## Executive Summary

The Joint Standing Committee Health and Human Services held two meetings in September 2008 to consider the structure, accountability and level of legislative and independent oversight of the Fund for a Healthy Maine, as required by Public Law 2007, Chapter 629, Part H (copy provided in Appendix A).<sup>1</sup> In accordance with that law, the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services submits this report of its recommendations regarding oversight of the Fund for a Healthy Maine to the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs.

The Health and Human Services Committee convened its first meeting to consider oversight of the Fund for a Healthy Maine on September 16, 2008. The first meeting provided committee members with background information regarding the Fund for a Healthy Maine including legal, financial, policy and program history. Presenters at the first meeting included Attorney General G. Steven Rowe, State Treasurer David Lemoine, Dr. Dora Mills, the Director of the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention, Edward Karass, State Controller, Shirrin Blaisdell from the State Budget Office, Rebecca Birrell Smith from the Friends of the Fund for a Healthy Maine and legislative staff. Materials provided to the committee included the Maine law governing the Fund for a Healthy Maine (Appendix B) and the financial detail and budget history of the Fund (Appendix C).

The Health and Human Services Committee met for a second time on September 24, 2008 to fulfill the requirements of Public Law 2007, Chapter 629, Part H. The meeting commenced with staff presentations of information requested at the first meeting, including oversight of other funds within Maine law (Appendix D), tobacco settlement funding structure and oversight in other states (Appendix E) and evaluations of programs funded through the Fund for a Healthy Maine that are administered by the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention. The balance of the second meeting was devoted to a work session to discuss and develop recommendations regarding oversight of the Fund for a Healthy Maine. At the close of the second meeting, the Health and Human Services Committee voted on three recommendations which are presented below.

The Health and Human Services Committee presents the following three recommendations regarding oversight of the Fund for a Healthy Maine. Ten members of the committee support recommendations (1), (2) and (3); three members support recommendations (2) and (3) only; and one member was absent at the time the votes were taken. The recommendations are as follows:

- **Recommendation (1): OPEGA Review.** The Health and Human Services Committee will request that the Government Oversight Committee authorize the Office of Program Evaluation and Government Accountability to conduct a review of the

efficacy, efficiency and accountability of the Fund for a Healthy Maine programs and expenditures. The Health and Human Services Committee will request that the OPEGA review include a comparison between Maine and other states in terms of the degree to which preventive health is prioritized in the expenditure of tobacco settlement dollars. The Health and Human Services Committee will make clear in its request to the Government Oversight Committee that the request regarding a review of the Fund for a Healthy Maine should not be interpreted as in any way suggesting that such a review take precedence over OPEGA's planned review of MaineCare.

- ***Recommendation (2): Fund for a Healthy Maine Subcommittee.*** The Health and Human Services Committee recommends that a "Fund for a Healthy Maine Subcommittee" be established at the outset of the 124<sup>th</sup> Legislature to ensure that members of the Health and Human Services Committee and the Appropriations Committee jointly discuss all budget proposals and other proposals that affect the Fund for a healthy Maine and work together to begin fiscal planning for the end, in 9 years, to the "strategic contribution payments" that Maine is currently receiving under the Master Tobacco Settlement Agreement.<sup>2</sup> The Health and Human Services Committee recommends a 5-member Fund for a Healthy Maine subcommittee, consisting of 3 members of the Health and Human Services Committee and 2 members of the Appropriations Committee, including one minority party member from the House and one minority party member of the Senate.
- ***Recommendation (3): Joint Rule regarding Health and Human Services Committee Review.*** The Health and Human Services Committee will recommend to the Joint Rules Committee that a Joint Rule be established for the 124<sup>th</sup> Legislature to provide for a review by the Health and Human Services Committee of any proposed allocation or deallocation of Fund for a healthy Maine funds or change to the Fund for a Healthy Maine or its governing statutes, using a process similar to the process under which the Judiciary Committee reviews all proposed exceptions to public records (under Title 1, section 434). Under the proposed Joint Rule, if, after a public hearing, a majority of the committee of jurisdiction to which the proposal affecting the Fund for a Healthy Maine has been referred supports the proposal, the committee of jurisdiction would request and the Health and Human Services Committee would provide a review of that legislative proposal and a recommendation back to the committee of jurisdiction prior to that legislation being reported out of the committee of jurisdiction.

**PUBLIC LAW 2007, CHAPTER 629**  
**H.P. 1608 - L.D. 2247**

**PART H**

**Sec. H-1. Report regarding Fund for a Healthy Maine.** The Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services shall meet to consider the structure, accountability and appropriate level of legislative and independent oversight of the Fund for a Healthy Maine, established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 1511. The committee shall report back to the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs by October 1, 2008 with recommendations, including necessary implementing legislation, for the structure, accountability and appropriate level and type of oversight of the Fund for a Healthy Maine.

Title 22, Section 1511**

# FUND FOR A HEALTHY MAINE

## 22 §1511. Fund for a Healthy Maine established

**1. Fund established.** The Fund for a Healthy Maine, referred to in this chapter as the "fund," is established as an Other Special Revenue fund for the purposes specified in this chapter.

