## §5162. Biennial report

- 1. **Biennial report.** The redevelopment authority shall submit biennially, beginning with the Second Regular Session of the 131st Legislature, to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over economic development matters a complete report on the activities of the redevelopment authority. The report must include the following:
  - A. A description of the redevelopment authority's operations; [PL 2021, c. 664, §3 (NEW).]
  - B. A listing of all property acquired pursuant to this chapter; [PL 2021, c. 664, §3 (NEW).]
  - C. An accounting of all activities related to the fund; [PL 2021, c. 664, §3 (NEW).]
  - D. A listing of any bonds issued during the fiscal year by the redevelopment authority; [PL 2021, c. 664, §3 (NEW).]
  - E. A statement of the redevelopment authority's proposed and projected activities for the ensuing year; and [PL 2021, c. 664, §3 (NEW).]
  - F. Recommendations regarding further actions that may be suitable for achieving the purposes of this chapter. [PL 2021, c. 664, §3 (NEW).]
