27	perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability, including a physical,
28	sensory, psychiatric, intellectual or other mental disability. Other species of animals,
29	whether wild or domestic, trained or untrained, are not service animals for the
30	purposes of this definition. The work or tasks performed by a service animal must be
31	directly related to the individual's disability. Examples of such work or tasks include,
32	but are not limited to, assisting an individual who is totally or partially blind with
33	navigation and other tasks, alerting an individual who is deaf or hard of hearing to the
34 35	presence of people or sounds, providing nonviolent protection or rescue work, pulling
55	a wheelchair, assisting an individual during a seizure, alerting an individual to the

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1 presence of allergens, retrieving items such as medicine or a telephone, providing physical support and assistance with balance and stability to an individual with a 2 mobility disability and helping a person with a psychiatric or neurological disability 3 by preventing or interrupting impulsive or destructive behaviors. A totally or partially blind or otherwise physically 33 disabled pedestrian, not carrying such a cane or using a service dog in any of the places, 34 35 accommodations or conveyances listed in section 1312, has all of the rights and privileges conferred by law upon other persons, and the failure of a totally or partially blind or 36 37 otherwise physically disabled pedestrian to carry such a cane or to use a service dog in any such places, accommodations or conveyances may not be held to constitute nor be 38 evidence of contributory negligence. 39

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6 7 A person who fits a dog with a harness, collar, vest or sign of the type commonly used by blind persons in order to represent that the dog is a service dog or commonly used by persons with disabilities to represent that the dog is a service dog when training of the type that guide dogs normally receive has not been provided or when the dog does not meet the definition of "service dog" as defined in section 1312, subsection 7 commits a civil violation for which a fine of not more than \$500 may be adjudged.

12 SUMMARY

13 This amendment replaces the bill.

14 The bill contains the definition of "service animal" as adopted by the United States 15 Department of Justice in regulations to implement the Americans with Disabilities Act of 16 1990. This definition is inconsistent with the definition of "service animal" adopted in 17 regulations by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development.

18 This amendment retains the current definition of "service animal" in the Maine 19 Human Rights Act, which applies in fair housing circumstances, and adds the definition 20 of "service animal" from the bill, which is specific to dogs in public accommodations 21 circumstances.

This amendment updates cross-references in the animal welfare laws in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 7 and Title 17, the model white cane law in Title 17 and the miscellaneous crimes chapter in Title 17.

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
