Pursuant to its home rule authority and for the purpose of protecting the safety, health and welfare of the general public, a municipality may establish by ordinance licensing procedures, standards and appropriate fees to cover the costs of administration, regulation and enforcement of recreational business activities including without limitation the activities of bowling alleys, shooting galleries, pool, bagatelle and billiard rooms, pinball machine arcades, public exhibitions and roller-skating and ice-skating rinks.

PART L

This Part sets aside any profit sharing payments from the wholesale liquor distribution contract that ends June 30, 2014 in excess of budgeted amounts for the final profit sharing payment into an Other Special Revenue Funds account in the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations for the purpose of funding additional liquor enforcement positions.

6 PART M

This Part provides that revenue generated from fees for admission to the Maine State Museum and miscellaneous services be deposited into a dedicated Other Special Revenue Funds account instead of to the General Fund, beginning in fiscal year 2014-15, to support the operations of the Maine State Museum.

11 PART N

This Part reduces the amount of funds that must be transferred from available balances in the Other Special Revenue Funds accounts within the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation to the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund by \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2014-15.

16 PART O

This Part amends Public Law 2013, chapter 368, Part PPPP to increase the amount of the transfer to the General Fund unappropriated surplus from the Revenue Services - Bureau of program, Other Special Revenue Funds account from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2013-14. It also requires the State Controller to lapse to the General Fund unappropriated surplus from the Maine Revenue Services, General Fund account \$250,000 no later than June 30, 2015.

23 PART P

This Part increases the cap from \$2,786,700 to \$5,500,000 in any fiscal year of incentive payment revenue that may be expended for the purpose of covering the costs of making child support collections.

27 PART O

This Part requires the Department of Health and Human Services to modify the timing of MaineCare payments to achieve one-time savings.

30 PART R

This Part requires the judicial branch, the University of Maine System, the Maine Community College System, the Maine Maritime Academy and each quasi-independent state entity each to prepare a list of reports that each is required to submit to the Legislature, a statement of the amount of staff time required to prepare each report and proposed legislation to repeal each reporting requirement 5 years after the effective date of this legislation and submit the information to the joint standing committee of the Legislature with subject matter jurisdiction over that entity by January 9, 2015.

This Part also requires each joint standing committee of the Legislature having subject matter jurisdiction over an entity providing a report to review the information provided and determine the need to either continue or repeal the reporting requirement. Each joint standing committee is authorized to report out legislation to implement its recommendations related to the report to the First Regular Session of the 127th Legislature.

7 PART S

This Part prohibits the Department of Health and Human Services from eliminating reimbursement for the medical add-on in the MaineCare Benefits Manual, Chapter III, Section 21 and Section 29 until the report required by Public Law 2013, chapter 368, Part NN has been submitted by the department to the joint standing committees of the Legislature pursuant to that Part and new rules adopted.

13 PART T

This Part removes from the cap on total itemized deductions medical and dental expenses included in an individual's itemized deductions from federal adjusted gross income for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2014. It also provides allocations to the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of Revenue Services to increase contingent-fee funding for contracted tax collection services to hire 8 additional collectors and improve automated collection functions.

20 PART U

This Part makes changes to laws relating to mandates imposed on municipalities by the State.

It amends the law governing dog licensing and animal control ordinances to clarify that a municipality may impose fees necessary and appropriate to finance the cost of animal control services. It repeals the law requiring the local appointment of an inspector of weights and measures. It also amends the law governing the exempting of certain owners of boilers from the laws governing boilers and pressure vessels generally, including from certain state fees, to exempt also municipalities and schools.

It repeals laws requiring municipalities to administer licensing programs for a range of recreational business activities, such as bowling, billiards and roller skating. Instead, it authorizes the municipal licensing of these activities pursuant to ordinances adopted under municipal home rule authority. It also amends the statute governing the licensing of going-out-of-business sales to establish those licensing requirements only in municipalities that choose to adopt such a licensing ordinance.

It creates the State-local Intergovernmental Working Group for the purpose of establishing a 2-way communication system between the state agencies responsible for the oversight of municipally performed state-mandated activities and the municipalities that perform the mandated activities with the goal of establishing more efficient, effective and cost-effective approaches to the implementation and administration of the mandated activities. The working group is required to meet periodically and report to the joint

standing committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs and state and local government matters in 2016 and 2018.

It authorizes the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over state and local government matters to report out legislation relating to the final report of the mandate working group to the First Regular Session of the 127th Legislature.

6 PART V

This Part increases the General Fund share of the real estate transfer tax by \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2014-15 the result of which is a like decrease in the amount transferred to the Housing Opportunities for Maine Fund.

10 PART W

This Part directs the Department of Health and Human Services to evaluate and improve its MaineCare program integrity processes to achieve additional MaineCare recoveries and savings.

14 PART X

This Part amends the fiscal year 2013-14 year-end distribution of the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund to replace the existing 4th priority transfer, which is no longer necessary, with a new 4th priority transfer of an amount up to \$20,000,000 to a General Fund reserve account established for future funding needs. Funds from the reserve account for future funding needs may be transferred only by the Legislature, and any balance not transferred and remaining in the account at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2015 must be transferred by the State Controller to the Maine Budget Stabilization Fund.

23 PART Y

This Part clarifies the use of funding being provided to the Department of Health and Human Services for the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act.

26 PART Z

This Part requires the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of the Budget to conduct a review of vacant General Fund positions for the purpose of identifying total savings in the Personal Services line category equal to \$599,533 in fiscal year 2014-15. The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services must provide to the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs a report of the positions that must be administratively held vacant during fiscal year 2014-15 to achieve the identified savings and the General Fund accounts affected. On or before August 1, 2014, the State Controller shall lapse the identified savings to the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund from the accounts identified in the report.

This Part also requires the Department of Corrections to increase the term of work release from 12 months to 18 months prior to prisoner release, resulting in an increase in General Fund revenue.
