and economic challenges of the pandemic, this Act provides 43 the Department of Marine Resources funding to fulfill the department's industry and 44 management mandates, including upgrading equipment to support public health monitoring

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1 as it pertains to shellfish and water quality, with the goal of maximizing harvest 2 opportunities in both the aquaculture and wild shellfish sectors and increasing investment 3 in and providing urgently needed one-time funds to support these important sectors of the 4 economy; and

5 **Whereas,** in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within 6 the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as 7 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 8 therefore,'

As a condition of awarding \$20,000,000 of the funds allocated in this Part to the Maine State Housing 12 Authority for existing financing programs to a developer to expand affordable housing 13 14 options, the Maine State Housing Authority shall require that developer to enter into a pre-15 hire, collectively bargained project labor agreement with the workers who will build the affordable housing. A project labor agreement must apply to all workers who build the 16 affordable housing, including those employed by a contractor and all subcontractors of the 17 developer. A project labor agreement must protect the collective bargaining rights of the 18 workers involved in building the affordable housing. 19

20 Requirement to make good faith effort to promote workforce diversity; 2. 21 authority to refuse to award contract based on failure to make good faith effort. A contractor, subcontractor, firm, corporation, partnership or any other entity working on 22 housing built using funds awarded through a financing program using \$20,000,000 of the 23 24 funds allocated to the Maine State Housing Authority in this Part shall make, at all times, 25 a good faith effort to promote workforce diversity, including diversity with regard to race and gender. If the authority determines that a contractor, subcontractor, firm, corporation, 26 27 partnership or other entity is not making a good faith effort to achieve workforce diversity, 28 the authority may refuse to award that entity a contract for any project funded using 29 allocations provided in this Part for a period of 2 years.

30 3. Rules. The authority shall adopt rules to implement this section. Rules adopted
 31 pursuant to this subsection are routine technical rules as defined in the Maine Revised
 32 Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

This sector-focused initiative will establish clear training pathways for clean energy careers, support internships and apprenticeship programs and create an online platform for attracting workers, sharing training opportunities and highlighting job opportunities. The partnership will also target investments to encourage innovative clean energy companies in Maine through the Maine Technology Institute.

14 This Part establishes a domestic trade pilot program to provide small to medium-sized businesses in Maine support to identify and access new markets by providing market data, 15 marketing support and consulting services. 16

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18 This Part provides funding to support worker attraction and relocation programs that encourage long-term residency in Maine, which are important to help solve economic and 19 workforce challenges that have increased in urgency due to an evolving and unaffordable 20 housing market, tourism and other businesses seeking to recover and a shortage of available 21 22 workers.

This Part provides funding to expand the Maine career exploration program, part of the State's 10-year economic strategy. To help students explore career opportunities geared to their interests, the program will provide students one paid internship between their junior year of high school and one year after graduation. To provide accessible and affordable education and training for working adults, the program will also offer incentives and assistance to workers and employers to access training and skills development opportunities.

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This Part provides funds to support outreach to potential remote workers and their employers; grants for communities to welcome and integrate remote workers and their families; and funding for collaborative workspaces to help remote workers engage in local communities and economies. This Part will also allow an expansion of the Working Communities Challenge in partnership with Federal Reserve Bank of Boston.

38 This Part provides funding to meet workforce development needs in emerging economic sectors, in alignment with the 10-year economic development strategy. These 39 funds will support infrastructure and equipment upgrades for Maine's career and technical 40 41 education centers that advance programs and curricula for high school students, new University of Maine System and Maine Community College System targeted workforce 42 programs and competitive grants available to all higher education institutions in Maine. 43

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PART O This Part provides funding to promote diversity, equity and inclusion in Maine's workforce. These funds will support engagement with Maine's racial and ethnic communities, tribal communities, the State's Permanent Commission on the Status of Racial, Indigenous and Maine Tribal Populations and other underrepresented and marginalized communities to reduce economic and employment barriers and advance opportunity for Maine people of diverse backgrounds, cultures, races, genders and religions.

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#### PART P

This Part provides funding to help the State's 10-year economic strategy move forward by enhancing coordination efforts in the labor market. There are gaps between the types of skills needed and existing and available workers and communication gaps for workers to match with available jobs. This Part offers an opportunity to build new infrastructure and start pilot programs to support skill advancement and outreach and build the bridge that connects workers to open opportunities, establish services for emerging industries, expand supports for employers and workers and enhance program outreach and evaluation.

