Representative **DILL**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, William "Pops" Mangum was born and raised in Philadelphia. He spent a lot of time with his grandparents. When he and his grandfather would come home, his grandmother would say, 'here comes Grandpop and Pop.' The name obviously stuck.

When he was a teenager, he worked in the mail room at Gulf Oil. When the vice president, Mr. Phillips, would come by, Pops would say hi to him. Everyone told him not to speak to the vice president, but he did anyway. They became friendly and Mr. Phillips would always say hi to him when he was walking by the mail room. No one ever went to the top floor of the building to chat with Mr. Phillips, but Pops decided, what the heck, he'll give it a try, so, he went up. When he asked Mr. Phillips about how he became vice president, he told him to have consistency in who he is. Be your true self every day. He also told him to listen, look and learn. Pops has taken that advice with him every day. And if you really want to know his secret to working with kids, that's what it is; he is consistent

with them every time he sees them, he listens, looks and learns. He says it's that simple and it's worked for 50 years.

Pops started working with one student in Old Town School Department in 1976. The student needed some mentoring, and they called on Pops. Whatever he did worked so well that they asked him to work with more students. Over the years, he's been asked to work with students in other districts including Milford, Hampden, RSU 63 and even students at the University of Maine. Without advertising, these other schools heard about the impact that Pops was making and invited him into their schools to work with their students also.

A couple other things I'd like to say. Pops has a degree in domestic international marketing, which has taken him to parts of Africa, Cuba and Canada, doing diplomatic work. He was drafted into the Army at the age of 19 to fight in the Vietnam War. He was a radio operator in the infantry. Since cutting radio communication was a top priority for the enemy, Pops was always a target and he had to travel with a group of snipers to protect him and he was even blown out of a helicopter. And if you know Pops, that might explain a few things. He's a member of the Maine Sports Legends Hall of Honors. While he does have a history playing and coaching basketball, the honor was given to him because of his work of what he's done with students at the University of Maine.

Pops has no plans on retiring. He may cut back on the number of schools that he works with as the years go on, but no plans to fully retire. Great news for the students that work with him. Congratulations, Pops.

The SPEAKER PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Orrington, Representative Campbell.

Representative **CAMPBELL**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. In all our communities, large or small, we have these people who are pillars for not only our community, but also an institution like the University of Maine. Pops is just one of those kind of guys. He's always chipped in and is just the type of guy that makes our communities proud. Thank you.

The SPEAKER PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Milford, Representative Drinkwater.

Representative **DRINKWATER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, my daughter went to Old Town High School. She's now in her 40s. I talked to her earlier and she said that there was one teacher that really made a difference in her life. That he was engaged with the kids and that it was very obvious that he had a love of teaching and of his students. And that was 20-something years ago and she still remembers him as one of her favorite teachers. And I would just like to congratulate him on a magnificent career, and I hope you continue, because you have a real love of kids. Thank you.

Representative **SHAGOURY**: Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker Pro Tem. I'm very proud to stand before you today and offer my heartfelt congratulations to the Hall-Dale boys' soccer team.

In 2024, they won their first State Championship, and in 2025, followed that up with a second State Championship by beating Orono in a real nailbiter, 1-0 with an overtime goal. These young men have played together since a lot of them were little kids and they're really something to watch. It's a lot of fun to see them operate as a real team and make plays and just have a lot of fun out there. And I wish them all the best of luck in all their endeavors and, while I don't want to jinx anything, I hope they can make it three in a row.

The SPEAKER PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Gardiner, Representative Montell, who wishes to address the House on the record.

Representative **MONTPELL**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker Pro Tem. I rise today; actually, and I'd like to speak on the record, if that's not an understanding already. I rise to remember someone that was part of my family's life.

Twenty-one years ago, my family and I took a leap of faith, and I had gone to a PTA meeting and I had found out that there was a Thai teacher that was looking for a home for half of a school year, so he could come to the United States and teach about Thai culture. I was immediately excited and came bounding home to my husband and said, we have to host this teacher, he's coming to the United States, he needs a home and guess what, he likes golf. I thought for sure that would get my husband to be excited about it. Well, actually, it was when he looked up the profile of this person, he just was drawn by the large smile of this teacher that wanted to come to the United States.

Mark Wichipan was part of my family. We hosted him, my daughter was four, my son was six, almost seven, and at the time, I always knew I wanted to host AFS, American Field Service, because growing up, I had a Brazilian sister that my family decided to host and so, I knew I wanted it to be part of my child's upbringing. And this was perfect because it wasn't another child I was bringing in my home, it was a teacher, who turned out to be just an amazing part of our life. He was like the fun uncle. But he could cook, he could dance, he could sing. And I say he could cook, I would come home after a day of work and there would be just this spread on my dining room table and there was just so much love in his cooking.

And there was so much to Mark. So, back in Thailand, he taught English. He wanted to be an artist, really wanted to teach art, but his parents said, teach English. So, my home is

filled with artwork that he has embroidered, painted; actually, one Halloween, he decided it would be cool to paint my shrubs red. They finally grew out, but that was just Mark. He was just very impulsive, which I appreciate. You know, on a snowy day, snow angels, always the surprise in the house. Sometimes, I'd come home and all the rugs would be outside on the lawn, he would be sweeping them.

