Chapter 49: PLUMBERS

§3507. CORPORATIONS, FIRMS AND PARTNERSHIPS

The board may issue a company license to a corporation, firm, partnership, limited partnership or limited liability company. Such a license may not be issued unless the applicant provides satisfactory evidence that it has a licensed master plumber directly in charge of its plumbing business activities who is an officer or full-time employee, in the case of a corporation, or a partner, member or full-time employee, in the case of a firm or partnership, and the license must be issued in the name of that master plumber. A master plumber may only be affiliated with one corporation. Upon the death or severance from the company of the licensed master plumber in whose name the company license is held, the company license automatically terminates 30 days from the date of that death or severance, unless the company applies for reissuance of its license in the name of another licensed master plumber who is qualified under this section.