**2. Sources of fund.** The State Controller shall credit to the fund:

A. All money received by the State in settlement of or in relation to the lawsuit State of Maine v. Philip Morris, et al., Kennebec County Superior Court, Docket No. CV-97-134;

B. Money from any other source, whether public or private, designated for deposit into or credited to the fund; and

C. Interest earned or other investment income on balances in the fund.

**3. Allocation; amounts.**

**3-A. Unencumbered balances.** Any unencumbered balance remaining at the end of any fiscal year lapses back to the Fund for a Healthy Maine, the account within the Department of Administrative and Financial Services established pursuant to this section, and may not be made available for expenditure without specific legislative approval.

**3-B. Departmental indirect cost allocation plans.** Any revenue transfer made on or after July 1, 2000 from a Fund for a Healthy Maine account to another account pursuant to an approved departmental indirect cost allocation plan is determined by the Legislature to be an authorized use of revenue credited to the Fund for a Healthy Maine. The State Budget Officer shall reduce allotment for the amount of any transfer made from a Fund for a Healthy Maine account for the purpose authorized in this subsection.

**4. Restrictions.** This section does not require the provision of services for the purposes specified in subsection 6. When allocations are made to direct services, services to lower income consumers must have priority over services to higher income consumers. Allocations from the fund must be used to supplement, not supplant, appropriations from the General Fund.

**5. General Fund limitation.** Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary in this section, any program, expansion of a program, expenditure or transfer authorized by the Legislature using the Fund for a Healthy Maine may not be transferred to the General Fund without specific legislative approval.

**6. Health purposes.** Allocations are limited to the following health-related purposes:

A. Smoking prevention, cessation and control activities, including, but not limited to, reducing smoking among the children of the State;

B. Prenatal and young children's care including home visits and support for parents of children from birth to 6 years of age;

C. Child care for children up to 15 years of age, including after-school care;

D. Health care for children and adults, maximizing to the extent possible federal matching funds;

E. Prescription drugs for adults who are elderly or disabled, maximizing to the extent possible federal matching funds;

F. Dental and oral health care to low-income persons who lack adequate dental coverage;

G. Substance abuse prevention and treatment; and

H. Comprehensive school health programs, including school-based health centers.

**7. Investment; plan; report.**

**8. Report by Treasurer of State.** The Treasurer of State shall report at least annually on or before the 2nd Friday in December to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs and the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters. The report must summarize the activity in any funds or accounts directly related to this section.

**9. Working capital advance.** Beginning July 1, 2003, the State Controller is authorized to provide an annual advance up to \$37,500,000 from the General Fund to the fund to provide money for allocations from the fund. This money must be returned to the General Fund as the first priority from the amounts credited to the fund pursuant to subsection 2, paragraph A.

**10. Restricted accounts.**

**11. Restricted accounts.** The State Controller is authorized to establish separate accounts within the fund in order to segregate money received by the fund from any source, whether public or private, that requires as a condition of the contribution to the fund that the use of the money contributed be restricted to one or more of the purposes specified in subsection 6. Money credited to a restricted account established under this subsection may be applied only to the purposes to which the account is restricted.



**APPENDIX G**

**Public Records Proceedings, Exceptions to Public Records, Title 1, Chapter 13, Section 434**

## Title 1, Chapter 13

### Public Records and Proceedings, Exceptions to Public Records

#### §434. Review of proposed exceptions to public records

**1. Procedures before legislative committees.** Whenever a legislative measure containing a new public records exception is proposed, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over the proposal shall hold a public hearing and determine the level of support for the proposal among the members of the committee. If there is support for the proposal among a majority of the members of the committee, the committee shall request the review committee to review and evaluate the proposal pursuant to subsection 2 and to report back to the committee of jurisdiction. A proposed exception may not be enacted into law unless review and evaluation pursuant to subsection 2 have been completed.

**2. Review and evaluation.** Upon referral of a proposed public records exception from the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over the proposal, the review committee shall conduct a review and evaluation of the proposal and shall report in a timely manner to the committee to which the proposal was referred. The review committee shall use the following criteria to determine whether the proposed exception should be enacted:

- A. Whether a record protected by the proposed exception needs to be collected and maintained;
- B. The value to the agency or official or to the public in maintaining a record protected by the proposed exception;
- C. Whether federal law requires a record covered by the proposed exception to be confidential;
- D. Whether the proposed exception protects an individual's privacy interest and, if so, whether that interest substantially outweighs the public interest in the disclosure of records;
- E. Whether public disclosure puts a business at a competitive disadvantage and, if so, whether that business's interest substantially outweighs the public interest in the disclosure of records;
- F. Whether public disclosure compromises the position of a public body in negotiations and, if so, whether that public body's interest substantially outweighs the public interest in the disclosure of records;
- G. Whether public disclosure jeopardizes the safety of a member of the public or the public in general and, if so, whether that safety interest substantially outweighs the public interest in the disclosure of records;

H. Whether the proposed exception is as narrowly tailored as possible; and

I. Any other criteria that assist the review committee in determining the value of the proposed exception as compared to the public's interest in the record protected by the proposed exception.

**2-A. Accountability review of agency or official.** In evaluating each proposed public records exception, the review committee shall, in addition to applying the criteria of subsection 2, determine whether there is a publicly accountable entity that has authority to review the agency or official that collects, maintains or uses the record subject to the exception in order to ensure that information collection, maintenance and use are consistent with the purpose of the exception and that public access to public records is not hindered.

**3. Report.** The review committee shall report its findings and recommendations on whether the proposed exception should be enacted to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over the proposal.
