4	<u>§9404. Maine Connectivity Authority</u>		
5 6 7 8 9	<b>1. Establishment; membership.</b> The Maine Connectivity Authority is established as a body corporate and politic and a public instrumentality of the State, and the exercise by the authority of the powers conferred by this chapter is deemed and held to be the performance of essential governmental functions. The authority consists of the following members:		
10 11	A. Seven voting members appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Legislature as follows:		
12 13 14	(1) Three members who possess expertise in advanced communications technology infrastructure or communications service, including, but not limited to, expertise in network design, network operations and middle mile infrastructure;		
15	(2) One member representing communities in the State;		
16 17 18	(3) One member who possesses expertise in banking or financial lending, including, but not limited to, expertise in the provision of loans or other capital investments for infrastructure deployment in the State;		
19	(4) One member who possesses expertise in education system needs; and		
20 21	(5) One member who possesses expertise in telehealth delivery and telehealth system needs; and		
22	B. Four ex officio voting members as follows:		
23 24	(1) The Commissioner of Economic and Community Development or the commissioner's designee;

Members appointed by the Governor serve 3-year terms, except that 2 such members first appointed serve a one-year term, 2 such members first appointed serve a 2-year term and 3 such members first appointed serve a 3-year term. Members appointed by the Governor are eligible for reappointment. If a member appointed by the Governor fails to serve until the expiration of the member's term, the Governor may appoint a replacement member for the remainder of that member's term. The Governor shall appoint one member to serve as chair of the authority.		
37 38 39 40 41	<b>3. President.</b> Upon the recommendation of the authority, the Governor shall appoint a president of the authority subject to confirmation by the Legislature. The president serves a 4-year term and is eligible for reappointment. The president shall manage the authority's programs, services and staff and shall perform other duties the authority considers appropriate.		

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4. Officers; quorum. The authority may elect a secretary and a treasurer, who may
 but need not be members of the authority. Six members of the authority constitute a
 quorum, and the affirmative vote of 6 members is necessary for any action taken by the
 authority.

5. Remote participation by members. A member of the authority may participate in
 a meeting of the authority and place a vote electronically or telephonically as long as
 members of the public have an opportunity to listen to the deliberations and otherwise
 participate in or observe the proceedings of the authority.

9 6. Members not personally liable; indemnification. A member of the authority, 10 while acting within the scope of this chapter, is not subject to any personal liability resulting from the exercise or carrying out of any of the authority's purposes or powers. Each 11 12 member of the authority must be indemnified by the authority against expenses actually 13 and necessarily incurred by the member in connection with the defense of any action or 14 proceeding in which the member is made a party by reason of being or having been a 15 member of the authority and against any final judgment rendered against the member in that action or proceeding. 16

**7. Conflicts.** A member of the authority may not participate in any decision on any
 contract entered into by the authority under this chapter if that member has any interest,
 direct or indirect, in any firm, partnership, corporation or association that is party to the
 contract. The interest must be disclosed to the authority in writing and must be set forth in
 the minutes of the authority.

### 22 §9405. Powers and duties of authority

To carry out the purposes of this chapter, the authority has the following powers with
 respect to a project together with all powers incidental to or necessary or proper for the
 performance of these powers and for carrying out its responsibilities in accordance with
 this chapter:

**1. Power to sue and be sued.** To sue or initiate or appear in any proceeding. The
 authority may be sued on its written contracts or to the extent permitted by Title 1, section
 409; Title 5, chapter 375; or Title 14, chapter 741;

2. Official seal. To adopt and have an official seal and alter the seal at pleasure;

31 3. Bylaws; rules. To adopt bylaws and any rule necessary or useful for carrying out
 32 any of the authority's powers or duties pursuant to this chapter. Rules adopted pursuant to
 33 this subsection are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter
 34 2-A;

35 4. Acquire real or personal property. To acquire real or personal property or any 36 interest in real or personal property, including rights or easements, on either a temporary 37 or long-term basis by gift, purchase, transfer, foreclosure, lease or otherwise; to improve, 38 hold, sell with or without public bidding, assign, lease, rent, encumber, mortgage or 39 otherwise dispose of any real or personal property, any interest in real or personal property 40 or mortgage interests owned or in its control, custody or possession; and to release or 41 relinquish any right, title claim, lien, interest, easement or demand, however acquired, 42 including upon threat of foreclosure;

43 5. Prepare and plan projects and facilities. To prepare or cause to be prepared plans,
 44 specifications, designs and estimates of costs for the construction and equipping of a project

