## **Maine Workforce Development System**

The state workforce development system is made up of multiple programs, providers and partners working together to connect all Mainers to job skills training and employment; funding comes from federal, state, local, philanthropic and private sources.

The **STATE WORKFORCE BOARD** serves in an advisory capacity to the Governor. Its purpose is to convene state, regional and local workforce system partners to: enhance the capacity and performance of Maine's workforce development system; align and improve the outcomes and effectiveness of workforce programs and investments; promote economic growth; and engage public workforce representatives—including businesses, education providers, economic development, labor representatives and other stakeholders— to achieve the state's strategic and operational vision and goals as outlined in its State Plan.

Maine has three LOCAL WORKFORCE BOARDS that coordinate workforce development investment activities in their local areas. They administer and oversee certain Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)-- programs –Title IB—which serve adults and youth with barriers to employment and dislocated workers.
