An Act Relating to Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances Contamination in the State

9	§320-K. Fund To Address PFAS Contamination
10 11	1. Definitions. As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
12 13	A. "Advisory committee" means the Advisory Committee on the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination in section 320-L.
14 15 16 17 18	B. "Agricultural enterprise" means a person or business located in this State and engaged in the commercial growing or harvesting of plants; raising of animals; growing or obtaining plant or animal by-products; or further processing, storing, packing or marketing a raw product derived from plants, animals or plant or animal by-products with the intent that the product be sold or otherwise disposed of to generate income.
19	C. "Agricultural land" has the same meaning as in section 32, subsection 2.
20	D. "Biosolids" has the same meaning as in section 742, subsection 1-A.
21	E. "Fund" means the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination under subsection 2.
22 23	F. "Perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances" or "PFAS" has the same meaning as in Title 32, section 1732, subsection 5-A.
24 25	2. Fund established. The Fund To Address PFAS Contamination is established within the department as a nonlapsing fund for the purposes specified in this chapter.
26 27	3. Sources of fund. The fund is funded from funds accepted by the commissioner or allocated or appropriated by the Legislature.
28 29	4. Purposes. Allocations from the fund may be made as determined by the department upon recommendation of the advisory committee and for the following purposes:
30 31	A. Monitoring the health of a person, and members of that person's household, whose agricultural land is found to be contaminated by PFAS;
32	B. Relocating a person whose agricultural land is found to be contaminated by PFAS;
33	C. Buying and selling agricultural land found to be contaminated by PFAS;
34 35 36	D. Investing in equipment, facilities and infrastructure to ensure that an agricultural enterprise with land found to be contaminated by PFAS maintains profitability while the agricultural enterprise transitions to a new cropping system;

Assisting an agricultural enterprise with land found to be contaminated by PFAS with developing enterprise budgets for alternative cropping systems or transitioning to alternative agricultural enterprise revenue streams, including but not limited to land use systems combining agricultural use of the land with solar energy production; F. Providing short-term assistance to a person whose agricultural land is found to be contaminated by PFAS, including but not limited to income replacement and mortgage

8 9 10	<u>G.</u> Conducting research that informs the development of infrastructure to increase <u>PFAS</u> testing capacity statewide, such as establishing state testing laboratories, and data management;
11 12	H. Conducting research that supports short-term farm management decisions and assesses future options for viable uses of agricultural land;
13 14	I. Conducting research that quantifies the impact of PFAS on the State's agricultural enterprises and agricultural communities;
15 16	J. Conducting research on soil and water remediation systems and the viability of those systems;
17	K. Assessing current uses of PFAS;
18 19 20 21	L. Funding for educational programs for landowners, including but not limited to determining best practices for informing residents about the potential of being near or on a biosolids application site, and providing information and guidance on buying or selling agricultural lands that have had biosolids applied; and
22 23	M. Long-term monitoring of contaminated sites and establishing a corresponding centralized data repository.
24 25 26	5. Administration. The department shall administer the fund allocations with the review and advice of the advisory committee. The department may contract for professional services to carry out the purposes of this section.
27 28 29	6. Rules. The department may adopt rules to implement this chapter. Rules adopted pursuant to this subsection are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.
30	§320-L. Advisory Committee on the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination
31 32 33 34 35 36 37 38	The Advisory Committee on the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination is established pursuant to Title 5, section 12004-I, subsection 2-H to make recommendations to the department regarding administration of the fund. In order to develop recommendations for the department, the advisory committee may form working groups that include and seek input from subject matter experts from the public and private sectors to deliberate issues relating to the purposes of the fund, including but not limited to health monitoring, short- term financial aid for farmers, research priorities, solar siting, long-term environmental monitoring and land acquisition.
39	1. Membership. The advisory committee consists of:
40	A. The commissioner or the commissioner's designee;
41	B. The Commissioner of Environmental Protection or the commissioner's designee;

1 2 3 4	C. The dean of the Maine Agricultural and Forest Experiment Station at the University of Maine, College of Natural Sciences, Forestry, and Agriculture or the dean of the University of Maine Cooperative Extension, appointed by the President of the University of Maine;
5	D. The Attorney General or the Attorney General's designee;
6 7	E. Two members of the public representing the agricultural sector, appointed by the commissioner; and
8 9	<u>F.</u> One member of a soil and water conservation district as defined in Title 12, section 3, subsection 2, appointed by the commissioner.
10 11 12 13 14 15 16	Sec. 3. Advisory committee to consider findings and recommendations. By March 1, 2023, the Advisory Committee on the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 7, section 320-L shall consider the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry February 4, 2022 report "Findings and Recommendations for a PFAS Study Plan Supporting L.D. 558" when developing advisory committee recommendations, including but not limited to funding for research, regarding administration of the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination.

27	SUMMARY
28 29 30 31 32 33 34	This bill is reported out by the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry pursuant to Joint Rule 353. The committee is reporting the bill out for the sole purpose of turning the proposal into a printed bill that can be referred to the committee for an appropriate public hearing and subsequent processing in the normal course. The committee has not taken a position on the substance of this bill and by reporting this bill out the committee is not suggesting and does not intend to suggest that it agrees or disagrees with any aspect of this bill.
35 36 37 38 39 40 41 42	The bill establishes the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination within the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry and the corresponding Advisory Committee on the Fund To Address PFAS Contamination to make recommendations to the department regarding administration of the fund. The bill authorizes the department to allocate funds upon recommendation of the advisory committee and for certain purposes, including but not limited to monitoring the health of a person, and members of that person's household, whose agricultural land is found to be contaminated by perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, or PFAS; buying and selling agricultural land found to be contaminated by

1 PFAS; conducting research; assisting an agricultural enterprise with land found to be 2 contaminated by PFAS; funding for educational programs; and long-term monitoring of 3 contaminated sites and establishing a corresponding centralized data repository.

The bill also authorizes the advisory committee to form working groups that include and seek input from subject matter experts from the public and private sectors to deliberate issues relating to the purposes of the fund, including but not limited to health monitoring, short-term financial aid for farmers, research priorities, solar siting, long-term environmental monitoring and land acquisition.

9 The bill provides one-time funding of \$100,000,000 to address PFAS contamination 10 on agricultural land in the State.
