## An Act to Expand Good Samaritan Protections for Naloxone Hydrochloride Administration

- 1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
- Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §2353, sub-§5, ¶B, as enacted by PL 2015, c. 508, §4, is amended to read:
- 4 B. A person listed in this section as authorized to possess, obtain, store, administer or 5 dispense naloxone hydrochloride, acting in good faith and with reasonable care, is immune from criminal and civil liability and is not subject to professional disciplinary 6 7 action for possessing or providing to another person naloxone hydrochloride in 8 accordance with this section or for administering naloxone hydrochloride in 9 accordance with this section to an individual whom the person believes in good faith 10 is experiencing an opioid-related drug overdose or for any outcome resulting from such actions. 11
- 12 Sec. 2. 22 MRSA §2353, sub-§5, ¶C is enacted to read:

13C. A person not listed in this section, acting in good faith and with reasonable care, is14immune from criminal and civil liability and is not subject to professional disciplinary15action for providing to another person naloxone hydrochloride or for administering16naloxone hydrochloride to an individual whom the person believes in good faith is17experiencing an opioid-related drug overdose or for any outcome resulting from such18actions.

  20 This bill extends immunity from civil or criminal liability or professional disciplinary
- action to any person who provides or administers naloxone hydrochloride to an individual
   whom the person believes in good faith is experiencing an opioid-related drug overdose.
