Representative TREAT: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: It seems like I have to stand up every five minutes today. We seem to be having a lot of bills from the Judiciary Committee. I did want to just explain to you what this bill is, so you know what we are voting on. This is a unanimous Committee Report coming from the Judiciary Committee. It is a bill that protects access to reproductive health clinics along with hospitals and other facilities. In its amended form no longer is it specifically related to reproductive health clinics.

It is a bill that is supported by several members of the pro-life coalition as well as the pro-choice coalition. It was negotiated with the assistance of the Attorney General's Office. It is really a win, win situation. It is something that where we had people coming to us in agreement on both sides of what is a very divisive issue and getting unanimous support from this committee. I think it is a really positive step forward in opposition to any potential violence that might occur and in support of free speech and access to constitutional rights. I hope that you will vote in support of the unanimous Committee Report.

Representative TREAT: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: Noise could be any kind of noise. It is defined in a whole series of decisions that have come down from the courts in other states as well as in existing laws that we have here in the State of Maine that involve disorderly conduct. Any kind of very loud noises, they would have to be noises that are heard inside buildings. No one could be out of compliance with this law unless they were previously warned by a police officer that they were causing problems and they allowed very loud noises and at which time they deliberately went ahead with making noises after having been warned. I left my file up in my office, but I would be happy to read from various court decisions if the body is interested in that, which go into great detail on this. Do you wish me to go get it.
