Potential options moving forward for the Basic Income Security Committee

OPTION 1

• Have outside group do feasibility study (No. 4 in Resolve):

4. The committee shall examine and assess the feasibility, economic impact and poverty reduction effect of providing basic income security through a direct cash payment system and other programs that are designed to help individuals and families become more economically secure.

If study done by Dec. 15, then submit results to Joint Standing Committee on Labor and Housing
LBHS can report out bill to Second Regular Session of 130th Legislature.

<u>Notes/issues</u>: Timing – can outside group do feasibility study quickly? The Committee hasn't yet decided scope of feasibility study.

OPTION 2

• Committee itself does feasibility study (not contracted out) and comes up with recommendations by Dec. 15.

<u>Notes/issues:</u> Data and expertise that Committee has may not be enough to perform adequate feasibility study – likely would be data intensive and may require modeling that outside groups may be best to conduct. Only authorized for 4 meetings – no time.

OPTION 3

- Report due simply says the Committee didn't have adequate time to carry out its duties as required
- Recommends JSC on Labor and Housing reports out bill that reestablishes the Committee
- Once again recommends feasibility study this time Committee contracts out for the feasibility study
 - Statutory adjournment is April 20, 2022: Law effective 90 days after (unless emergency) (depends on when Legislature actually adjourns)
 - JSC in 131st Legislature has authority to report out legislation based on findings of report (2023)

<u>Notes/issues</u>: Delays any work, including awarding feasibility study to outside organization, until interim 2022. Gives Committee most time to complete its work. Also, can get a new fiscal note – is \$20,000 enough for feasibility study?

Committee could contact groups and gauge their interest and fees for conducting such a study.