To lease or rent any facilities or equipment for a project for such amounts as the 5 authority determines to a communications service provider to further the purposes of this 6 chapter, as long as the obligation of the service provider is considered a binding contract 7 with the authority and as long as no liability on account of the authority may be incurred 8 beyond the money available for that purpose or may be considered a liability of the State; 9 **18.** Investments. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, to invest any funds 10 not needed for immediate use, including any funds held in reserve, in property or in securities in which fiduciaries in the State may legally invest funds; 11 12 **19.** Use of revenues. To use only for the purposes of this chapter any revenues derived 13 by the authority from any assessment, transfer of funds, lease, assignment, rental agreement 14 or other disposition or any other revenue; 15 **Appearances.** To appear on the authority's own behalf before boards, commissions, departments or agencies of a municipality, the State or the United States; 16 17 21. Employees. To hire and compensate employees as well as consulting engineers, 18 architects, attorneys, accountants and construction and financial experts and such other 19 individuals as may be necessary in the authority's judgment; and 20 22. All acts granted or implied. To do any act necessary or convenient to exercise 21 the powers granted in this chapter or reasonably implied by this chapter. 22 **§9406. Issuance of bonds** 23 **1.** Conclusive authorization. All bonds of the authority must be conclusively presumed to be fully authorized and issued under the laws of the State, and any person or 24 25 governmental unit is estopped from questioning their authorization, sale, issuance, 26 execution or delivery by the authority. 27 2. Maturity; interest. The securities of each issue of bonds must be dated, must mature at a time or times not exceeding 30 years from their date and must bear interest at 28 29 a rate or rates determined by the authority. At the option of the authority, the bonds may be 30 made redeemable before maturity at a price or prices and under terms and conditions fixed 31 prior to their issuance. 32 **3.** Form. The authority shall determine the form of the bonds, including any attached 33 interest coupons, the manner of execution of the bonds, the denomination or denominations 34 of the bonds and the place or places for payment of principal and interest, which may be at 35 any financial institution within or without the State. Bonds must be executed in the name 36 of the authority by the manual or facsimile signature of the authorized official or officials. 37 Signatures and facsimiles of signatures on bonds are valid for all purposes even if the 38 authorized official ceases to hold office before delivery of the bonds. The bonds may be 39 issued in coupon or registered form or both as the authority may determine. In addition to 40 this subsection, the authority may provide for transfer of registration of its registered bonds 41 by book entry on the records of the entity designated for that purpose and may enter into 42 such contractual arrangements as may be necessary to accomplish these purposes. In the 43 event a book entry method of transfer is used, principal of and interest on those registered

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bonds must be payable to the registered owner shown in the book entry or the legal
 representatives, successors or transferees of the registered owner.

3 4. Sale. The authority may sell the bonds at a public or private sale, in a manner and
 4 at a price it determines is in the best interest of the authority.

5 5. Credit not pledged. Bonds of the authority do not constitute any debt or liability 6 of the State or of any municipality in the State or any political subdivision of the State, or 7 of the authority or a pledge of the faith and credit of the State or of any such municipality 8 or political subdivision, but are payable solely from the revenues of the project or projects 9 for which they are issued or from other eligible collateral or the revenues or proceeds of 10 other eligible collateral pledged to the payment of the bonds and all such bonds must contain on their face a statement to that effect. The issuance of the bonds does not directly 11 12 or indirectly or contingently obligate the State or any municipality or political subdivision 13 to levy or to pledge any form of taxation or to make any appropriation for their payment.

6. Anticipatory borrowing. In anticipation of the sale of bonds, the authority may
 issue temporary notes and renewal notes, the total stated amount of which does not exceed
 at any one time outstanding the authorized amount of the bonds. The period of such
 anticipatory borrowing may not exceed 5 years and the time within which the bonds are to
 become due may not be extended by the anticipatory borrowing beyond the term permitted
 by this section.

### 20 §9407. Tax exemptions; taxable bonds

21 **1. Bonds exempt from taxation.** Bonds of the authority constitute a proper public 22 purpose and the bonds, their transfer and the income from them, including any profits made 23 on their sale, must at all times be exempt from taxation within the State, whether or not 24 those bonds, their transfer or the income from them, including any profits made on their 25 sale, are subject to taxation under the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as 26 amended.

27 2. Conveyances, leases, mortgages, deeds of trust and trust indentures exempt
 28 from taxation. Conveyances by or to the authority and leases, mortgages and deeds of
 29 trust or trust indentures by or to the authority are exempt from all taxation by the State or
 30 any of its political subdivisions, including, but not limited to, any applicable license, excise
 31 or other taxes imposed in respect of the privilege of engaging in any of the activities in
 32 which the authority may engage.

33 3. Property exempt from taxation and other assessments. Property acquired, held
 34 or transferred by the authority is exempt from all taxes and from betterments and special
 35 assessments of the city, town, county, State or any political subdivision of the State. The
 36 authority may agree to make payments in lieu of taxes to the applicable political
 37 subdivisions.

4. Taxable bonds. The authority is authorized to agree and consent to the inclusion
 of interest on any of its bonds, under the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1986 or
 any subsequent corresponding internal revenue law of the United States, in the gross
 income of the holders of any such bonds to the same extent and in the same manner that
 the interest on bills, bonds, notes or other obligations of the United States is includable in
 the gross income of the holders of such bills, bonds, notes or other obligations under the
 United States Internal Revenue Code of 1986 or any such subsequent law.

