JOINT RESOLUTION DESIGNATING MARCH AS IRISH HERITAGE MONTH

WHEREAS, America and the State of Maine since colonial times have welcomed millions of Irish immigrants to our shores, many fleeing religious, social and political discrimination in their homeland or starvation during the Great Hunger of the 1840s; and

WHEREAS, a significant portion of Maine's population proudly claims Irish descent and 44,000,000 Americans nationwide claim Irish descent; and

WHEREAS, 4 signers of the Declaration of Independence were Irish-born and 9 signers were of Irish ancestry, and 19 Presidents of the United States proudly claim Irish heritage, included among them the father of our country, George Washington; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 1776, the day that the British forces evacuated Boston, General George Washington, to honor the large numbers of Irish under his command, used the name "Saint Patrick" as the password for his army; and

WHEREAS, Irish-Americans have from our country's earliest days been well represented in every major industry and occupation and have played an important role in making this country the great nation it is today; and

WHEREAS, Irish-Americans have bravely fought and died with honor to defend our country in every major war and conflict in which the United States has been involved; and

WHEREAS, more Americans claiming Irish ancestry have been awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor than any other nationality. The 2nd-youngest recipient of the Congressional Medal of Honor, at 14 years of age, was John Edward Anglin, who served in the United States Navy during the Civil War and was born in Portland, Maine and raised by Irish immigrant parents; and

WHEREAS, on May 11, 1775, Jeremiah O'Brien of Machias, Maine commanded the first naval victory of the American Revolutionary War; and

WHEREAS, Irish immigrants have always brought and generously shared their wonderful traditions, music and culture and have had a positive influence on American culture; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-first Legislature, now assembled in the Second Special Session, do proclaim that March 2004, and the month of March in every year, be designated as Irish Heritage Month throughout the State of Maine, and urge all schools, libraries and businesses and the media and the citizens of the State to commend and celebrate the integrity and richness of this culture; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Daniel O'Connell O'Donoughue Division of the Ancient Order of Hibernians on behalf of the people of the State of Maine.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Nass.

Senator **NASS**: Thank you, Madame President, men and women of the Senate. I urge that you defeat this report and go on to accept the majority report from the Taxation Committee, which is Ought Not to Pass. While this would seem to be an obvious benefit for many in Maine who are unemployed at this time, there are two sides to this story. For somebody that was a relatively low income earner and is eligible for unemployment benefits, the probability is high that they won't pay taxes on that anyways. For those who, fortunately, worked in a fairly high paying job, for instance the paper workers in this state, and are now unemployed either temporarily or permanently, we face the prospect, by passing this, of those workers being exempt from income taxes. If you are a \$40,000, \$50,000 or \$60,000 a year earner, and for part of the year you collect unemployment benefits, it hardly seems fair to me that this person should be exempt from taxes in Maine. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Stanley.

Senator **STANLEY**: Thank you, Madame President. It is an honor today to be able to rise on this particular bill. The reason why I can rise on it is because I know a lot of people who are living this today. I'll tell you everybody sitting in this room should take a look at their district. The reason why I'm saying that is because a lot of you have the same type of community as I do in my districts with one horse industries. These one horse industries are the towns themselves. Without the one horse industries the towns die. Without people being able to spend some money in those communities, the towns go away. With that being said, it's very important that the people in this body realize that it could come to a community near you. Nothing is sadder than watching a community die. I've seen Millinocket die. I've seen East Millinocket on the verge of death and then it came back. Knock on wood. Now I'm looking at a community 20 miles down the road that is on the verge of collapsing. Then I look over at Brewer, another town or city that is living with this situation. There are other places they can go, but a lot of communities have no place to go. You work all your life, 25 or 30 years; you have payments; you build a house; you establish yourself. Then things happen to you. When that happens to you, it's a horse of a different color. Been there, done it, lived it, living it today, and will be living it tomorrow and next week. I'll probably be living it for a while. I tell you,

this is a bill that will help not just the person who is unemployed, but also the community that these people reside in. I'll tell you, what is going on not just here but all across the country is that people are losing jobs.

