17	MAINE CONSUMER DATA PRIVACY ACT
18	<u>§9601. Short title</u>
19	This chapter may be known and cited as "the Maine Consumer Data Privacy Act."
20	§9602. Definitions
21 22	As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
23 24 25	1. Affiliate. "Affiliate" means a business or nonprofit organization that shares common branding with another business or nonprofit organization or controls, is controlled by or is under common control with another business or nonprofit organization.
26 27 28 29	2. Biometric data. "Biometric data" means data generated by automatic measurements of an individual's biological characteristics, such as a fingerprint, voiceprint, retina, iris or other unique biological pattern or characteristic that is used to identify a specific individual. "Biometric data" does not include:
30	A. A digital or physical photograph;

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1	B. An audio or video recording;
2 3	C. Any data generated from a digital or physical photograph or an audio or video recording, unless the data is generated to identify a specific individual; or
4 5 6 7	D. Data collected, used or stored for health care treatment, payment or operations under the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, 42 United States Code, Chapter 7, Subchapter XI, Part C, and the regulations, rules, guidance and exemptions adopted pursuant to that Act.
8 9	3. Business associate. "Business associate" has the same meaning as in 45 Code of Federal Regulations, Section 160.103.
10	4. Child. "Child" means an individual who has not attained 13 years of age.
11 12 13 14 15 16	5. Consent. "Consent" means a clear affirmative act signifying a consumer's freely given, specific, informed and unambiguous agreement to allow the processing of personal data relating to the consumer. "Consent" may include a written statement, including by electronic means, that is made in the language the consumer uses to obtain a product or service from the controller and in a format that is reasonably accessible to and usable by consumers with disabilities. "Consent" does not include:
17 18	A. Acceptance of a terms of use document or similar document that contains descriptions of personal data processing along with other unrelated information;
19	B. Hovering over, muting, pausing or closing a given piece of content; or
20	C. Agreement obtained through the use of a dark pattern.
21 22 23 24 25 26 27	6. Consumer. "Consumer" means an individual who is a resident of this State. "Consumer" does not include an individual acting in a commercial or employment context or as an employee, owner, director, officer or contractor of a company, partnership, sole proprietorship, nonprofit organization or government agency whose communications or transactions with the controller occur solely within the context of that individual's role with the company, partnership, sole proprietorship, nonprofit organization or government agency.
28	7. Control. "Control" means:
29 30	A. Ownership of, or the power to vote, more than 50% of the outstanding shares of any class of voting security of a company;
31 32	B. Control in any manner over the election of a majority of the directors of a company or of individuals exercising similar functions in a company; or
33	C. Power to exercise controlling influence over the management of a company.
34 35	8. Controller. "Controller" means a person that, alone or jointly with other persons, determines the purpose and means of processing personal data.
36 37 38 39	9. COPPA. "COPPA" means the federal Children's Online Privacy Protection Act of 1998, 15 United States Code, Section 6501 et seq. and the regulations, rules, guidance and exemptions adopted pursuant to that Act, as that Act and such regulations, rules, guidance and exemptions may be amended from time to time.
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1 2 3 4	11. Dark pattern. "Dark pattern" means a user interface designed or manipulated with the substantial effect of subverting or impairing user autonomy, decision-making or choice and includes, but is not limited to, any practice the Federal Trade Commission refers to as a dark pattern.
5 6 7 8 9 10	12. Decisions that produce legal or similarly significant effects concerning the consumer. "Decisions that produce legal or similarly significant effects concerning the consumer" means decisions that result in the provision or denial to the consumer of financial or lending services, housing, insurance, education enrollment or opportunity, criminal justice, employment opportunities, health care services or access to essential goods or services.
11 12 13	13. De-identified data. "De-identified data" means data that cannot reasonably be used to infer information about or otherwise be linked to an identified or identifiable individual, or a device linked to an individual, if the controller that possesses the data:
14 15	A. Takes reasonable measures to ensure that the de-identified data cannot be associated with an individual;
16 17	B. Publicly commits to process the de-identified data only in a de-identified fashion and not attempt to re-identify the data; and
18 19	C. Contractually obligates recipients of the de-identified data to satisfy the criteria set forth in paragraphs A and B.
20 21 22 23 24 25 26	14. Federally recognized Indian tribe in this State. "Federally recognized Indian tribe in this State" means the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians, the Mi'kmaq Nation, the Passamaquoddy Tribe or the Penobscot Nation when the band, nation or tribe is acting in a governmental capacity and not in a business capacity. "Federal recognized Indian tribe in this State" does not include a business entity, including any federally chartered tribal corporation or other business entity owned or partly owned by the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians, the Mi'kmaq Nation, the Passamaquoddy Tribe or the Penobscot Nation.
27 28 29	15. Nonprofit organization. "Nonprofit organization" means an organization that is exempt from taxation under Section $501(c)(3)$, Section $501(c)(4)$, Section $501(c)(6)$ or Section $501(c)(12)$ of the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.
30 31 32 33	16. Personal data. "Personal data" means information that is linked or reasonably linkable to an identified or identifiable consumer or that is linked or reasonably linkable to a device that is linked or reasonably linkable to an identified or identifiable consumer. "Personal data" does not include de-identified data or publicly available information.
34 35 36 37 38	17. Precise geolocation data. "Precise geolocation data" means information derived from technology, including, but not limited to, global positioning system level latitude and longitude coordinates, that directly identifies the specific location of an individual with precision and accuracy within a radius of 1,750 feet. "Precise geolocation data" does not include:
39 40	A. The content of communications; or
40 41	B. Data generated by or connected to advanced utility metering infrastructure systems or equipment for use by a utility.

