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An Act to Strengthen Housing Stability Services by Increasing **Support and Outreach**

- 1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
 - Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §20-B is enacted to read:

3 §20-B. Services to prevent homelessness

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4 The department shall contract with community-based nonprofit organizations with 5 experience in outreach, engagement and social service delivery to individuals and families 6 experiencing homelessness in order to hire outreach caseworkers and housing stability 7 workers to work with individuals who are unhoused or experience chronic homelessness 8 by cycling through emergency settings such as shelters, jails, hospitals and warming centers. The outreach caseworkers and housing stability workers shall assist individuals to 9 10 attain permanent housing, ensure ongoing support services once the individuals are housed and ensure that unhoused individuals are in safe indoor spaces provided by emergency 11 12 shelters while housing is being secured.

13 Sec. 2. Department of Health and Human Services contracts for outreach caseworkers. The Department of Health and Human Services shall issue a request for 14 15 proposals to contract for outreach caseworker services as required by the Maine Revised The contracts with community-based nonprofit Statutes, Title 22, section 20-B. 16 organizations must be sufficient to hire 9 outreach caseworkers. The department must 17 contract with organizations that have experience in outreach, engagement and social 18 19 service delivery to individuals and families experiencing homelessness. The contracts issued under this section must be for a period of time set by the department, and the 20 department may renew the contracts at the end of the set period. The contracts must include 21 22 the following requirements.

1. Nine outreach caseworkers must be hired.

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 2. The caseworkers must work with unhoused individuals to attain permanent housing,
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3. The caseworkers must be distributed across the State, as determined by agreement
between the 3 regional homeless councils represented on the Statewide Homeless Council,
and targeted to areas that have the greatest concentration of unhoused individuals. As
circumstances change, the caseworkers may be redistributed geographically.

4. The caseload for the caseworkers must be up to 25 individuals with intensive needsand up to 35 additional cases that require less intensive but ongoing support.

34 Sec. 3. Department of Health and Human Services contracts for housing stability workers. The Department of Health and Human Services shall issue a request 35 for proposals to contract for housing stability workers as required by the Maine Revised 36 Statutes, Title 22, section 20-B. The contracts with community-based nonprofit 37 38 organizations must be sufficient to hire 9 housing stability workers. The department must contract with organizations that have experience in outreach, engagement and social 39 service delivery to individuals and families experiencing homelessness. The contracts 40 41 issued under this section must be for a period of time set by the department, and the 42 department may renew the contracts at the end of the set period. The contracts must include 43 the following requirements.

1	1. Nine housing stability workers must be hired.			
2	2. The housing stability workers must work with individuals experiencing chronic			
3	homelessness cycling through various emergency settings, such as shelters, jails, hospitals			
4 5	and warming centers, and provide those individuals with intensive housing or rehousing services to ensure housing stability.			
6 7	3. The housing stability workers must be distributed across the State, as determined by			
8	agreement between the 3 regional homeless councils represented on the Statewide Homeless Council, and targeted to areas that have the greatest concentration of individuals			
9	experiencing chronic homelessness. As circumstances change, the workers may be			
10	redistributed geographically.			
11	4. The caseload for the housing stability workers must be up to 25 individuals with			
12	intensive needs and up to 35 additional cases that require less intensive but ongoing			
13	support.

40	This bill requires the Department of Health and Human Services to contract with			
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40 This bill requires the Department of Health and Human Services to contract with 41 community-based nonprofit organizations through a request for proposals process for 9 outreach caseworkers and 9 housing stability workers. The outreach caseworkers and
 housing stability workers provide housing and supportive services to individuals who are
 unhoused and chronically homeless, as well as ensuring that the individuals are in safe
 indoor environments while awaiting permanent housing. The contracted workers are
 distributed around the State and targeted to areas with higher populations of individuals
 who are homeless. The bill requires ongoing appropriations of \$800,000 each year for
 outreach caseworkers and \$900,000 each year for housing stability workers.
