Executive Director's Report October 23, 2019

1. Bill Production System Project Update

The new Bill Production System to replace the MELD bill production system has fallen a few weeks behind schedule due to the complexity of the remaining components of the project and some complications with the migration of the statutes from MELD to the new system. With the migration of the statutes now completed, the Revisor's Office is focusing on entering all of last session's enacted laws affecting the statutes so that they can do their annual statute update and the new system will be fully updated. We are still hopeful to have the new Bill Production System fully functioning for the 2nd Regular Session. Some helpful, ease-of-use components, which are technically complex for the contractor, may not be available during the early stages of the drafting season.

2. NCSL Legislative Research Librarians Portland Conference

In September Maine hosted a professional development seminar of NCSL's Legislative Research Librarians group in Portland. The seminar includes a visit to Augusta and the State House on Tuesday, September 24th. Staff of the Law and Legislative Research Library helped NCSL organize the conference which went very well.

3. State House Café Reopening

The Business Enterprise Program within the Division of the Blind and Visually Impaired has found a new operator to take over the State House Café. Betty Baker, the mother of Lisa Baker (Assistant Sergeant of Arms in the House), will be the operator. She hopes to begin operations within a couple of weeks and will be operating as the Merrymeeting Café.

General Fund revenue was over budget by \$20.2 million (5.0%) for the month of September and by \$31.5 million (3.1%) for the fiscal year to date.

Individual income tax revenue was over budget by \$10.0 million for the month and by \$16.4 million for the fiscal year to date. Estimated individual income tax payments were over budget for the month by \$4.1 million while individual income tax withholdings were over budget by \$5.4 million. Corporate income tax revenue was over budget by \$9.0 million for the month but by only \$2.0 million for the fiscal year to date, with the September positive variance driven by estimated payments which were over budget by \$7.5 million for the month. The first quarterly estimated payments to be paid in FY 2020 were due in September. Sales and use tax revenue (August sales) was over budget for the month by \$2.6 million and by \$10.0 million for the fiscal year to date.

Highway Fund revenue was over budget by \$3.8 million (14.1%) for the month of September and by \$5.7 million (6.3%) for the fiscal year to date.

Fuel taxes were over budget by \$3.3 million for the month and by \$3.5 million for the fiscal year to date. Motor vehicle registrations and fees were over budget for the month by \$0.4 million and over budget for the fiscal year to date by \$2.1 million.

3. Cash Balances Update

The average balance in the cash pool for September was \$1,629.3 million, an increase from August's average of \$1,626.2 million and above both last September's average balance and the ten-year average for the month. The average Highway Fund balance of \$16.1 million in September was down from August's average of \$41.3 million as a result of strong construction season spending.

4. Revenue Forecasting - Next Steps

The Consensus Economic Forecasting Commission is scheduled to meet on October 25, 2019 to review and update its economic forecast for its required November 1, 2019 report, while the Revenue Forecasting Committee has scheduled November 25, 2019 for its meeting to review and update its revenue forecast to comply with its December 1, 2019 statutory reporting deadline.

The Task Force on Changes to the Maine Indian Claims Settlement Implementing Act, established pursuant to HP 1307, is tasked with making recommendations to the Legislature regarding potential changes to the Maine Indian Claims Settlement Act and the Micmac Settlement Act. The task force has now met on three occasions (July 22, August 9 and September 13) and is scheduled to meet again on October 21. The issues under consideration by the task force are complex and consequential, and require additional work in order for the Task Force to complete its mission. As such, the task force requests the following.

- 1. Permission for up to four additional meetings, beyond the four originally budgeted for. The Task Force is currently reviewing a proposal presented by tribal attorneys regarding changes to the Maine Indian Claims Settlement Act and requires more time to consider the impacts of the proposal.
- 2. Permission to hold one meeting at the Wabanaki Center at the University of Maine. The purpose of this off-site request is to hold a meeting at a location more convenient to many tribal members, who will be impacted by changes to the Settlement Acts. Costs are expected to be minimal.
- 3. Permission to enlist the assistance of the Indigenous Peoples Clinic at Suffolk Law to conduct research regarding the impact of proposals being considered by the Task Force. Costs anticipated include travel costs for the clinic director for two or three trips from Boston to Maine, and, if possible, an honorarium for the Law School in an amount to be determined by the Council.

Please accept this additional memo to supplement information regarding our pending request to the Legislative Council dated September 18, 2019 (please see item #3 of that memo).