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1 2 3	18. Process. "Process" means an operation or set of operations performed on personal data, including the collection, use, storage, disclosure, analysis, deletion or modification of personal data.
4 5	19. Processor. "Processor" means a person that processes personal data on behalf of <u>a controller.</u>
6 7 8 9	20. Profiling. "Profiling" means any form of solely automated process performed on personal data to evaluate, analyze or predict personal aspects related to an identified or identifiable individual's economic situation, health, personal preferences, interests, reliability, behavior, location or movements.
10 11 12 13	21. Protected health information. "Protected health information" has the same meaning as in the regulations, rules, guidance and exemptions adopted pursuant to the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, 42 United States Code, Chapter 7, Subchapter XI, Part C.
14 15 16 17 18	22. Pseudonymous data. "Pseudonymous data" means personal data that cannot be attributed to a specific individual without the use of additional information, as long as the additional information is kept separately from the personal data and is subject to appropriate technical and organizational measures to ensure that the personal data is not attributed to an identified or identifiable individual.
19 20	23. Publicly available information. "Publicly available information" means information that:
21 22	A. Is lawfully made available to the general public through federal, state or local government records; or
23	B. Is lawfully made available to the general public through widely distributed media.
24 25 26	24. Sale of personal data. "Sale of personal data" means the exchange of personal data for monetary or other valuable consideration by the controller to a 3rd party. "Sale of personal data" does not include:
27 28	A. The disclosure of personal data to a processor that processes the personal data on behalf of the controller;
29 30	B. The disclosure of personal data to a 3rd party for purposes of providing a product or service requested by the consumer;
31	C. The disclosure or transfer of personal data to an affiliate of the controller;
32 33	D. The disclosure of personal data when the consumer directs the controller to disclose the personal data or intentionally uses the controller to interact with a 3rd party;
34	E. The disclosure of personal data that the consumer:
35 36	(1) Intentionally made available to the general public via a channel of mass media; and
37	(2) Did not restrict to a specific audience; or
38 39 40 41	F. The disclosure or transfer of personal data to a 3rd party as an asset that is part of a merger, acquisition, bankruptcy or other transaction, or a proposed merger, acquisition, bankruptcy or other transaction, in which the 3rd party assumes control of all or part of the controller's assets.