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#### 1 §9408. Collection of data

2 <u>Subject to the provisions of this section, the authority may collect data from</u> 3 <u>communications service providers and any wireless providers that own or operate advanced</u> 4 <u>communications technology infrastructure in the State concerning infrastructure</u> 5 <u>deployment and costs, revenues and subscribership.</u>

6 1. Confidential information. If the authority, on its own or upon request of any 7 person or entity, determines that public access to specific information about 8 communications service providers or wireless providers in the State could compromise the 9 security of public utility systems to the detriment of the public interest or that specific 10 information is of a competitive or proprietary nature, the authority shall issue an order that sets forth its designation of the information as confidential. Information that may be 11 12 designated as confidential pursuant to this subsection includes, but is not limited to, 13 network diagrams. The authority may designate information as confidential under this 14 subsection only to the minimum extent necessary to protect the public interest and the 15 legitimate competitive or proprietary interests of a communications service provider or a wireless provider. The authority may not designate any information as confidential under 16 17 this subsection until it has adopted rules to implement this subsection.

18 Information designated as confidential under this subsection is not a public record under
 19 <u>Title 1, section 402, subsection 3.</u>

20 2. Protection of information. A communications service provider or a wireless 21 provider may request that information provided to the authority that the provider requests 22 be designated as confidential under subsection 1 not be viewed by those members of the 23 authority who could gain a competitive advantage from viewing the information. Upon 24 such a request, the authority shall ensure that the information provided is viewed only by 25 those members of the authority and staff who do not stand to gain a competitive advantage 26 and that there are adequate safeguards to protect that information from members of the 27 authority who could gain a competitive advantage from viewing the information.

### 28 §9409. Legislative oversight; report to committee

**1.** Annual report. No later than January 15, 2022, and annually thereafter, the
 authority shall provide a report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having
 jurisdiction over utilities matters that:

- A. Includes a report on the budget of the authority;
- B. Documents the activities of the authority, including a detailed description of the
  progress toward the state connectivity goals in section 9403;
- 35 C. Contains a listing of any investments of money in the authority, while maintaining
  36 confidentiality for organizations working with the authority; and
- D. Contains an analysis of the availability of communications services and advanced
  communications technology infrastructure, including an analysis of the competitive
  market in the State for communications services and advanced communications
  technology infrastructure and whether the communications services provided in the
  State are reasonably comparable to services provided regionally and nationwide.

  2. Sunset review. As part of the report required under subsection 1 to be submitted
  43 to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over utilities matters

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- no later than January 15, 2030, the authority shall include findings and recommendations 1 following its review of the effectiveness of the authority in furthering the purposes of this 2 3 chapter, including: 4 A. An analysis of whether the authority has fulfilled its intended purpose under this chapter; 5 6 B. An analysis of whether the activities of the authority should continue for a specified 7 period of time and any recommendations, including proposed legislation, for changes to the powers and duties of the authority to better further the purposes of this chapter; 8 9 and C. Liberal construction 19 This chapter, being necessary for the welfare of the State and its inhabitants, must be liberally construed. In the event of any conflict between this chapter and any other law, 20 this chapter prevails, but the power and authority granted is deemed to be in addition to and 21 22 not in derogation of power and authority granted by any other law. 23 Maine Connectivity Authority; statutory review; report. In Sec. 4. 24 consultation with the ConnectMaine Authority established under the Maine Revised 25 Statutes, Title 35-A, section 9203, the Maine Connectivity Authority established under Title 35-A, section 9404 shall review the provisions of Title 35-A, chapters 93 and 94-A 26 27 and develop recommendations for any necessary changes to either chapter to facilitate the oversight of the ConnectMaine Authority by the Maine Connectivity Authority, which may 28 29 include, but are not limited to, changes establishing the ConnectMaine Authority as a division of or other unit under the authority of the Maine Connectivity Authority, and any 30 31 other recommendations relating to the Maine Connectivity Authority or the ConnectMaine Authority. On or before January 15, 2022, the Maine Connectivity Authority shall submit 32 33 the recommendations resulting from that review, including any proposed legislation, to the 34 Joint Standing Committee on Energy, Utilities and Technology, which it may include in the report required under Title 35-A, section 9409, subsection 1. After reviewing the report, 35 36 the joint standing committee may report out related legislation to the 130th Legislature.' 37 Amend the bill by adding before the summary the following: 38 **'Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation 39 takes effect when approved.' 40 Amend the bill by relettering or renumbering any nonconsecutive Part letter or section 41 number to read consecutively.

#### **SUMMARY**

This amendment changes the title of and replaces the bill and adds an emergency preamble and emergency clause. It enacts the Connectivity Infrastructure Act, which, among other things, sets forth state connectivity goals and establishes the Maine Connectivity Authority to further those goals through the development and financing of connectivity projects and through other activities.

7 The amendment also directs the Maine Connectivity Authority, in consultation with 8 the ConnectMaine Authority, to review the provisions of the Maine Revised Statutes 9 pertaining to each entity and develop recommendations for any necessary changes to those provisions to facilitate the oversight of the ConnectMaine Authority by the Maine 10 11 Connectivity Authority and any other recommendations. The Maine Connectivity 12 Authority is directed to submit such recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on Energy, Utilities and Technology on or before January 13 14 15, 2022. After reviewing the recommendations, the joint standing committee may report out related legislation to the 130th Legislature. 15
