SUBJECT:	Recommendations on the Governor's change package to LD 221

After receiving briefings from the Department of Administrative and Financial Affairs, the Department of Defense, Veterans and Emergency Management and the Department of the Secretary of State, the Joint Standing Committee on Veterans and Legal Affairs met on May 21, 2021 to review the items in the Governor's proposed change package to LD 221 pertaining to the agencies under the committee's jurisdiction. The committee voted unanimously of those present to accept all of these initiatives as well as the language in Part RRR, except as described below.

In addition, the committee met on May 24, 2021 to discuss several additional items that, although not part of the Governor's change package, we strongly and unanimously urge the AFA committee to include in LD 221, which are also described below.

Department of Public Safety

The VLA Committee did not conduct a vote on the initiative that appears on page 180 of Part A of the change package, which increases allocations for the Gambling Control Board to align with revenue changes approved by the Revenue Forecast Committee in May 2021. The Department of Public Safety did not provide the committee with information regarding this initiative and, because the initiative aligns revenues with the updated revenue forecast, it does not appear to be discretionary in nature.

Department of the Secretary of State

With respect to the third initiative described on page 188 of Part A of the Governor's change package, which establishes one new Elections Coordinator position, of the 7 members voting, 6 members (Luchini, Caiazzo, McCreight, Tuttle, Rielly and Supica) recommended acceptance of this initiative while 1 member (Corey) did not recommend acceptance of this initiative. As you may recall, this committee unanimously (of those present, 11-0) recommended inclusion of this new position in our original biennial budget memo dated March 18, 2021. A majority of the committee continues to strongly support including this new position in LD 221, for all of the reasons set forth in that memo.

Department of Defense, Veterans and Emergency Management (DVEM)

The VLA Committee unanimously voted in favor of all of the initiatives that affect the Department of Defense, Veterans and Emergency Management that appear on pages 36-40 of Part A of the Governor's change package as well as Language Part RRR. We are especially grateful that the Governor's change package:

- Restores the part-time vacant Office Associate II position that was created by P.L. 2019, ch. 504, for the Veterans Homelessness Prevention Coordination program, and that was slated for elimination by reference #646 of the original biennial budget proposal.
- Removes the initiative in reference #651 of the original biennial budget proposal that would have eliminated the \$100,000 annual funding in each year of the biennium for the Veterans Homelessness Prevention Coordination program established by P.L. 2019, ch. 504 and instead adopts new initiatives (the final initiatives on both page 38 and page 39 and the single initiative on page 40) to ensure that, as is required by 37-B M.R.S. §513-A(3), the funds in the Veterans Homelessness Prevention Partnership Fund do not lapse.
- Restores funding for a temporary office staff position and two temporary groundskeeping staff positions at the veterans cemeteries in Caribou and Augusta.

New Initiatives for the Maine Bureau of Veterans Services

In addition to taking votes on the portions of the change package affecting the Department of Defense, Veterans and Emergency Management, the VLA Committee also voted unanimously of those present (10-0) to strongly urge the AFA Committee to consider including two new initiatives in LD 221 that will affect services provided by the Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services. These initiatives are represented by the unanimous committee amendments to:

 LD 658, An Act To Provide Funding for 2 Veteran Service Officers in the Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services. As originally drafted, this bill would have provided funding for 3 Veteran Service Officers (VSOs). After careful consideration, the committee unanimously (13-0) voted in favor of an amended version of the bill that provides for 2 additional VSOs, whom the bureau has indicated will likely serve as homeless veterans' coordinators in Portland and Bangor. In this role, the VSOs will conduct outreach and connect veterans experiencing homelessness with critical supports and services, including by assisting these veterans in accessing health care and other benefits from the federal Veterans Administration as well as state benefits including the Veterans Homelessness Prevention Coordination Program and temporary, emergency financial assistance under 37-B M.R.S. §505(1-C). At the public hearing on LD 658, the Director of the Bureau testified: "Over the past few years, the monthly rate of veteran homelessness in Maine has hovered around 100 veterans. This past year, that number has jumped to over 180. The effects of the pandemic have caused the spike, further stressing an already sparse housing stock." Given the economic downturn and this dramatic increase in the number of identified veterans experiencing homelessness in the State, we believe that it is critical to expand the number of VSOs who conduct outreach to this vulnerable population. A copy of the committee amendment to LD 658 is attached for your review.

LD 693, An Act To Make the Pilot Program Providing Mental Health Case Management Services to Veterans a Permanent Program. This pilot project provided community integration services to eligible veterans with a mental health diagnosis or mental health disability rating from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs or who were determined to require mental health care services by a licensed mental health professional, with a priority placed on veterans being discharged from inpatient psychiatric facilities, uninsured or underinsured veterans, and veterans with Maine Care coverage. From April 2018 through September 2019, the pilot project successfully served 210 veterans across the State through two contracted providers, who conducted comprehensive biopsychosocial evaluations and connected veterans with mental health, housing, employment and other targeted communitybased services the veterans were determined to need. These services were provided by the two contracted providers at average costs of only \$1,421 and \$1,617 per veteran. A copy of the May 2021 presentation from Director Jessica Pollard of the Office of Behavioral Health and Director David Richmond from the Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services, which details the exciting results of the pilot project, is available here: https://legislature.maine.gov/ testimony/resources/VLA20210322@DHHS132610809429287360.pdf. Our committee unanimously (13-0) voted to make this pilot project permanent and strongly recommends that the AFA Committee consider adding an initiative to LD 221 to achieve that goal. A copy of LD 693, and the unanimous committee amendment, is attached for your review.