The mandate of The Task Force on Changes to the Maine Indian Claims Settlement Implementing Act is to "review An Act To Implement the Maine Indian Claims Settlement and the Micmac Settlement Act and make recommendations to the Legislature for legislation regarding any suggested changes to those Acts. Recommendations of the Task Force must be made by consensus" (HP 1307, 129th Legislature). Given the extent of the work required, the Task Force has determined that it would be beneficial to engage outside experts. The Task Force has identified The Human Rights and Indigenous Peoples Clinic at Suffolk University School of Law as a resource. The clinic, managed by Professor Nicole Friederichs, has done prior work in Maine. The research topic identified involves a specific subsection of federal law that precludes the application of certain federal laws related to Indians. The task for the clinic is to compile a list of potentially impacted laws. This is important information for the Task Force and any future Committee considering these issues.

Specifically, we request \$1,500, which will be used to cover travel costs for the professor and any students she may choose to bring to Maine, and any remaining amount would support the administration of the clinic.

Outside Funding for Committee to Study the Feasibility of Creating Basic Income

Security

The Committee To Study the Feasibility of Creating Basic Income Security authorized by LD 1324 is currently in the process of raising the outside funding required in order for the committee to proceed with its work. The Office of the Executive Director has been receiving numerous checks totaling \$3,500 so far. The committee has not collected sufficient funding yet, but they anticipate raising the full amount by the October 19th deadline.

The work of this task force and its funding continues across two fiscal years, which is rare for previously approved studies that must be funded from outside sources. The usual requirement is that the studies must raise the full amount of the estimated costs of the study before they can meet and begin their work, so as to avoid General Fund costs. With this being a two-fiscal year study, would the Council authorize them to begin their work this fiscal year, as they have raised the full estimated costs of the current fiscal year costs (\$3,250)? This still poses the risk that they may wind up incurring costs in the next fiscal year that may affect the General Fund. To address this, the Council could authorize them to operate only through the end of the fiscal year and require the task force to suspend activities in the next fiscal year until the full amount of that year's estimated costs are raised and approved.

In addition to this unusual issue, the broad appeal method of this committee's fund raising efforts could result in excess collections above the total estimated costs. In the past, funding collected and approved by the Legislature has not been refunded to anyone. The checks are usually held and not processed for deposit until approved by the Council. If not approved by the Council or if insufficient funds are raised, the checks are returned to the contributors and the study does not go forward. If we receive excess contributions, we will hold and then return the checks above the required amount based on the order in which they were received.

- Sec. 1. Committee established. Resolved: That the Committee To Study the Feasibility of Creating Basic Income Security, referred to in this resolve as "the committee," is established.
- Sec. 2. Committee membership. Resolved: That the committee consists of 11 members appointed as follows:
- 1. Three members of the Senate appointed by the President of the Senate, including a representative of each of the following joint standing committees:
 - A. The Joint Standing Committee on Labor and Housing;
 - B. The Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services; and
 - C. The Joint Standing Committee on Taxation;
- 2. Three members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House, including a representative of each of the following joint standing committees:
 - A. The Joint Standing Committee on Labor and Housing;
 - B. The Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services; and
 - C. The Joint Standing Committee on Innovation, Development, Economic Advancement and Business:
- 3. Two members of the public who represent low-wage workers and recipients of public benefits, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- 4. One member of the public who represents business and industry, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- 5. One member who represents higher education, appointed by the Speaker of the House; and
 - 6. One member who represents a trade union, appointed by the Governor.

- Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved: That the first-named Senate member is the Senate chair and the first-named House of Representatives member is the House chair of the committee.
- Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of committee. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all appointments have been completed. After appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the first meeting of the committee. If 30 days or more after the effective date of this resolve a majority of but not all appointments have been made, the chairs may request authority and the Legislative Council may grant authority for the committee to meet and conduct its business.
- Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the committee shall examine and make recommendations on the feasibility of providing basic economic security through a direct cash payment system and other programs that are designed to help individuals and families become more economically secure, including, but not limited to:
- 1. Tax rebates and credits, including strengthening the earned income tax credit and a negative income tax;
- 2. Universal basic income and unconditional cash transfers to residents of the State; and
 - 3. Other direct cash benefit programs.

The committee shall also investigate the effectiveness of existing safety net programs, such as tax credit, child care and food supplement programs, and compare those programs to any recommended direct cash payment programs.

In fulfilling its duties under this section, the committee shall as necessary invite input from the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of Revenue Services and from the Governor's Office of Policy and Management.

- **Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved:** That the Legislative Council shall provide necessary staffing services to the committee, except that Legislative Council staff support is not authorized when the Legislature is in regular or special session.
- **Sec. 7. Report. Resolved:** That, no later than November 4, 2020, the committee shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, for presentation to the First Regular Session of the 130th Legislature.
- Sec. 8. Outside funding. Resolved: That the committee shall seek funding contributions to fully fund the costs of the study. All funding is subject to approval by the Legislative Council in accordance with its policies. If sufficient contributions to fund the study have not been received within 30 days after the effective date of this resolve, no meetings are authorized and no expenses of any kind may be incurred or reimbursed.

