fo	1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates ollowing terms have the following meanings.
	A. "Homemade liquor" has the same meaning as in section 1358.
	B. "Liquor judging competition event" means an event where judges evaluate en of malt liquor, wine or spirits based on a set of criteria to determine a winner of competition.
<u>c</u>	2. Liquor judging competition event permit; eligibility. One or more certificate permit holders or persons who produce homemade liquor may apply jointly in combination for a permit to participate in a liquor judging competition event subject to conditions prescribed by this section.
<u>p</u>	3. Out-of-state manufacturers. A manufacturer licensed in another state articipate in the liquor judging competition event in the same manner and subject tame conditions as a person permitted under this section.
	4. Application. An applicant for a liquor judging competition event permit abmit a written application to the bureau no later than 15 calendar days prior to the f the competition event. The application must include the following:
	A. The name and address of each applicant;
	B. The title and purpose of the competition event;
	C. The date, time and duration of the competition event;
	D. The address and location of the competition event, including a description of area designated for the competition event; and
	E. The sample size and overall sample limit that will be imposed at the compeevent consistent with the requirements in subsection 8, paragraph C.
	5. Fee. The permit fee for a liquor judging competition event permit is \$20.
	6. Ruling on application. Upon receipt of an application under subsection a ureau shall immediately approve or deny the application. The bureau shall a pplicants that the permit may be suspended or revoked pursuant to chapter 33.
	7. Up to 10 permitted competition events per year; one competition even ermit. A person eligible for a permit under subsection 2 may obtain up to 10 pender this section per calendar year.
р	8. Conditions. The following conditions apply to a liquor judging competition ermitted under this section.
	A. A person may not be charged a fee, except the fee for admission, for any liquor, wine or spirits at the competition event.
	B. If the venue for the liquor judging competition event is currently licensed for premises consumption of liquor, the bureau shall temporarily suspend the author the on-premises retail licensee to sell liquor for on-premises consumption in the

A person permitted under this section shall limit the size of samples provided for the competition event to at most 4 ounces of malt liquor, at most 1 1/2 ounces of wine 5 6 or at most 1/2 ounce of spirits. A person permitted under this section shall record the number of patrons admitted 9 to the liquor judging competition event by requiring patrons to submit a ticket or sign 10 a register or by employing some similar method of tracking attendance. 11 E. A person permitted under this section may provide for judging any malt liquor or 19 wine that the licensee manufactures or distributes that is registered and authorized for 20 distribution and sale under this Title, any spirits that the licensee manufactures or 21 distributes that are listed for sale by the commission or any homemade liquor 22 authorized under section 1358, whichever is applicable. Excise taxes for malt liquor 23 and wine under section 1652 must be paid before the scheduled date of the liquor 24 judging competition event. 25 J. For purposes of this section, "homemade 31 liquor" means liquor made by a person's own efforts in the person's home for personal use 32

that is not offered for sale.

- 1. Permitted liquor judging competition events. Homemade liquor may be removed from the premises where the homemade liquor was made if the homemade liquor is entered into a permitted liquor judging competition event as provided in section 1057.
 - **2. Prohibitions.** Homemade liquor may not be sold or offered for sale.
 - **3. Violation.** A violation of this section is a Class E crime.

38 **SUMMARY**

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This bill authorizes one or more certificate of approval holders or persons who produce homemade liquor to apply jointly in any combination for a permit to participate in a liquor judging competition event subject to certain conditions. The bill defines "liquor judging competition event" as an event where judges evaluate entries of malt liquor, wine or spirits based on a set of criteria to determine a winner of a competition.

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The bill also specifies that a license for the production of homemade liquor is not required if certain conditions are met. The bill defines "homemade liquor" as liquor made by a person's own efforts in the person's home for personal use that is not offered for sale.
