Philip L. Geyelin, of Washington, D.C., a journalist with the Associated Press and the Wall Street Journal and winner of the 1970 Pulitzer Prize for editorial writing while he was the editor of the Op-Ed section of the Washington Post. He was a former president of the Gridiron Club, a former board member of Alliance Francoise and a member of the Overseas Press Club. Mr. Geyelin had a deep appreciation and love for Maine, its natural beauty and its people. He and his family have been longtime summer residents of Mount Desert Island. He gave generously of his time, talent and expertise. His annual summer lectures, delivered at the Claremont Hotel on various aspects of Middle East politics, will be long remembered. At the time of his death, Mr. Geyelin was a member of the Board of Trustees of the College of the Atlantic in Bar Harbor.
