Security vs. Police





- > Formerly Capitol Security.
- **>**24/7, 365 Operation
- Primary law enforcement and security provider at State House and beyond.
- >Authorized Statewide police authority.

State Building Control Center (BCC)





The Building Control Center (BCC) is a professionally staffed call center operating 24/7/365 and provides monitoring of safety, security, and building management systems for most state-owned and leased facilities.






Session Days

Session Days - Special Signage Erected








Lot A

How to get in the building??



- Legislators are considered pre-vetted for immediate access.
- Staff at the State House are also considered pre-vetted.
- There is no need to submit to the screening process at our checkpoint which is commonly referred to as the "kiosk".
- There are several ways to efficiently enter.

Legislators must take notice that weapons are PROHIBITED In the State House.

Why Screen

2021 Screener Activity

Screened 17,600 visitors

X-Rayed 19,600 items

Conducted 650 secondary searches

Temporarily confiscated 391 weapons &

Several hundred other items deemed as prohibited.

Interior Security Measures



- Officer on foot patrol of chamber areas when in session.
- Officer and/or Screeners stationed as needed at hearing rooms.
- Duress buttons in numerous offices and in hearing rooms.
- Video monitoring capabilities in most areas
- Fire alarm systems and fire suppression systems.

Duress Buttons



• Located in all hearing rooms & numerous offices to include your clerk's office.