PART Q

PART R

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18 This Part provides funds to support making licensing easier and faster for businesses 19 and more transparent and accessible to the public through the launch of an online licensing 20 system for environmental and other state licenses. This Part is intended to result in a 21 contract with a software company for the licensing system, to put funds into the economy 22 quickly and multiply it through savings for businesses and the State.

24 This Part provides \$50,000,000 to the Maine State Housing Authority to expand housing options that are affordable to workers and their families to own or rent, through 25 26 existing financing programs through the authority. These funds may also be used to provide planning and technical assistance for communities, developers and builders to 27 28 encourage construction or production of affordable, energy-efficient housing units close to services and employment centers to support individuals, families and state workforce 29 needs. This Part requires the authority to require the execution of a project labor agreement 30 31 by any entity engaging in the construction of housing units for which the authority provides 32 funds from \$20,000,000 of the \$50,000,000 allocated for the expansion of existing 33 financing programs. To the Department of Education for grants to school administrative units to establish new or expanded public prekindergarten programs to increase the number of children accessing high-quality prekindergarten with priority given to programs that engage in community partnerships, provide longer duration of education, support inclusive programming and enroll socioeconomically disadvantaged students;

6. On a one-time basis, to the Department of Transportation for the municipal, regional
 and state infrastructure adaptation improvements that support public safety and emergency
 management and infrastructure resiliency;

7. For support of initiatives or competitive grants for local, regional or state workforce
 transportation pilot projects aimed at connecting workers to employment opportunities,
 especially in rural Maine areas where transportation options are limited, thereby promoting
 economic security, workforce development and community benefits. This funding can be

Additionally, this Part provides \$3,000,000 for the Small Community Grant Program, which supports septic repair and replacement projects, 36 supporting water quality and public health for communities, water bodies and fisheries. 37

- 38 PART T
  39 This Part provides funds to address \$50,000,000 in capital maintenance and
  40 improvement needs at state parks for park infrastructure that is outdated, lacking funding
  41 to be properly maintained and, in some cases, unsafe.
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PART U

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This Part provides funding to support the replacement of antiquated infrastructure at the 88-year-old New Gloucester fish hatchery, create needed capacity at Grand Lake Stream hatchery to manage fish disease threats and conserve an endemic population of landlocked Atlantic salmon and improve the quality of hatchery effluent at all 8 fish culture facilities, which will improve protections to receiving waters.

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#### PART V

This Part, in order to allow commercial fishing and aquaculture industries to recover from the market disruptions and economic challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, provides the Department of Marine Resources funds to fulfill the department's industry and management mandates. These funds will upgrade equipment to support public health monitoring as it pertains to shellfish and water quality with the goal of maximizing harvest opportunities in both the aquaculture and wild shellfish sectors.

#### PART W

14 This Part provides funds to establish a matching grant program to support electricity 15 grid upgrades that will reduce barriers for economic development by new or struggling 16 businesses, especially those in heritage industries in rural areas of the State.

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#### PART X

18 This Part provides funding to address the need for accessible, safe and efficient state 19 government services and programs, especially those that can be managed online or through 20 remote programs. This Part provides funds for targeted upgrades to make state systems 21 more user-friendly and for the cybersecurity needed to ensure safe state operations. These 22 funds will also be used for required heating, ventilation and efficiency upgrades to promote 23 healthy working environments and long-term operational savings.

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#### PART Y

This Part provides funds for financial oversight of federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 funds, including state discretionary and direct funds, as well local pass-through funds. Oversight includes coordination, processing, tracking, reporting, reconciling, compliance, auditing and program guidance monitoring and summarizing. In order to meet federal requirements, significant reporting is needed, as well as consistent, transparent updates for the Legislature and Maine citizens. These funds may be used for limited-period positions, project management, contractors and consultant support.

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PART Z

This Part allows the adjustment of allocations made by this Act but only within the same department or agency that received the original allocation or, if for the same purpose as the original allocation, between departments or agencies during fiscal year 2021-22 and only on the recommendation of the State Budget Officer and approval of the Governor. The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services is required to report these adjustments at least quarterly to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs.

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41 This Part reinstates the State's property tax deferral program, which was in effect for 42 applications filed before April 1, 1991, with the following modifications.