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1	25. Sensitive data. "Sensitive data" means personal data that includes:
2 3 4	A. Data revealing racial or ethnic origins, religious beliefs, medical history, mental or physical health conditions, diagnoses made by a medical professional, sexual orientation or citizenship or immigration status;
5	B. Genetic or biometric data:
6	C. Personal data collected from a consumer known to be a child;
7	D. Precise geolocation data;
8 9 10	E. A social security number, driver's license number or nondriver identification card number, except that "sensitive data" does not include the last 4 digits of a social security number, driver's license number or nondriver identification card number;
11 12 13	F. A consumer's account number, log-in information, financial account number or credit or debit card number that, in combination with any required security code, access code or password, permits access to a consumer's financial account; or
14 15 16	G. Data concerning an individual's status as a victim of a crime. For the purposes of this paragraph, "victim" has the same meaning as in Title 17-A, section 2101, subsection 2.
17 18 19 20 21	26. Targeted advertising. "Targeted advertising" means displaying an advertisement to a consumer when the advertisement is selected based on personal data obtained or inferred from that consumer's activities over time and across nonaffiliated publicly accessible websites or online applications to predict that consumer's preferences or interests. "Targeted advertising" does not include:
22 23	<u>A.</u> Advertisements based on activities within a controller's own publicly accessible websites or online applications;
24 25	<u>B.</u> Advertisements based on the context of a consumer's current search query, visit to a publicly accessible website or online application:
26 27	C. Advertisements directed to a consumer in response to the consumer's request for information or feedback; or
28 29	D. Processing personal data solely to measure or report advertising frequency, performance or reach.
30 31	27. Trade secret. "Trade secret" has the same meaning as in section 1542, subsection <u>4</u> .
32	<u>§9603. Scope</u>
33 34 35 36	1. Applicability; July 1, 2026 to December 31, 2027. From July 1, 2026 to December 31, 2027, the provisions of this chapter apply to persons that conduct business in this State or persons that produce products or services that are targeted to residents of this State and that during the preceding calendar year:
37 38 39	A. Controlled or processed the personal data of not less than 100,000 consumers, excluding personal data controlled or processed solely for the purpose of completing a payment transaction; or
40 41	B. Controlled or processed the personal data of not less than 25,000 consumers and derived more than 25% of gross revenue from the sale of personal data.

A consumer may designate an authorized agent in accordance with section 9605 to exercise the rights of the consumer to opt out of the processing of the consumer's personal data as specified in subsection 1, paragraph E, subparagraphs (1) and (2). In the case of processing personal data of a consumer known to be a child, the parent or legal guardian may exercise consumer rights on the child's behalf. The controller bears the burden of demonstrating the manifestly unfounded, excessive or repetitive nature of the request.

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SUMMARY

14 This amendment, which is the minority report of the committee, replaces the bill and 15 changes the title.

16 The amendment enacts the Maine Consumer Data Privacy Act, which takes effect July 17 1, 2026. The Act regulates the collection, use, processing, disclosure, sale and deletion of 18 nonpublicly available personal data that is linked or reasonably linkable to an individual 19 who is a resident of the State, referred to in the Act as a "consumer," or that is linked or 20 reasonably linkable to an identifiable consumer's device, by a person that conducts business 21 in this State or that produces products or services targeted to residents of this State, referred 22 to in the Act as a "controller." Under the Act, a controller must limit the collection of 23 personal data to what is adequate, relevant and reasonably necessary in relation to the 24 purposes for which the controller processes that data, as disclosed in a privacy notice 25 specifying the categories of personal data processed by the controller, the purposes for 26 processing the personal data, the categories of personal data transferred to 3rd parties and 27 the categories of 3rd parties to whom personal data is shared. The controller must also process the minimum amount of personal data reasonably necessary, adequate or relevant 28 29 for each disclosed processing purpose.

30 A consumer has the right, under the Act, to confirm whether a controller is processing the consumer's personal data; to require the controller to correct inaccuracies in or delete 31 32 the consumer's personal data; to obtain a copy of the consumer's personal data; and to opt 33 out of the processing of the consumer's personal data for purposes of targeted advertising, 34 sale or profiling in furtherance of decisions about the consumer's access to financial or 35 lending services, housing, insurance, education, criminal justice, employment opportunities, health care services and essential goods and services. The privacy notice 36 must describe how a consumer may exercise these rights. The controller must obtain the 37 38 affirmative, informed consent of a consumer before processing the consumer's sensitive 39 data, including data revealing the consumer's race or ethnic origins, religious beliefs, 40 medical history or mental or physical health conditions or diagnoses, sexual orientation or 41 citizenship or immigration status; genetic or biometric data; precise geolocation data; data of a known child who has not attained 13 years of age; social security, driver's license or 42 43 nondriver identification card number; information that permits access to a consumer's 44 financial account; or data concerning the consumer's status as the victim of a crime. If the

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1 controller knows that the consumer has not attained 13 years of age, the controller may not 2 process the consumer's data for any purpose without parental consent. If the controller 3 knows or willfully disregards that the consumer is at least 13 years of age but has not 4 attained 16 years of age, the controller may not process the consumer's data for targeted 5 advertising and must obtain the consumer's consent before processing the consumer's data 6 for sale.

