RE: Recommendations on the Governor's Proposed Supplemental Budget, LD 2214

On February 27, 2024, the Joint Standing Committee on Veterans and Legal Affairs reviewed the items in the Governor's proposed supplemental budget pertaining to the agencies under the committee's jurisdiction. Senator Timberlake and Representatives Andrews and Hymes were absent from the work session and Representatives Montell and Boyer were absent for portions of the work session. All other members were present for the entirety. Please find attached the supplemental budget report-back document, which indicates the committee's vote on each initiative and language part.

The committee did not take a vote on the following initiatives, as they are under the jurisdiction of the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government.

1. Ref. \#790: This initiative establishes 3 Office Specialist II positions and provides funding for related All Other costs.
2. Ref. \#795: This initiative provides funding for leased space to relocate the Division of Corporations, Uniform Commercial Code, and Commissions staff.

The following initiatives were supported unanimously by those present:

1. Ref. \#35: This initiative provides funding for the approved reclassification of 12 Field Investigator positions to OCP Compliance Inspector positions effective June 22, 2022 and for the approved reorganization of 4 Field Investigator positions to OCP Compliance Inspector positions. This initiative also provides funding for related All Other costs in the Other Special Revenue Funds.
2. Ref. \#185 \& \#186: This initiative provides funding for the approved reorganization of one Carpenter position to a Building Maintenance Coordinator position and transfers the position from General Fund to Federal Expenditures Fund within the same program.
3. Ref. \#187: This initiative provides funding for the approved reclassification of one Environmental Specialist III position to a Public Service Coordinator I position, retroactive to January 27, 2023.
4. Ref. \#188: This initiative provides funding for the approved reclassification of one Oil \& Hazardous Material Specialist II position to a Public Service Coordinator I position, retroactive to February 8, 2023.
5. Ref. \#770: This initiative adjusts funding to align with revenue changes approved in the December 2023 Revenue Forecast.

A majority of the committee present voted to approve the remaining initiatives and language parts R and S, except for the following initiatives, which a majority of those members present oppose:

1. Ref. \#11 \& \#12: This initiative provides funding for the approved range change of 12 Liquor Licensing Inspector positions from range 22 to range 25 effective June 14, 2022 and transfers All Other to Personal Services to fund the reclassifications in the Alcoholic Beverage Fund.
2. Ref. \#32: This initiative provides funding for the approved reclassification of 12 Field Investigator positions to OCP Compliance Inspector positions effective June 22, 2022 and for the approved reorganization of 4 Field Investigator positions to OCP Compliance Inspector positions. This initiative also provides funding for related All Other costs in the Other Special Revenue Funds.

Additionally, of the committee members present at the time of the work session, all except for Representative Rudnicki voted to include in the supplemental budget an ongoing appropriation of $\$ 140,000$ to the Department of Health and Human Services in order to establish two military sexual trauma liaisons at community-based organization. Senator Timberlake and Representatives Andrews, Boyer and Hymes were absent.

This appropriation was included in the majority committee amendment to LD 1783, but was removed in a subsequent Senate amendment before being enacted as Public Law 2023, chapter 474. The committee voted unanimously to include this language in a committee bill pursuant to the annual report on Sexual Assault and Harassment in the Maine National Guard (LR 3317) as well. Senator Timberlake and Representatives Andrews and Hymes were not present at the time of the vote on the committee bill. The language for the committee bill is included.

Thank you for your consideration of the recommendations of the Joint Standing Committee on Veterans and Legal Affairs.

## Justification:

## Justification:

This establishes a limited-period Public Service Coordinator I to serve as an Election Security Navigator to aid municipalities in establishing a baseline of cybersecurity protections for elections security. ## PART R SUMMARY

This Part continues one-time funding for environmental closure activity costs at the former Maine Military Authority site in Limestone. Two sequential contracts are required to first, conduct a full background investigation and sampling plan and second, use the results of the first contract to develop remedial actions plans. Given the environmental and weather conditions of Northern Maine, the investigation and sampling plan will not be complete until late spring. As the second contract "Statement of Work" is reliant on the results of the investigation and sampling, there will not be enough time left in fiscal year 2023-24 to complete and award this portion of closure activity. Therefore, a portion of the $\$ 400,000$ provided under PL 2021, chapter 398 will be needed in fiscal year 2024-25.

This Part requires the transfer of $\$ 75,000$ in fiscal year 2023-24 from the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to the Maine Military Reserve Fund to settle outstanding obligations of the Maine Military Authority.
