36	STANDARD SEWER DISTRICT ENABLING ACT

1	SUBCHAPTER 1
2	GENERAL PROVISIONS
3	<u>§1031. Short title</u>
4	This chapter may be known and cited as "the Standard Sewer District Enabling Act."
5	<u>§1032. Definitions</u>
6 7	As used in this chapter, unless the context indicates otherwise, the following terms have the following meanings.
8 9 10	1. Charter. "Charter" means a private and special law or series of private and special laws that establishes a sewer district and defines its responsibilities and authorities.
11 12	2. Rates. "Rates" means a rate, toll, rent or other lawful charge established by a sewer district pursuant to its charter.
13 14 15 16 17	3. Sewer district. "Sewer district" means a district, including a multipurpose district and standard district, created by a private and special law of the State whose purposes include collection, interception and treatment of sewerage. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter or other applicable law, "sewer district" does not include a district whose sewerage activities are confined to interception and treatment.
18 19	4. Standard district. "Standard district" means a sewer district that is formed and chartered by a private and special law in conformance with this chapter.
20	<u>§1033. Scope and application</u>
21	The provisions of this chapter apply as follows.
22 23 24 25	1. Applicable to all sewer districts. Except as otherwise provided in the statutory provisions listed in this subsection or in subsection 6, the following provisions are incorporated into the private and special laws governing a sewer district, and any part of a sewer district charter not in conformity with the following provisions is void.

8 9 10	3. Standard provisions. Except as provided in subsections 1 and 2 or other express provisions of this chapter, the provisions of this chapter do not apply to a sewer district unless the charter of that district incorporates those provisions.
11 12 13	<u>4. Mandatory provisions.</u> Provisions governing the following aspects of a standard district are not included in this chapter and must be otherwise specified in a standard district charter:
14	A. The corporate name of the standard district;
15	B. The territorial limits of the standard district;
16 17	C. The number of trustees of the standard district, which in accordance with section 1036 may not be less than 3;
18 19	D. The appointing authority responsible for appointing or the method of electing the first board of trustees;
20 21	E. The terms of the trustees who are elected or appointed subsequent to the first board. Terms of the first board are determined pursuant to section 1036, subsection 4;
22	F. Whether the trustees, subsequent to the first board, are appointed or elected; and
23	G. The procedures for the local referendum on the creation of the standard district.
24 25	5. Optional provisions. A standard district charter may include provisions relating to the following:
26	A. Special qualifications of trustees:
27 28 29 30	B. Election of trustees by other than at-large elections as provided in section 1036, subsection 1. Any provision for election of trustees by other than at-large elections must establish voting districts in conformance with the judicial principle of one person, one vote;
31 32	C. Additional purposes and powers of the standard district, such as authority to buy out an existing sewer company or to provide water or other utility services;
33 34	D. Areas outside the standard district's territory in which the standard district is authorized to provide sewer services;
35 36	E. Areas outside the standard district's territory in which the standard district is authorized to locate facilities;
37	F. Notwithstanding section 1053, a specific debt limit;

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 G. Towns with which the standard district is authorized to contract to provide sewer

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 service; and
- 3 <u>H. Any other provisions or duties necessary to accomplish the legislative purposes</u>
 4 <u>for creating the standard district.</u>
- 6. Limited sewer districts; exception. Except as otherwise provided in this
 subsection or other applicable law, a sewer district whose sewerage collection activities
 are limited to collection performed pursuant to a contract with one or more municipalities
 is exempt from the requirements of this chapter. The sewerage collection activities may
 include the ownership, maintenance or operation of the collection facilities but not the
 fixing of rate schedules for their use. If the sewer district owns the collection facilities
 used under the contract, the sewer district is subject to the requirements of section 1042.
- **7. Guidelines for modified charters.** As determined appropriate by the Legislature,
 a standard district charter may include provisions that differ from the provisions in this
 <u>chapter.</u>

15 §1034. Exemption from taxation

A standard district is a public municipal corporation within the meaning of Title 36,
 section 651 and the property of the district is exempt from taxation to the extent provided
 in that section.

19 §1035. Legislative amendment of charters

Prior to acting on a proposed sewer district charter amendment, the joint standing
 committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over energy and utility matters shall
 obtain written comments from the municipalities that lie in whole or in part within the
 sewer district.