7 The Act prohibits a controller from processing data in a manner that discriminates 8 against a person in violation of state or federal law. A controller is also prohibited from retaliating against a consumer for exercising the consumer's rights under the Act, except 9 that a controller may offer different prices or selection of goods in connection with a 10 consumer's voluntary participation in a bona fide loyalty or discount program. A controller 11 must establish, implement and maintain reasonable data security practices. Beginning July 12 13 1, 2026, if a controller engages in a data processing activity that presents a heightened risk of harm to a consumer, including processing any data for targeted advertising, sale or 14 profiling or any processing of sensitive data, the controller must conduct and document a 15 data protection assessment to identify and weigh the benefits and potential risks of the 16 processing activity. The controller may be required to disclose the data protection 17 assessment to the Attorney General, who must keep it confidential, when the assessment is 18 19 relevant to an investigation conducted by the Attorney General.

20 The provisions of the Act do not apply to specifically enumerated persons, including the State, political subdivisions of the State and federally recognized Indian tribes in the 21 State; financial institutions or their affiliates subject to the federal Gramm-Leach-Bliley 22 23 Act; state-licensed and authorized insurers; covered entities and business associates subject to the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996; motor vehicle 24 dealer franchisees; nonprofits that do not receive any revenue from the sale of personal data 25 or that detect and prevent fraudulent insurance acts; and persons that both processed the 26 personal data of fewer than 25,000 consumers in the preceding calendar year and derived 27 28 no more than 25% of gross revenue from the sale of personal data. The Act also does not apply to persons that controlled or processed the personal data for purposes other than 29 completing payment transactions of fewer than 100,000 consumers in the preceding 30 31 calendar year, except that, beginning January 1, 2028, this exception applies only to persons that controlled or processed the personal data for purposes other than completing payment 32 33 transactions of fewer than 50,000 consumers in the preceding calendar year.

34 In addition, the provisions of the Act do not apply to specifically enumerated types of data, including: nonpublic personal information regulated under the federal Gramm-Leach-35 Bliley Act; health care information protected under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, 36 37 section 1711-C; protected health information under the federal Health Insurance Portability 38 and Accountability Act of 1996; personal data regulated by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974; data processed and maintained by the controller regarding an 39 40 applicant for employment or employee to the extent the data is collected and used within 41 the context of that role; and data necessary for the controller to administer benefits. The Maine Consumer Data Privacy Act also does not prohibit controllers from engaging in 42 specifically enumerated activities, including complying with state or federal law; 43 complying with investigations or subpoenas from governmental authorities including the 44 Federal Government and the government of a state or a federally recognized Indian tribe 45 46 in the State; cooperating with federal, state or tribal law enforcement agencies; providing

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a product or service specifically requested by the consumer; protecting life and physical
 safety of consumers and preventing or responding to security incidents; and conducting
 internal product research, effectuating a product recall or performing other internal
 operations aligned with the expectations of a consumer.

5 Violations of the Act may be enforced exclusively by the Attorney General under the Maine Unfair Trade Practices Act. The Attorney General is required to provide a potential 6 defendant with at least 30 days' notice prior to initiating an enforcement action, during 7 which time the potential defendant may cure any violation alleged in the notice. Any civil 8 penalties, attorney's fees or costs awarded to the State for a violation of the Act must be 9 10 deposited in the Maine Privacy Fund, which is established to provide funding for the enforcement staff and activities of the Department of the Attorney General. The Act further 11 requires the Attorney General to submit a report by February 1, 2027 to the joint standing 12 committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over judiciary matters regarding the 13 operation and implementation of the Act. The committee may report out legislation related 14 to the report to the 133rd Legislature in 2027. 15

16 The amendment also repeals the current law governing the privacy of broadband 17 Internet access service customer personal information because broadband Internet access 18 service providers are subject to the provisions of the Act.
