An Act To Amend the Laws Regarding the Best Interest of the Child Standard

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- **Sec. 1. 19-A MRSA §1653, sub-§3,** as amended by PL 2009, c. 593, §§2 to 5, is further amended to read:
 - **3. Best interest of child.** The court, in making an award of parental rights and responsibilities with respect to a child, shall apply the standard of the best interest of the child. In making decisions regarding the child's residence and parent-child contact, the court shall consider as primary the safety and well-being of the child. <u>Another priority in the court's decision must be consideration of the value of having both parents involved in the child's life.</u> In applying this standard, the court shall consider the following factors:
- 10 A. The age of the child;

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- B. The relationship of the child with the child's parents and any other persons who may significantly affect the child's welfare;
 - C. The preference of the child, if old enough to express a meaningful preference;
 - D. The duration and adequacy of the child's current living arrangements and the desirability of maintaining continuity;
- 16 E. The stability of any proposed living arrangements for the child;
- F. The motivation of the parties involved and their capacities to give the child love, affection and guidance;
 - G. The child's adjustment to the child's present home, school and community;
- H. The capacity of each parent to allow and encourage frequent and continuing contact between the child and the other parent, including physical access;
 - I. The capacity of each parent to cooperate or to learn to cooperate in child care;
- J. Methods for assisting parental cooperation and resolving disputes and each parent's willingness to use those methods;
 - K. The effect on the child if one parent has sole authority over the child's upbringing;
 - L. The existence of domestic abuse between the parents, in the past or currently, and how that abuse affects:
 - (1) The child emotionally;
 - (2) The safety of the child; and
 - (3) The other factors listed in this subsection, which must be considered in light of the presence of past or current domestic abuse;
- M. The existence of any history of child abuse by a parent;
- N. All other factors having a reasonable bearing on the physical and psychological well-being of the child;
- O. A parent's prior willful misuse of the protection from abuse process in chapter 101 in order to gain tactical advantage in a proceeding involving the determination of parental rights and responsibilities of a minor child. Such willful misuse may only be

- 1 considered if established by clear and convincing evidence, and if it is further found 2 by clear and convincing evidence that in the particular circumstances of the parents and child, that willful misuse tends to show that the acting parent will in the future 3 have a lessened ability and willingness to cooperate and work with the other parent in 4 their shared responsibilities for the child. The court shall articulate findings of fact 5 whenever relying upon this factor as part of its determination of a child's best interest. 6 The voluntary dismissal of a protection from abuse petition may not, taken alone, be 7 treated as evidence of the willful misuse of the protection from abuse process; 8 9 P. If the child is under one year of age, whether the child is being breast-fed; 10 Q. The existence of a parent's conviction for a sex offense or a sexually violent offense as those terms are defined in Title 34-A, section 11203; 11 12 R. If there is a person residing with a parent, whether that person: 13
 - (1) Has been convicted of a crime under Title 17-A, chapter 11 or 12 or a comparable crime in another jurisdiction;
 - (2) Has been adjudicated of a juvenile offense that, if the person had been an adult at the time of the offense, would have been a violation of Title 17-A, chapter 11 or 12; or
 - (3) Has been adjudicated in a proceeding, in which the person was a party, under Title 22, chapter 1071 as having committed a sexual offense; and
 - S. Whether allocation of some or all parental rights and responsibilities would best support the child's safety and well-being.

22 SUMMARY

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This bill amends the best interest of the child standard used by courts in making decisions regarding parental rights and responsibilities with respect to a child by requiring the court to consider the value of having both parents involved in the child's life.
