An Act to Increase Access to Behavioral Health Services for Children and Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities or Autism

Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, lengthy hospital stays and lack of access to services for persons with intellectual disabilities or autism pose a dire risk to such persons; and

Whereas, it is essential to address these issues as soon as possible to protect the safety and well-being of persons with intellectual disabilities or autism; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 34-B MRSA §5206, sub-§5-A is enacted to read:

5-A. Emergency departments. The department shall provide crisis and respite services for persons with intellectual disabilities or autism to ensure that such a person does not stay in a hospital emergency department for more than 24 hours after the person has met the medical criteria for safe discharge. Crisis beds in a residential facility must be prioritized for persons who are discharged from hospital emergency departments. Crisis and respite services must be available to a residential facility within 4 hours to meet the needs of a person in crisis.

Sec. 2. 34-B MRSA §5206, sub-§5-B is enacted to read:

- 5-B. Statewide system. No later than January 1, 2025, the department shall establish a statewide system of crisis services to meet the needs of children who require behavioral health services, including but not limited to mental health services, services for intellectual disabilities or autism or substance use services. The system must include mobile crisis outreach, including assessment and stabilization, and crisis beds in a residential facility for children whose needs cannot be met in their residences and for children who are hospitalized but no longer need hospital-level care. The department shall establish metrics to track access to the statewide system of crisis services.
- **Sec. 3. 34-B MRSA §5206, sub-§6,** as amended by PL 2011, c. 542, Pt. A, §93, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:
- <u>6. Information regarding use.</u> The department shall maintain information regarding use of crisis and respite services in accordance with this subsection. The department shall maintain:
 - A. Information regarding use of crisis and respite services sufficient to plan and budget for adequate crisis and respite services. The information must include an assessment of the needs, both met and unmet, for crisis and respite services. The department shall provide information regarding the availability of services under this section and the proper means to obtain them to persons with intellectual disabilities or autism, their parents and allies, providers of services and other interested persons; and
 - B. A publicly accessible website in order to track the number of:

1	(1) Persons with intellectual disabilities or autism who stay in hospital emergency
2	departments for more than 24 hours after having met the medical criteria for safe
3	discharge;
4 5	(2) Calls to the State's crisis services under subsection 1 annually and from which geographic regions in the State the calls are made;
6 7	(3) Persons served by crisis beds in residential facilities and the average length of stay; and
8	(4) Requests for residential crisis services that are not met.
9	Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation
10	takes effect when approved.
11	SUMMARY
12	This bill requires the Department of Health and Human Services to:
