CCECAC - What Is It and What Does It Do?

- ➤ As the name says, the CCECAC advises the Children's Cabinet on matters pertaining to early childhood (defined here as Birth Grade 3), drawing from experience/expertise of Council members and others
- ► We also fulfill certain statutory duties, federal grant requirements for advisory councils, etc
- ► We engage in ongoing research and information-gathering about what is happening in the field
- ► We make recommendations to the Legislature and others to improve early care and education for Maine children and their families
- ► The makeup of the Council drives its ability to do work

Bigger Picture

- Advise Children's Cabinet, focusing on birth through Grade 3
 - Support priorities
 - Respond to needs for information/input
- But, more broadly, also seek to support and make recommendations to agencies that oversee policies impacting children from birth through Grade 3
 - ► Identify needs and resources
 - ▶ Draw on expertise from Council and others
 - ► Lend voice re prioritization among many needs

 - ► PDG Grant Needs Assessment
- ► Next stage (Jan March '20)
 - ► Info gathering → Landscape Report → ID areas for focus and inquiry
 - ► Year 1: early care and education system
 - ► Years 2 & 3: early intervention/prevention and early elementary years
- And then....COVID

How 2020 Actually Played Out

- Information from and feedback to OCFS, DOE and others related to COVID needs and experiences in the field
- Series of letters to elevate and support prioritization of key issues identified by the Council → all informed by views and input from the field
 - ► July DOE re Re-opening of Schools
 - ► Aug CC re Concerns, Principles and Priorities
 - October Economic Recovery Committee re hybrid learning and quality, affordable ECE system
 - ► November Maine Delegation re additional resources
 - ▶ Dec CDC re vaccination of teachers and ECE
