

1 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:**

2 **Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §20005, sub-§§19 and 20**, as amended by PL 2005, c. 674, §1,
3 are further amended to read:

4 **19. Fiscal and program accountability.** Enhance its current efforts to ensure fiscal
5 and program accountability for the services it purchases and provides; and

6 **20. Review policies.** Review the full range of public policies and strategies existing
7 in State Government to identify changes that would strengthen its response, identify
8 policies that might discourage excessive consumption of alcohol and other drugs and
9 generate new funding for alcohol and other drug services; and.

7 administrative unit in which the student resides, as calculated pursuant to section
8 15676, based on the student's grade level and adjusted as appropriate for
9 ~~economic disadvantage~~ economically disadvantaged students and ~~limited~~ English
10 ~~proficiency~~ learners pursuant to section 15675, subsections 1 and 2. Debt service
11 and capital outlays may not be included in the calculation of these per-pupil

18 be forwarded to each public charter school on a quarterly basis, as follows. For
19 each fiscal year, allocations must be made in quarterly payments on September
20 1st, December 1st, March 1st and June 1st. The September and December
21 payments must be based on the identity and number of students enrolled or
22 anticipated to be enrolled in the public charter school at the opening of school for
23 that school year. The number of students may not exceed the maximum
24 enrollment approved in the charter contract for that year unless a waiver is
25 obtained from the authorizer. The March and June payments must be based on
26 the identity and number of students enrolled in the public charter school on
27 February 1st.

28 (3) For transportation expenses, the average per-pupil expense in each school
29 administrative unit of residence must be calculated and an amount equal to a
30 proportion, up to but not more than 100%, of that per-pupil allocation amount
31 must be forwarded to the public charter school attended on the same basis as the
32 per-pupil allocations for operating funds. The percentage of that per-pupil
33 expense must be determined by the authorizer of the public charter school and
34 must be based on the cost of transportation services provided by the public
35 charter school to the student.

37 allocation assigned to the public charter school for gifted and talented students

6 SUMMARY

7 This bill makes the following changes to the education laws.

8 1. It repeals a provision of law relating to a central information system on resources
9 for people with disabilities.

10 2. It repeals a provision of law relating to hazardous chemicals in schools.

11 3. It repeals provisions of law relating to school construction projects approved by
12 the State Board of Education prior to July 1, 1977.

13 4. It replaces the term "limited English proficiency student" with the term "English
14 learner."

15 5. It repeals a provision of law relating to Alcohol Awareness Day.

16 6. It authorizes a school board to provide school nurse services through an agreement
17 with an individual registered professional nurse.

18 7. It repeals provisions of law relating to the Department of Education activities
19 relating to school substance use disorder services and performance-enhancing substances
20 and the Obesity and Chronic Disease Fund.

21 8. It removes the limitation on the total cost of the components of essential programs
22 and services.

23 9. It changes the amount of the adjustment for economically disadvantaged students.

24 10. It removes a requirement that school construction project plans and specifications
25 must be approved by certain state entities.

26 11. It removes the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of
27 General Services from the requirement to perform certain activities relating to school
28 construction projects.

29 12. It includes psychometrically valid English language proficiency screening for
30 potential English learners in the screening that local units may develop.

31 13. It removes a reference to Maine Merchant Marine Day in the powers and duties
32 of the State Board of Education.

33 14. It amends the powers and duties of a cooperative board for a career and technical
34 education region.

- 1 15. It amends the laws governing elementary and secondary tuition students.
- 2 16. It adds a definition of "rural school administrative unit" for purposes of
3 allocating federal funds under the federal Every Student Succeeds Act.
- 4 17. It increases from 90 days to 150 days the period of time in which a charter school
5 authorizer must submit an annual report.
