Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 2405, subsection 8, members of the Maine Charter School Commission serving on the effective date of this Act continue to serve until the completion of their terms. Their successors are nominated and appointed as provided in Title 20-A, section 2405, subsection 8, paragraph A.'

The amendment makes changes to the provisions in the bill that apply to the appointment of 4 of the 7 members of the Maine Charter School Commission. Instead of having the Governor appoint the 4 commission members nominated by the 3 members of the State Board of Education appointed to the commission by the state board, the amendment provides that the 4 commission members are nominated by those 3 members of the state board appointed to the commission and are subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters and to confirmation by the Senate.
