4 5	2-A. Membership. The board consists of the Governor, or the Governor's designee, and, at a minimum, the following members:
6 7 8 9	A. Representatives from business and industry, representatives from organized labor and representatives of other interests as determined by the Governor. These appointments are subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over labor matters and confirmation by the Legislature; and
10	B. The following ex officio members:
11	(1) County commissioners designated by local boards appointed by the Governor;
12	(2) The Commissioner of Labor or the commissioner's designee;
13	(3) The Commissioner of Education or the commissioner's designee;
14 15	(4) The Commissioner of Economic and Community Development or the commissioner's designee; and
16 17	(5) Other state, county or municipal officials as the Governor considers necessary appointed by the Governor.
18 19 20	The appointments of these members are not subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over labor matters or confirmation by the Legislature.
21 22 23 24	Appointments must be consistent with the representation requirements of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act. The Governor shall ensure that the board has sufficient expertise to effectively carry out the duties and functions of the board. Members must represent diverse geographic areas of the State, including urban, rural and suburban areas.

The standing committees shall make recommendations to the full board. The 6 standing committees are as follows: 37 38 (1) Younger workers; 39 (2) Commission on Disability and Employment; 40 (3) Women's employment issues; 41 (4) Older workers:

(3) Conduct educational programs considered necessary to promote public

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(5) Veterans employment; and
(6) The Program Partners Committee. Organizations with representation on the Program Partners Committee may include, but are not limited to, organizations that conduct programs or activities as specified in Section 121(b)(1)(B) of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act.
B. The board may create committees in addition to those in paragraph A to address specific problems and issues. These committees shall make recommendations to the full board.
D. The standing committees under paragraph A committee established pursuant to this subsection may receive and accept, from any source, allocations, appropriations, loans grants and contributions of money or other things of value to be held, used or applied to carry out this section, subject to the conditions upon which the loans, grants and contributions may be made, including, but not limited to, appropriations, allocations loans, grants or gifts from a private source, federal agency or governmental subdivision of the State or its agencies.
SUMMARY
This bill changes the State Workforce Board's committee structure by removing provisions setting out named committees and replacing them with language giving the board authority to create committees as necessary. It also allows the Governor's designed to serve as a member of the board.
