JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY AND THE MAINE OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY ASSOCIATION

WHEREAS, occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants have supported the rehabilitation, development, health and wellness of Maine citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Maine Occupational Therapy Association, which supports more than 1,100 occupational therapy practitioners in the State of Maine, is committed to fostering the continued competence of occupational therapy practitioners and furthering the practice of occupational therapy through research and study, while providing evidence-based health and wellness services that are vital to the provision of health care in Maine, including:

1. Direct service to Maine people regardless of age and social status who have experienced injury, disease and disability and who need skill habilitation and rehabilitation to improve effective occupational performance in daily tasks, including life skills, education and employment;

2. Evaluation and intervention services to Maine people who experience physical, developmental, cognitive, psychosocial and sensory deficits as a result of injury, disease or disability as means to support engagement in everyday life activities that affect the health, well-being and quality of life of Maine citizens;

3. Inpatient, outpatient, early intervention and school-based, mental health and developmental disabilities, assistive technology and eldercare services for Maine citizens needing skill-based interventions and services that create functional independence and increase quality of life across their life spans;

4. Consultation services for prevention of workplace injuries such as ergonomics education and training, workplace station modifications and body mechanics education and techniques; and

5. Wellness and prevention services to promote independence and health, including stress reduction and coping skills training, obesity education and reduction techniques, assistive technology training and service, cardiac disease education strategy development and home modification for aging in place, and independent living skill-based services; and

WHEREAS, the Maine Occupational Therapy Association supports all occupational therapy practitioners in Maine in providing highly skilled services for Maine citizens in achieving health, wellness and independence in all occupational endeavors; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, pause to acknowledge and send our appreciation to the Maine

Occupational Therapy Association and all occupational therapy practitioners in Maine who help all citizens of Maine in their occupational pursuits by providing vital services as new challenges are faced in this period of health care and economic reform; and be it further

Representative **DILL**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Mr. Speaker, if you were a resident of my district and I had supported the law making gay marriage legal, you would have a process through the citizen's repeal to express yourself. If you were a resident of my district and you did not support the tax reform bill, you would have a process to repeal that law. But Mr. Speaker, if you were a resident of my district and thought I was doing a lousy job, you would not have an opportunity as a citizen to recall me as an elected official. The Joint Order that is before this body would simply create a process for the committee of jurisdiction, in this case the Committee of Veterans and Legal Affairs, ably chaired by the Representative from Auburn, Representative Beaulieu, who we all have confidence in, would have a fair and good public hearing on whether or not the citizens of Maine should have a process to recall elected officials including all of us here, members of the other body and the Chief Executive, and also the constitutional officers.

Eighteen other states currently have a citizen recall process and Maine doesn't. As some of you may know, there is a provision in the Constitution that allows an impeachment of state elected officials, including ourselves, and that is a legal process whereby the House would act to indict and the other body would then try. What this Joint Order relates to is more of a people's process, a process whereby the people of the State of Maine, should they want and desire to participate, would have a process to recall elected officials. So Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I urge your support of this Joint Order. It is not necessarily a vote in support of a recall. It is simply a vote in support of having the committee report out a bill, have a public hearing, hear from all the people, create a process in a bipartisan fashion that would serve the interests of the people of Maine. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.
