An Act Regarding the Maine Indian Tribal-State Commission

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- **Sec. 1. 30 MRSA §6212, sub-§3,** as amended by PL 2009, c. 384, Pt. F, §3 and affected by §4, is further amended by amending the first blocked paragraph to read:
- Nine members constitute a quorum of the commission and a decision or action of the commission is not valid unless 7 members vote in favor of the action or decision. <u>During a period when any vacancy exists in appointed members, the required quorum is reduced by the number of vacancies, with no fewer than 7 members required. During such a period, a decision or action of the commission is not valid unless 7 members vote in favor of the action or decision.</u>
- **Sec. 2. Staggered terms.** Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 30, section 6212, subsection 1, beginning with those appointments to the Maine Indian Tribal-State Commission made after the effective date of this Act, the Governor shall appoint 2 members for a term of one year, 2 members for a term of 2 years and 2 members for a term of 3 years.
- **Sec. 3.** Contingent effective date. This Act takes effect 120 days after adjournment of the First Special Session of the 131st Legislature only if, within 90 days after adjournment of the First Special Session of the 131st Legislature, the Secretary of State receives written certification from the Joint Tribal Council of the Passamaquoddy Tribe that the tribe has agreed to the provisions of this Act; from the Governor and the Council of the Penobscot Nation that the nation has agreed to the provisions of this Act; and from the Houlton Band Council of the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians that the band has agreed to the provisions of this Act, copies of which must be submitted by the Secretary of State to the Secretary of the Senate, the Clerk of the House and the Revisor of Statutes.

24 SUMMARY

This bill provides staggered terms for members of the Maine Indian Tribal-State Commission appointed by the Governor. It also reduces the quorum for the commission when there are vacancies.
