CALL TO ORDER

President Thibodeau called the April 28, 2016 meeting of the Legislative Council to order at 1:53 p.m. in the Legislative Council Chamber.

President Thibodeau convened the meeting at 1:53 p.m. with a quorum of members present.

SUMMARY OF March 24, 2016 MEETING OF LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

Motion: That the Meeting Summary for March 24, 2016 be accepted and placed on file. Motion by Senator Alfond. Second by Representative Fredette. Motion passed unanimous (9-0-0-1, with Senator Cushing absent).

REPORTS FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND COUNCIL OFFICES

Executive Director's Report

Grant Pennoyer, Executive Director, reported on:

1. Status of Major Construction Projects for this Interim

- State House Roof Work to replace the EPDM (rubber) roof on the north wing of the State House has begun and will continue through the end of June. The project will then shift to the south wing in July.
- House Chamber Repairs of water damage and other improvements in the House Chamber will begin toward the end of June and are expected to end in late September or early October.
- State Street Sidewalk The replacement of the State Street sidewalk will begin shortly after the selection of the contractor or contractors for this project. Bids are currently under review.
- 2. Heating and Cooling System Repairs

The State House has experienced a number of leaks in the heating and cooling system towards the tail end of the heating system. Most of the areas affected are in the West Wing and include: the Legislative Council Chamber, the Governor's Office, staff offices in the Governor's Office, the House Republican Office, the Welcome Center, the kitchenette of the Clerk's Office and the Document Room. Repairs are currently in process for many of these areas. Work in the Legislative Council Chamber will begin Saturday, which will make the Council Chamber unavailable for much of May.

3. Original Copper from the State House Dome

We made a final marketing effort by email to Legislators and Legislative Staff recently as we are reaching the end of the lease of the secure storage facility. The State House Facilities Committee discussed options for the remaining copper in the storage facility.

4. Electric Vehicle Charging Stations

The Capitol Planning Commission recently voted to approve signage for the placement of the electric vehicle charging stations in the Parking Garage. This was the last hurdle in a very long effort led by the Greater Portland Council of Governments to get some charging station located at the Capitol complex. Two parking spots against the inside wall immediately inside the Chamberlain Street entrance will have charging units installed and be reserved for electric vehicles.

Fiscal Report

Grant Pennoyer, Executive Director, on behalf of OFPR Director Christopher Nolan, reported on:

Total General Fund Revenue - FY 2016 (\$'s in Millions)

General Fund revenue was under budget by \$15.5 million (6.9%) for the month of March but over budget by \$10.9 million (0.5%) for the fiscal year through March. These variances now reflect the March revenue forecast, which increased budgeted revenue for FY 16 by \$67.3 million.

Individual income tax revenue was \$4.3 million under budget for both the month of March and the fiscal year through March. Most of the negative variance was from withholding payments. Withholding payments will slow through the remainder of the fiscal year due to the tax cut enacted in the biennial budget. Refunds were also under budget for the month (more refunds paid out than budgeted). Sales and use tax revenue was over budget by \$4.5 million for the month and over budget by \$7.2 million for the fiscal year to date. February taxable sales (March revenue) increased by 11% over last year. Corporate income tax revenue was under budget by \$2.5 million for March but over budget by \$1.6 million for the fiscal year to date due mainly to refunds.

Highway Fund revenue was over budget by \$1.3 million (5.6%) for the month of March and over budget by \$2.9 million (1.2%) for the fiscal year through March. These positive variances now reflect the March revenue forecast, which increased budgeted revenue for FY 16 by \$2.5 million. Fuel taxes were under budget for the month of March by \$0.2 million but over budget for the fiscal year to date by \$0.4 million. Motor vehicle registration and fees were over budget by \$1.7 million for the month of March and over budget by \$2.1 million for the fiscal year to date.

Cash Balances Update

The average balance in the cash pool in March dropped to \$734.3 million from \$840.6 million in February. March is usually the low point for cash balances in the fiscal year, before the usual recovery in late April from income tax payments. March's total cash balances were still well above both last year's balances for March and the ten-year average for March. General Fund internal borrowing from other funds was \$29.8 million in March, This was only the third time this fiscal year such borrowing was necessary and the amount was well below historical levels for March. The average Highway Fund balance of \$46.6 million in March increased slightly from February's average of \$40.0 million but was below last year's balance for March of \$56.2 million.

Tobacco Settlement Payments

On April 18th, the State received its first 2015 tobacco settlement payment totaling \$51.8 million that accrues to the Fund for a Healthy Maine (FHM) - \$49.4 million was budgeted. It is not known if additional payments will be received.

REPORTS FROM COUNCIL COMMITTEES

1. Personnel Committee

Speaker Eves reported that the Personnel Committee held a meeting earlier today to consider the following matters:

1. Reclassification of a Position in the Revisor of Statutes office

Mr. Pennoyer reviewed with the committee a request for a position reclassification in the Office of the Revisor of Statues. The committee voted unanimously to recommend this request to the Legislative Council for approval.

