History

- 1976 Unified State Courts (except Probate Courts)

The Chief Justice

- Prepares the JB budget
- Responsible for efficient operation of the branch
- Appoints the "Chiefs" of the Trial Courts



Clerks of Court

- •Significant duties prescribed by law
- Maintain records of civil and criminal cases
- Account for monies received
- Administer oaths
- Issue warrants
- •257 positions including VB & Service Center

State Court Administrator

- The SCA reports to the Chief Justice and manages the business affairs of the courts.
- The SCA heads the Administrative Office of the Courts. The AOC provides operational support to the courts.

Financial

FY 16 GF Expenditures- \$67.2 M, inc. \$10.3 M debt service

FY 16 Revenue Collected - \$36.6 M -- \$28.2 M to GF Approx 77% of revenue collected goes to the General Fund, balance to other agencies, highway fund, jail fund, MCJA; <6% to the Courts (Mediation, Foreclosure, Publications, Capital Improvements)

FY 17 GF Budget - - \$70.6 M, inc.\$10.6 M debt service Bienniel Budget submitted to Governor & approved by Legislature

Current Challenges

- Facilities 17 courthouses > 50 years old, including 12 > 100 years old-- 3 under construction
- Technology –Working to improve public service and access through technology
- CMS & E-Filing –contract planned 2016
- Security Insufficient entry screening
- More Legal Aid--Access to Justice for low & middle income unrepresented *civil* litigants



Jurors

- Drawn from drivers' license list
- Paid \$15/day (up from \$10/day)
- \$0.44/mile (up from 0.15/mile)
- Request for excusal to the trial judge
- Absolutely critical to the functioning of criminal & civil justice