SUBCHAPTER 2

GOVERNANCE

26 **§1036. Trustees**

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27 All of the affairs of a standard district must be managed by a board of trustees whose 28 members must be residents of the standard district. The number of trustees must be 29 specified in the standard district's charter and may not be less than 3. After selection of 30 the first board, each trustee is nominated and elected or appointed as provided in the 31 charter creating the standard district and in accordance with subsection 1 or 2, as 32 applicable. If the charter does not indicate whether trustees are appointed or elected, after 33 the selection of the first board the trustees must be elected in accordance with subsection 34 1.

1. Nominations and elections; vacancies. Nominations and elections of trustees must be conducted in accordance with the laws relating to municipal elections in Title 37 <u>30-A, chapter 121.</u>

1 When the term of office of a trustee expires, the trustee's successor is elected at large by a 2 plurality vote of the voters of the standard district. For the purpose of election, a special 3 election must be called and held on the date established by the trustees. The election 4 must be called by the trustees of the standard district in the same manner as town 5 meetings are called and, for this purpose, the trustees are vested with the powers of 6 municipal officers. A vacancy is filled in the same manner for the unexpired term by a 7 special election called by the trustees of the standard district. 8 The trustees shall appoint a registrar of voters for the standard district, who may also be 9 the registrar of voters for any town within the standard district, and fix the registrar's 10 salary. It is the registrar's duty to make and keep a complete list of all the registered voters resident in the standard district. The list prepared by the registrar governs the 11 12 eligibility of a voter. Voters who are resident outside the territorial limits of the standard 13 district, as defined in its charter, are not eligible voters and the registrar of voters shall 14 exclude those voters from the registrar's lists. All warrants issued for elections by the 15 trustees must show that only the voters resident within the territorial limits of the standard 16 district are entitled to vote. 17 **2.** Appointments. If the charter creating a standard district specifies that the trustees 18 are appointed, the appointments must be made as provided in the charter. 19 3. Eligibility requirements. When a trustee ceases to be a resident of a standard 20 district, the trustee shall vacate the office of trustee and the vacancy is filled as provided 21 in subsections 1 or 2, as applicable. All trustees are eligible for reelection or reappointment, but a person who is a municipal officer, as defined in Title 30-A, section 22 23 2001, subsection 10, of any town located, in whole or in part, within the standard district 24 is not eligible for appointment, nomination or election as a trustee of that standard 25 district. 26 4. First board. The first board is appointed or elected as provided in the charter 27 creating the standard district. - 8. Trustees retirement; applicable to all sewer districts. A person who has not
 been a trustee of a sewer district prior to January 1, 1987, or who is not a full-time
 employee, is not eligible to become member of the Maine Public Employees Retirement
 System as a result of the person's selection as a trustee.
- 10 This subsection is deemed to be incorporated into the private and special laws governing 11 sewer district, and any part of a sewer district charter not in conformity with this 12 subsection is void, unless the sewer district's charter expressly references this subsection 13 or former section 1252, subsection 6 and specifically provides that this subsection or 14 former section 1252, subsection 6 does not apply.
- 15 9. Expenses. The trustees of a standard district may obtain an office and incur
 16 necessary expenses.
- 17 §1037. Coordination with municipal planning; applicable to all sewer districts
- 18 The following provisions facilitate coordination of municipal planning and sewer
 19 extension planning.
- 20 1. Growth management. The trustees of a sewer district shall cooperate with
 21 municipal officials in the development of municipal growth management and other land
 22 use plans and ordinances.
- 23 2. Development that affects the district. Municipal officers shall cooperate with
 24 the trustees of a sewer district during the consideration of development applications that
 25 may affect the operations of the sewer district.
- 26This section is deemed to be incorporated into the private and special laws governing27a sewer district, and any part of a sewer district charter not in conformity with this section28is void, unless the sewer district's charter expressly references this section or former29section 1252, subsection 9 and specifically provides that this section or former section301252, subsection 9 does not apply.
- 31 §1038. Reorganization as sanitary districts
- A sewer district existing on January 1, 2013 may, but is not required to, reorganize as
 a sanitary district under the Maine Sanitary District Enabling Act by referendum in
 accordance with section 1101, subsection 1-A. The referendum may be initiated by the
 voters or by a majority of the trustees.
- 36 SUBCHAPTER 3
- 37 **<u>POWERS</u>**

1 §1039. Powers

Except as otherwise provided by law, for the purposes of its incorporation, a standard
 district may locate, construct and maintain pipes, drains, sewers, conduits, treatment
 plants, pumping stations and other necessary structures and equipment for the collection,
 interception and treatment of sewerage, commercial and industrial waste and storm and
 surface water for the health, welfare, comfort and convenience of the inhabitants of the
 standard district.