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PART AA

1 1. Households with at least one individual who is 65 years of age or older or who is 2 unable to continue employment due to disability and surviving spouses who are unable to 3 continue employment due to disability are included.

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2. The maximum income level is changed from \$32,000 to \$40,000.

3. The rate of accrual of interest on payments advanced to a municipality on taxdeferred property is changed from 6% to the standard rate of interest assessed by the State for nonpayment of taxes, reduced by one percentage point.

8 4. A maximum liquid asset standard for eligibility of property owners is added as well
9 as the exclusion of property from eligibility if that property is subject to deferral under both
10 the state deferral program and a municipal deferral program.

5. The administration of the deferral of property taxes for seniors and certain persons with disabilities, including expanding the types of guardians to include an agent under a power of attorney or pursuant to a protective arrangement or any other lawful order, is facilitated.

6. In the event that there are not sufficient funds to pay for the property tax deferral program, transfers from the Housing Opportunities for Maine Fund are required; repayment of those funds is also required as soon as there are sufficient funds available to make that reimbursement.

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### PART BB

20 This Part requires the Department of Health and Human Services to waive fees incurred 21 in connection with the testing of private residential water supplies upon a showing of indigency. The Part directs the department to establish a program, through the Health and 22 Environmental Testing Laboratory, to provide free testing for arsenic of the private 23 24 residential water supplies of low-income residents of the State. The Part requires that, beginning on January 1, 2022 and every 5 years thereafter, landlords of residential 25 buildings test for arsenic each private drinking water well used to provide water to a tenant 26 of the landlord. The Part also requires the department to review recent research regarding 27 28 arsenic toxicity and levels suitable for consumption, to amend its rules to revise the maximum contaminant level for arsenic and requires the Maine Public Drinking Water 29 Commission within the department to include information about the status of this review 30 31 and rules adoption in its annual report under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 2660-C, subsection 4, paragraph H until such rules are finally adopted. 32

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#### PART CC

34 This Part directs the Department of Health and Human Services to establish the Family 35 Caregiver Grant Pilot Program to expand the number of families that can be served under the Respite Care Fund. The pilot program may provide grants to eligible family caregivers 36 of up to \$2,000 a year and lasts for 2 years, from October 2022 to September 2024. The 37 38 department is required to convene a stakeholder group to design and implement the pilot 39 program and plan for its evaluation. The pilot program is limited to total expenditures of \$5,100,000 over the period of the pilot program. The department is required to submit a 40 report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and 41 human services matters no later than January 15, 2025. 42

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PART DD

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This Part establishes a pilot program to allow the parent of a child who is eligible for 1 in-home personal care services under the MaineCare program to register as a personal care 2 3 agency and receive reimbursement for providing those services to the child. The parent must have made reasonable efforts to obtain regular in-home personal care services and 4 passed a background check. An individual who is not a parent of the child must be 5 6 designated as the employer and must be approved as the employer by both the parent and the Department of Health and Human Services. The pilot program is established for fiscal 7 8 years 2021-22 and 2022-23 and the amount of expenditures is capped at \$465,000.

9 PART EE 10 This Part provides funds to: 11 1. The Department of Economic and Community Development to complete the renovation of a wharf and bulkhead at the Gulf of Maine Research Institute; 12 2. The Department of Health and Human Services for: 13 A. Grants for the establishment and administration of the Help Maine Grow System 14 and the First 4 ME Early Child Care and Education Program; 15 16 B. Three limited-period Social Services Program Specialist II positions; and C. Monthly supplemental payments for 2022 for certain MaineCare service providers 17 if federal matching funds are not available; 18 19 3. The Maine State Housing Authority for grants to existing emergency homeless 20 shelters for operations, maintenance or capital improvements; 21 4. The Maine Commission on Indigent Legal Services for counsel fees to ease the 22 backlog of cases caused by the COVID-19 pandemic; 23 5. The Department of Labor to establish 16 limited-period CareerCenter Consultant 24 positions; 25 6. The Maine Maritime Academy for the renovation and restoration of state-owned waterfront and shoreside infrastructure in Castine; 26 27 7. The Maine Public Broadcasting Corporation to replace equipment used to carry the emergency alert system; and 28 29 8. The Permanent Commission on the Status of Racial, Indigenous and Maine Tribal 30 Populations to support development of a strategy and investment in public health infrastructure to reduce disparities in outcomes for residents of the State in minority groups. 31 32 PART FF 33 This Part amends the nursing education loan repayment program as follows. 34 1. It extends eligibility to apply to individuals who are enrolled in master's or doctoral 35 degree programs in nursing. 36 2. It specifies that applicants must indicate an intention to work as full-time nursing faculty in a nursing education program in the State, and increases that required commitment 37 from 3 years to 5 years after acceptance into the nursing education loan repayment program. 38

