1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §9326, 3rd ¶, as amended by PL 2017, c. 449, §3, is further
3	amended to read:
4	A person may apply for a permit to burn using the Internet or as otherwise provided in
5	this article. When a person applies for and is issued a permit electronically pursuant to this
6	section, a fee of \$7 must be paid. From the \$7 fee, \$4 must be deposited in the General
7	Fund, \$2 must be transferred to the municipality in which the permit is issued and the
8	remainder of \$1 must be used to cover administrative costs. For a permit issued in the
9	unorganized and deorganized areas, from the \$7 fee, \$6 must be deposited in the General
10	Fund and the remainder of \$1 must be used to cover administrative costs may not be
11	charged.
12	Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §9327, sub-§6, as enacted by PL 2017, c. 449, §4, is amended to
13	read:
14	6. Private party burn permit software to be provided at no charge. A vendor or
15	owner of a private party burn permit software system may not charge a municipality for
16	use of private party burn permit software approved under subsection 1.
17	SUMMARY
18	This bill provides that a person may not be charged a fee to obtain a burn permit online.
19	It allows a vendor or owner of a private party burn permit software system to charge a
20	municipality for use of private party burn permit software.