Re: Parking Lot O Project Revision

While excavating for the installation of the perimeter lighting around Parking Lot O, the southernmost parking lot, we discovered issues with both the existing asphalt and the gravel base. The asphalt surface was much thinner than anticipated and the subsurface consisted of sand and not gravel in several of the areas excavated. These issues with the surface and subsurface of the parking lot were not anticipated when the project was approved early this year.

The initial project anticipated that we could implement the resurfacing of the parking lot through a reclaim method that mills the top layers of the asphalt surface to create a consistent surface to which new asphalt is applied. The original estimate for the reclaim/repaving portion of this project was roughly \$230,000, which was developed at the end of 2017. A revised, very rough estimate for a full-depth reconstruction and repaving of Parking Lot O is between \$400,000 and \$450,000.

We are exploring other less expensive options as suggested at the State House Facilities Committee meeting last Tuesday, but have yet to develop any definitive proposal to present. The alternatives initially reviewed and discussed with the engineering consulting firm did not sound like they would significantly reduce the cost.

We have sufficient balances available in the facilities budget to absorb the additional costs above the original estimate and would urge the Legislative Council to authorize the Executive Director to proceed with this project using the most cost-effective method of implementation while meeting certain minimum standards for durability.

<u>Procedures for Review of Legislative Bill Requests for the</u> Second Regular Session of the 129th Legislature

Requirements Relevant to Bills in the Second Regular Session

- 1. Under the terms of the Maine Constitution, Section 1 of Article IV, Part Third, Legislative Power, the business of the second regular session **must be limited to:** budgetary matters; legislation in the Governor's call; legislation of an emergency nature admitted by the Legislature; legislation referred to committees to study and report by the Legislature in the first regular session; and legislation presented to the Legislature by written petition of the electors (direct citizen initiative).
- 2. Under the Legislative Council's Rules of Procedure for the 129th Legislature, any action of the Legislative Council requires the affirmative vote of at least 6 members.
- 3. Under Rule 203 of the Joint Rules of the 129th Legislature, any vote of the Legislative Council to accept or reject a bill or resolve for introduction under the procedures established under the Joint Rules must be taken by the yeas and nays, and that vote must be recorded and made available for public inspection.
- 4. Under Rule 217 of the Joint Rules, a bill that has been introduced and finally rejected in a regular or special session may not be introduced in a subsequent session of the same Legislature except by a vote of 2/3 of both chambers. Therefore, determinations as to the relevancy of Rule 217 will be made by the presiding officers outside of this meeting.

Protocol for Deciding Legislative Bill Requests

- A. The Legislative Council will review bill requests alphabetically by policy area. An exception to this order of review may be made for bill requests for which an ASL Interpreter is required for persons who are deaf or hard of hearing. Those bills will be taken out of order at a time during the meeting when an interpreter is available.
- B. For procedural consistency, when voting on a bill request, the initial motion on a bill will be presumed to be a motion to accept the bill request for introduction into the second regular session along with a second to that motion. (Yea is to let in a bill; nay is to reject the bill for introduction). Also for procedural consistency, unless otherwise stated, each motion is presumed to have been made by the vice-chair of the Legislative Council, seconded by the chair.
- C. In order to review all legislative requests in a timely manner, voting will be by electronic vote or a show of hands, with each Council Member's vote on each bill being recorded. The record of each vote will be made available by the Office of the Executive Director for public inspection following the meeting.

- D. If a bill request has been identified by the Revisor as requiring a ruling under Joint Rule 217, the Legislative Council may vote to accept that bill for introduction, conditional upon a subsequent ruling by the presiding officers. Absent a vote to accept the bill, the bill is presumed to have been turned down by unanimous vote of the Legislative Council.
- E. Legislative sponsors and others are welcome to observe the Council's deliberations on the bill requests, but discussion of the requests will be confined to members of the Legislative Council and its staff. Discussion of a bill request among Legislative Council Members will be limited to whether it is appropriate for introduction under Constitutional provisions for second regular session bills, and will not speak to the merits of the bill itself.
- F. If the Legislative Council turns down a bill request, the sponsoring Legislator may appeal that decision if an appeal is filed in a timely manner. At a subsequent meeting of the Legislative Council, the legislator may speak briefly to the bill request under appeal.
- G. A legislative request that has been identified by the Revisor as being either closely related to another legislative request that was earlier filed (i.e., having been assigned a lower LR number) or to a carryover bill is presumed to have been turned down by a unanimous vote of the Legislative Council.