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3. It increases the maximum amount of loans eligible for repayment under the program from \$4,500 to \$20,000 for a master's degree and from \$6,000 to \$40,000 for a doctoral degree.

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#### PART GG

This Part provides a continuation of funding for legal aid projects funded by grants expiring in 2021 that are essential to support economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. The funding temporarily supplements existing support for legal services providers through the Maine Civil Legal Services Fund, independent of the Civil Legal Services Fund Commission's ongoing, biennial competitive process for distributing other funds deposited in the Maine Civil Legal Services Fund.

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#### PART HH

Part HH establishes the Housing Navigation Pilot Program, a 2-year pilot program within the Maine State Housing Authority, to hire housing navigators to provide tenants with assistance locating housing, assistance applying for rentals and supportive services to promote successful landlord-tenant relationships. The Part also requires the authority to submit a report no later than March 31, 2023 on the number of households that received assistance under the pilot program to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over housing matters.

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#### **PART II**

This Part directs the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development, in consultation with the Director of the Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services within the Department of Defense, Veterans and Emergency Management, to establish a pilot project to conduct outreach and to provide support services for active duty military members who are transitioning to civilian life in the State and their families.

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### PART JJ

This Part directs the Department of Labor, in coordination with the Department of Economic and Community Development and the Department of Health and Human Services, to develop and implement a multimedia public service campaign that promotes direct care worker jobs as a career choice.

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#### PART KK

This Part:

Requires the Commissioner of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry to work with
 the Department of Economic and Community Development and other relevant state
 agencies, industry stakeholders and community organizations to carry out the following
 duties:

A. Strengthen the State's agricultural, food and forest products economy with a priority
 of making resulting efforts more inclusive of and increasing investments in historically
 marginalized, underrepresented and underserved communities; and

B. Improve investment in agricultural, food and forest products industries to increase
access to new markets and opportunities for producers, processors, small businesses
and consumers in the production, processing, packaging, distribution, marketing, sale

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and consumption of products in ways that balance the desire for short-term returns on investment with the State's commitment to redress racial and other inequities;

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 Establishes the Maine Agriculture, Food and Forest Products Investment Fund to facilitate strategic investments in the State's agricultural, food and forest products

processing and manufacturing industries, including value-added products; and

3. Establishes the Maine Agriculture, Food System and Forest Products Infrastructure 6 7 Investment Advisory Board, representing a diversity of skills and experience relevant to investment in agricultural, food and forest products industries and the racial diversity of 8 the food system in the State with specific representation by Indian tribes, communities of 9 10 color and other underserved communities and populations, to determine disbursements from and oversee the Maine Agriculture, Food and Forest Products Investment Fund, to 11 12 devise a process for requests for proposals and enter into 3rd-party contracts to carry out 13 the purposes of the fund and related technical assistance programs and to provide regular reporting and evaluation related to performance and sustainability. 14

PART LL

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16 This Part establishes a career advancement and navigation pilot program to provide 17 educational and career guidance, support and services to help underemployed and unemployed individuals acquire additional education, skills, licensure or other preparation 18 needed to participate to their fullest potential in the workforce. The Part requires the 19 Department of Education to administer and fund the pilot program through career 20 advancement and navigation specialists employed by school administrative units. The Part 21 also requires the Commissioner of Education to submit a report to the joint standing 22 committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education and cultural affairs no later 23 24 than November 4, 2022 regarding the pilot program.

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#### PART MM

26 This Part requires the Department of Administrative and Financial Services to submit 27 to the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs by October 31, 2021 a report on the progress of initiatives created or funded in this legislation. The report 28 must include the identification of any initiatives or funding determined to be an ineligible 29 30 use of funds from the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund established in the federal 31 American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Public Law 117-2. The department is required to submit subsequent reports upon the request of the chairs of the joint standing committee of 32 the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs. 33