Motion: That upon the unanimous recommendation of the Personnel Committee, the Legislative Council approve the Executive Director's proposed reclassification of one position in the Office of the Revisor of Statutes. Motion by Speaker Eves. Second by Senator Mason. **Motion passed unanimous (9-0-0-1**, with Senator Cushing absent).

2. Request for Temporary Disability Benefits for Nonpartisan Employee

The committee considered a request by the legislative employee for temporary disability income benefits. The request was consistent with the provisions for temporary disability income benefits under the Legislative Council's personnel policies and guidelines. Upon the recommendation of the Executive Director, the committee voted unanimously to approve the request. No Legislative Council action is required.

3. Discussion about Committee Clerk Hiring Process

The committee reviewed the current Committee Clerk hiring process. No action required by the Legislative Council at this time.

2. State House Facilities Committee

Senator Mason reported the State House Facilities Committee met earlier today to consider the following items.

1. Video and audio recordings of Legislative Proceedings

As directed at the last Council meeting, the committee reviewed the contract with Sliq Media Technology that provides video and audio recording and archiving of Legislative proceedings and found that it provided sufficient control of the recordings to the Legislature and was a good value assuming the Legislature planned to use all of the services in the contract.

The committee decided that it had no issues with the recording and archiving of House and Senate proceedings and making these recording available upon request. This issue will be discussed further under Old Business.

The committee once again continued its discussion of whether or not to continue recording committee meetings. Some committee members still had concerns about recording of committee meetings. The committee discussed copyrighting and having a disclaimer for the use of the recordings and that there needs to be better notification of the public about the

broadcasting and recording of committee meetings. Ultimately, the committee decided to table this discussion regarding recording and archiving of committee meetings for a future meeting.

2. Tartan Stone Proposal for the State of Maine

The committee approved a request by a California sculptor for some pieces of copper from the State House dome and for a small piece of scrap granite cut from the end of a step in the old Capitol Park entrance that will be returned to the State as a gift of a Tartan Stone for Maine. The artist has been doing this for several states as is currently working on most of the New England states.

Motion: That upon the recommendation of the State House Facilities Committee, the Legislative Council authorizes the Executive Director to gift a piece of granite and some rough copper to stone artist, Frank Maurer, for the creation of the Maine Tartan Stone, the location of the finished stone to be determined. Motion by Senator Mason. Second by Representative McCabe. **Motion passed unanimous (9-0-0-1**, with Senator Cushing absent).

3. Options for Remaining Copper

The committee discussed options for the use of the remaining copper currently stored in the storage facility, the lease for which is ending in June. After recovering a little more than half the costs associated with foregoing the original salvage savings, the committee believes that the remaining copper should be salvaged.

Motion: That upon the recommendation of the State House Facilities Committee, the Legislative Council authorizes the Executive Director to salvage any rough copper remaining at the end of the lease for the storage unit. Motion by Senator Mason. Second by Senator Alfond. **Motion passed unanimous (9-0-0-1**, with Senator Cushing absent).

4. Updates from the Executive Director

Mr. Pennoyer presented updates of the status for the various facilities projects planned for this interim. The highlights of these updates were included in the Executive Director's Report presented earlier.

Item #1: Consideration of Bill Requests Tabled from October 22 and November 19

Item #4: Webcasts and Archived Files

Senator Mason continued the discussion of recording and archiving of Legislative Proceedings. He noted that the State House Facilities Committee recommend the use of video and audio recordings and video streaming of House and Senate sessions. Senator Mason also stated that the committee feels that more discussion is needed with the full Legislative Council on how to proceed with recordings of legislative committee meetings beginning with the 128th Legislature. Senator Hill suggested that the committee should invite the members of the Right To Know Advisory Committee to its meetings for their input on this subject. Representative Fredette asked after copyrighting the material recorded and also suggested that it would be a good idea to check on whether the immunity from prosecution/suit would still stand with recorded material.

Motion: That, upon the recommendation of the State House Facilities Committee, the Legislative Council approves the continued use of video and audio recordings of the House and Senate Legislative Proceedings available by request; further, the Legislative Council authorizes the video streaming of the House and Senate Legislative Proceedings and that the streaming is available on the legislative website; and further, the Legislative Council directs the Executive Director to explore the means to copyright the recorded and archived video files. Motion by Senator Mason. Second by Speaker Eves. **Motion passed unanimous (8-0-0-2**, with Senator Cushing and Representative Fredette absent).

NEW BUSINESS

Item #1: Consideration of After Deadline Bill Requests

The Legislative Council considered and voted on the bill requests in accordance with the established protocol. Of the 3 new bill requests and joint resolution, the council authorized 2 requests for introduction in the 2nd Regular Session of the 127th Legislature and 1 was tabled. The Legislative Council took no action on any previously tabled bill requests or joint resolutions, thus they remain tabled. The Legislative Council's actions on the requests are included on the attached list.