And after Mark stayed with us, he went on to Good Will-Hinkley, and most of you are aware that that can be a challenging school, and they just loved him there. And from there, he went to Cape Elizabeth, and he had an amazing year here in the United States. He then went to New Zealand to study to be a chef, which he already was an amazing cook, and from there, he went to become a massage therapist and then he became a nurse. So, he was just a lifelong learner, full of energy and joy and a great spirit.

Yesterday morning, I found out that Mark passed away. He was 66 years old. He had gone back to Thailand last October with a plane ticket to return to the United States today, he was on a 10-year visa. Actually, his home here in the United States was Fort Kent, he loved Fort Kent and he had some shoulder pain and some symptoms that would indicate and ultimately be his diagnosis of prostate cancer and by the time they found it, it had spread to his other organs.

So, I just want to just remember his life and I appreciate you letting me share him with you, because my family still struggles with this and as I was talking to my daughter on the phone yesterday and consoling her, because she was quite young when he first came and he came back for multiple visits. I explained to her, because of Mark and because of that good experience, that we went on to host twice more. We have a son from Thailand and we have a daughter from Italy and they have enriched our lives greatly. So, thank you for listening.

**JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING FEBRUARY 2026 AS
CHILDREN'S DENTAL HEALTH MONTH**

WHEREAS, dental caries is the most common chronic disease found in children; and

WHEREAS, through dental education and regular preventive dental care, tooth decay is almost completely preventable; and

WHEREAS, good oral health habits start in childhood, and parents and caregivers who are educated about the importance of oral health are empowered to embrace appropriate oral hygiene and dietary behaviors and make and keep dental appointments for their children; and

WHEREAS, research shows that, through supervised tooth brushing programs and preventive dental care, children can reduce the occurrence of dental-related illness, which starts as early as first grade and causes children in the United States to miss 51,000,000 hours of school time each year; and

WHEREAS, through a balanced diet, brushing and flossing after every meal and regular dental checkups, children can avoid dental caries and remain healthy; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-second Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to designate February 2026 as Children's Dental Health Month and to encourage the raising of public awareness about the importance of preventive dental care for all children.

Representative **GRAMLICH**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Colleagues of the House. I rise today to introduce this Joint Resolution recognizing February 2026 as Children's Dental Health Month.

Tooth decay remains the most common chronic disease affecting our children, yet it is almost entirely preventable. With routine dental visits, fluoride treatments, sealants, proper brushing and flossing and a balanced diet, we can spare children needless pain, infection and missed opportunities to learn and thrive.

Research shows that dental-related illness begins as early as first grade and leads to an estimated 51 million hours of missed school each year in the United States. That is classroom time our children cannot afford to lose. Poor oral health is also linked to difficulty eating, sleeping, speaking and concentration, all of which directly affect academic performance and overall well-being. That is why it is critically important that we advance prevention-based policies that improve children's oral health. Prevention reduces long-term health care costs, eases the burden on emergency rooms, supports working families and promotes equity for children who might otherwise go without care. Good oral health habits begin at home, but public policy plays a vital role in creating conditions for these habits to succeed.

When we prioritize prevention, we invest in healthier children, stronger families and more successful schools. By designating February 2026 as Children's Dental Health Month, we reaffirm our commitment to not only awareness, but to action. Together, Mr. Speaker, we can help every child smile, learn and grow free from preventable dental disease. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative **LYMAN**: Though the integrity of the program this bill represents is not in question, Maine taxpayers are burdened enough. It is not the responsibility of the Maine taxpayer to fill the gap from the loss of federal funding. This is not a precedent that should be set. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Scarborough, Representative Murphy.

Representative **MURPHY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. When federal funds were lost for this program, there was no explanation given and at the time, there were a total of three Upward Bound TRiO programs that lost funding. Two of them have had their funding restored, and again, without explanation. And this one-time funding would be used solely to provide academic support and college and career preparation assistance to students at Mountain Valley High School, Oxford Hills Comprehensive High School, Buckfield Junior and Senior High School, Dirigo High School and Telstar High School and Edward Little High School. In order to be eligible, students from these six high schools must come from low-income families and be the first generation in their families to attend college.

Among other things, students receive tutoring in math and English Language Arts, along with mentoring and assistance preparing college and financial aid applications. The River Valley Upward Bound program has a proven record of success. We heard testimony from several graduates of the program who told us that their lives had been dramatically improved as a result of their participation. This is a program that works and deserves this one-time funding so it can continue in the near future. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Fairfield, Representative Rudnicki.

Representative **RUDNICKI**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, why should the Maine taxpayers pick up the cost of an additional federal program because our Chief Executive Officer and the other side of the aisle has decided to not follow federal regulations, and that's why we're losing funding and it's going to go across the board. So, it's not about the program, it's about the actions that our Chief Executive Officer and the

other side of the aisle has taken over the last couple of years. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Hampden, Representative Haggan.

Representative **HAGGAN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This program; I have to rise in opposition. This particular program is successful, but it's one that lost its funding and didn't make the appeal, so, I'm certain that they know why they lost the funding, so, I really believe that it's up to them to make the changes necessary to get the funding restored.

I just have to reiterate the words that this is not a precedent that we should be setting for any State Legislature. Thank you.