Every time I've spoken this year it's been about jobs. That is the name of the game, people. Jobs is the name of the game. Everybody out there that I know, 1,500 to 2,000 people, that are collecting unemployment right now within 30 or 40 miles of my district would love to have a job. I tell you what, when you have a job, you can buy things for your family, you have insurance, you have everything. Without a job, you don't have insurance. You people think they are going to Mainecare. Most of these people are making too much money on unemployment to qualify for Mainecare, to qualify for heating oil, to qualify for the food stamps. If you take \$30 or \$40 out of their pockets, it makes a big difference. You are talking about life as a family, which is very important.

A while ago I heard here talk about livable wages. One of the problems in this state has is livable wages. We don't have enough livable wages. I'm not saying unemployment is the way to go, but I do say one thing, when you can have a job and get paid a livable wage, you can survive with all the benefits that the state provides. If you don't have that, you can't survive.

I want to make just one more point before I sit down. Put yourself in the position of some of these people. It could happen to you very easily. I will tell you, Maine is full of one horse industry towns. It could be your brother, you sister, your daughter, your son-in-law, your grandson, or anybody. Put yourself in their situation. Lived for years in the community you grew up in. All of a sudden it's taken away from you through no fault of your own. Here we are in an area where roughly 35,000 are unemployed in the State of Maine. Just think what an extra \$20 would do for these people. It might buy an extra loaf of bread. Might buy a gallon of gas to go find a job. When you don't have the money, it's not there. With that, I would recommend you go with the minority report of Ought to Pass as Amended. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT P	PRO TEM : Th	e Chair recognizes the Senator from Waldo, Senator Weston.				

Senator **WESTON**: Thank you, Madame President, men and women of the Senate. This bill that is before you was a great bill. In fact, most of it has already been passed into law. That is why it is back before us today. There was one very important piece that was not applied to the bill that we know as the Dirigo Legislation. I consider that an oversight, perhaps. The reason we should not be just letting the rest of this bill go is because it relates directly to our responsibility as members of the legislature.

The Advisory Council on Health Systems Development that is in place now has every appointment made by the Governor's office. In the original legislation that we have before us today, it divided that appointment process between the Senate, the House, and the Chief Executive's office. We all know when we campaigned and we all know that every day we hear from our constituents about the health care issues; how they are trying to struggle to be a part of it, how they are trying to struggle to understand what we are doing with it. I think this committee is so important that I don't want to shirk my responsibility and I would like to see the President of our Senate and the Speaker of the other body be able to make appointments. There is an amendment that we could forward with that does just that.

The choice before you this morning is very simple. You can let this bill go as not passed into law. By doing that, we are saying we should have nothing to say about who severs on this very important council. We could go forward and take our fair share of responsibility and be responsive to our constituents back home. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Brennan.

Senator BRENNAN: Thank you, Madame President, men and women of the Senate. It's somewhat unfortunate that this bill is before us today and it is certainly unnecessary that this bill is before us today. This bill was presented last session. It did relate to Dirigo Health and to healthcare reform. As a result of that, the bill was carried over to the next session. In Dirigo Health, it was passed last session. We had an analysis that was done by the OPLA staff. They did a side-by-side of this bill with what was in Dirigo Health. It was virtually identical. The previous speaker, the Senator from Waldo, Senator Weston, acknowledged that. What was put forward in this bill during the last session was almost fully incorporated into Dirigo Health. The substance of the bill, the important part of the bill, was passed in Dirigo Health, unanimously, by the Joint Select Committee on Healthcare Reform. When we pass that, nobody raised the issue of appointments. When the committee reconvened this year, we said we was going to bring this bill forward and report it out Ought Not to Pass, because we have done it in Dirigo Health. All of a sudden, there are these concerns raised about who is doing the appointments. Never were they raised during the discussion about Dirigo Health. Now we need to have this debate and discussion about who is going to do the appointments. In an act of good faith, there was a compromise that was put forward by the Chief Executive's Office relative to this bill. It was dismissed, turned down. They said, 'no, we don't want to do that. We'd rather continue to go forward with this minority report.' So I urge you to support the majority report, which is Ought Not to Pass, because we already addressed this issue in Dirigo Health. If this were not simply a carry over bill, it would not be before us today. Thank you. Again, I hope you will support the pending motion.

THE PRESIDENT: The pending question before the Senate is the motion by the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Brennan to Accept the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report.
