<b>Arizona</b>	This article does not apply to: Any judicial proceeding of any court or <i>any political caucuses of the legislature</i>	38-431.08(A)(1)
<b>Delaware</b>	(b) "Caucus" means members of the House of representatives of Senate, of the same political party, who assemble to discuss matters of public business (h) "Public body" shall not include <i>any caucus of the House of Representatives or Senate of the State</i>	29 §10002 (b) (h)
<b>Minnesota</b>	but not including a <i>caucus of the members of any of those bodies from the same house and political party</i> nor a delegation of legislators representing a geographic area or political subdivision	§3.055
<b>New Hampshire</b>	"Meeting" shall also not include: <i>A caucus consisting of elected members of a public body of the same political party who were elected on a partisan basis at a state general election</i> or elected on a partisan basis by a town or city which has adopted a partisan ballot system pursuant to RSA 669:12 or RSA 44:2; or	§91-A:2, I(c)

<b>Pennsylvania</b>	<i>"Caucus" A gathering of members of a political party or coalition which is held for purposes of planning political strategy and holding discussions designed to prepare the members for taking official action in the General Assembly.</i> Not included in the intent of this chapter are <i>caucuses</i> or meetings of any ethics committee created pursuant to the Rules of the Senate or the House of Representatives	7-65-703 (definitions) 7-65-712
<b>Rhode Island</b>	For purposes of this section, <i>any political party, organization, or unit thereof meeting or convening is not and should not be considered to be a public body; provided, however, that no such meeting shall be used to circumvent the requirements of this chapter</i>	§42-46-25)
<b>Utah</b>	"Public body" does not include: <i>a political party, a political group, or a political caucus</i>	52-4-103(9) (c)(i)
<b>Wisconsin</b>	No provisions of this subchapter shall apply to any <i>partisan caucus of the senate or any partisan caucus of the assembly, except as provided by legislative rule.</i>	§19.87(3)
<b>West Virginia</b>	Definition of "meeting" does not include: <i>Any political party caucus</i>	§6-9A-2(5)(C)