6 Whereas, this legislation must take effect before the expiration of the 90-day period 7 to ensure continued case management services are provided without interruption after the 8 pilot program ends; and

9 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within 10 the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as 11 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 12 therefore,

13 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §1833 is enacted to read:

15 §1833. Mental health care services for veterans

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16 <u>1. Screening.</u> A hospital licensed under this chapter shall screen all patients presenting
 17 for emergency care at the hospital's emergency department regarding whether or not the
 18 patient has prior service in the military. This information must be added to the hospital's
 19 patient data management system.

20 2. Reporting. A hospital licensed under this chapter shall compile data regarding the number of patients who identify as having prior service in the military who reported or 21 22 presented a behavioral or mental health emergency when seeking care from the hospital emergency department, including the number who were admitted or referred for inpatient 23 treatment for psychiatric care. The data collected in accordance with this subsection may 24 not include information that would disclose the identity of the patient. A hospital licensed 25 26 under this chapter shall report the data to the department twice per year, for the period from January 1st to June 30th and for the period from July 1st to December 31st. The department 27 shall establish the date by which the data for each period must be reported. 28

29 3. Waiver. The department may grant a waiver of the screening and data collection 30 requirements under subsections 1 and 2 to a hospital that demonstrates that the 31 requirements constitute an excessive burden that will substantially affect the operation of 32 the hospital. The department may not grant a waiver under this subsection to more than 4 33 hospitals.

4. Certain hospitals. If a report submitted to the department pursuant to Resolve
 2017, chapter 24, Part A, section 2 or pursuant to subsection 2 shows that a hospital
 identifies 95% or more of the patients who presented for emergency care as having prior
 service in the military by the fact that they are enrolled and receive health care benefits
 from the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, the hospital is no longer required
 to screen patients and collect data as required by this section.

40 <u>5. Annual department report.</u> The department shall work with the Department of
 41 <u>Defense</u>, Veterans and Emergency Management, Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services to
 42 analyze the data submitted by hospitals in accordance with subsection 2 to quantify the

unmet need for mental health care services, particularly inpatient mental health care services, and to identify gaps in mental health care services provided by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs. The department and the bureau shall submit a report on the analysis to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over veterans affairs no later than February 1st annually.

6. Costs mitigated. The department shall distribute an annual stipend from the Veterans Mental Health Case Management and Services Fund under Title 34-B, section 3912 to each hospital that screened for military service and collected data in accordance with subsections 1 and 2. The department shall adopt routine technical rules in accordance with Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A to set the amount of the annual stipend.

MENTAL HEALTH CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES FOR VETERANS

§3911. Mental health case management services for veterans

15 The department shall provide contracted case management services to provide 16 necessary mental health treatment to veterans who are residents of the State. Case 17 management services must include assisting veterans in accessing a range of mental and behavioral health services, which must include inpatient mental health care services as 18 19 clinically required. The department, with the assistance of the Department of Defense. 20 Veterans and Emergency Management, Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services, referred to in 21 this subchapter as "the bureau," shall identify regions of the State where case management 22 services are most needed and identify veterans seeking case management services who are 23 enrolled with the United States Department of Veterans Affairs and those who would likely 24 be eligible to be enrolled.

<u>1. Coordination.</u> The department, with the assistance of the bureau, shall seek to
 <u>coordinate</u> services with the United States Department of Veterans Affairs and state
 <u>agencies</u> that offer mental health care services or provide assistance to veterans.

28 2. Regional contracts. The department may enter into regional contracts, including a
 29 contract with a provider that has experience providing services in the northern part of the
 30 State, for the purpose of ensuring a statewide network of case management that provides
 31 coordinated mental health care services for veterans living in the State, including, but not
 32 limited to, inpatient treatment as clinically required.

33 3. Eligibility. An individual who served in the Armed Forces of the United States and 34 meets the definition of "veteran" under 38 Code of Federal Regulations, Section 3.1 or is 35 currently serving in the Maine Army National Guard or Air National Guard or the Reserves 36 of the Armed Forces of the United States is eligible to receive services under this 37 subchapter. The character of a veteran's discharge from service is not a disqualifying 38 eligibility criterion to receive services under this subchapter. A veteran who has received 39 a mental health diagnosis or mental health disability rating from the United States 40 Department of Veterans Affairs is eligible to receive services under this subchapter. A 41 veteran who is not enrolled with the United States Department of Veterans Affairs who is 42 determined to require mental health care services by a licensed mental health professional

may be considered eligible for case management and other behavioral health services under this subchapter based on the individual needs of the veteran. The department, with the assistance of the bureau, shall establish criteria to determine eligibility for case management services to be provided under this subchapter.

4. Enrollment. The bureau shall work to assist veterans receiving case management services under this subchapter who are not enrolled with the United States Department of Veterans Affairs to determine eligibility and to assist with those veterans' enrollment and with filing claims to the United States Department of Veterans Affairs.

5. Cultural competency. Case management and mental health professionals selected to provide services pursuant to this subchapter must demonstrate familiarity with military and veteran culture.

6. Data collection. All veterans receiving case management and mental health services under this subchapter must be accounted for in department and bureau data collections.

7. Department report. The department, in consultation with the bureau, shall prepare a written report of the services provided under this subchapter and make any recommendations regarding its provision of services under this subchapter to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over veterans affairs by February 1st annually.

20 §3912. Veterans Mental Health Case Management and Services Fund

The Veterans Mental Health Case Management and Services Fund, referred to in this section as "the fund," is established as a dedicated, nonlapsing Other Special Revenue Funds account in the department. The fund is administered by the department for the purposes of reimbursing hospitals for the costs of screening and data collection conducted pursuant to Title 22, section 1833, subsection 6 and to support the provision of case management services for veterans under this subchapter.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation
 takes effect when approved.

SUMMARY

This bill makes permanent the pilot program to provide case management services to veterans for mental health care established by Resolve 2017, chapter 24.

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