8 <u>All incidental powers, rights and privileges necessary to accomplish the objectives of</u> 9 <u>this chapter are granted to a standard district .</u>

10 §1040. Right of eminent domain; applicable to all sewer districts

11 The authority and procedures for the exercise of eminent domain by a sewer district 12 must conform to sections 1152, 1152-A, 1153 and 1154. In addition, a sewer district may 13 not take by right of eminent domain any of the property or facilities of any other public 14 utility used or acquired for future use by the owner of the public utility in the 15 performance of a public duty, unless expressly authorized by a special Act of the 16 Legislature.

17This section is deemed to be incorporated into the private and special laws governing18a sewer district, and any part of a sewer district charter not in conformity with this section19is void, unless the sewer district's charter expressly references this section or former20section 1252, subsection 2 and specifically provides that this subsection or former section211252, subsection 2 does not apply.

22 §1041. Crossing other public utilities and railroad corporations

If a standard district, in constructing, maintaining or replacing any of its facilities,
 must cross property of another public utility or railroad corporation, the standard district
 must obtain the consent of the other public utility or railroad corporation and undertake
 the work in accordance with conditions established by agreement. If, within 30 days after
 requesting consent, the standard district fails to reach an agreement with the public utility
 or railroad corporation the standard district may petition as follows.

29 **1. Public utility.** In the case of crossing property of a public utility, the standard 30 district may petition the Public Utilities Commission to determine the time, place and 31 manner of crossing. All work done on the property of the public utility must be done 32 under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the public utility or as prescribed by the 33 Public Utilities Commission.

- 34 2. Railroad corporation. In the case of crossing the property of a railroad 35 corporation, the standard district may petition the Department of Transportation to 36 determine the time, place and manner of crossing. All work done on the property of the 37 railroad corporation must be done under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the 38 railroad corporation or as prescribed by the Department of Transportation.
- 39 All work under this section must be done at the expense of the standard district.

1	§1042. Sewer extensions; applicable to all sewer districts
2	Sewer extensions are governed by this section.
3 4 5 6	1. Written assurance from municipality. A sewer district may not construct any sewer extension unless it acquires from the municipal officers or the designee of the municipal officers of any municipality through which the sewer extension will pass written assurance that:
7 8	<u>A. Any development, lot or unit intended to be served by the sewer extension is in</u> conformity with any adopted municipal plans and ordinances regulating land use; and
9 10	B. The sewer extension is consistent with adopted municipal plans and ordinances regulating land use.
11 12 13	If the municipal officers fail to issue a response to a written request from a sewer district for written assurance within 45 calendar days of receiving the request in writing, the written assurance is deemed granted.
14 15 16 17	Not less than 7 days prior to the meeting at which the trustees will take final action on whether to proceed with the extension, the trustees of the sewer district shall publish notice of the proposed extension in a newspaper having a general circulation that includes all municipalities through which the sewer extension will pass.
18 19 20 21 22 23 24	2. Review of municipal decision; applicable to all sewer districts. For an intermunicipal sewer extension, when written assurance is denied by municipal officers pursuant to subsection 1, an aggrieved party may appeal, within 15 days of the decision, to the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry for a review of the municipal officers' decision. Notwithstanding Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 4, the following procedures apply to the review by the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry.
25 26 27 28	A. The Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry may request any additional information from the sewer district, the municipality or the department. All information requested must be submitted within 30 days of the request, unless an extension is granted by the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry.
29 30 31 32 33 34	B. Within a reasonable time, the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry shall hold a hearing. The Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry shall give at least 7 days' written notice of the hearing to the sewer district, the municipality and the party that requested the hearing. The hearing is informal and the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry may receive any information it considers necessary.
35 36 37 38 39	C. Within 15 days of the hearing and within 60 days of the request for review, the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry shall make a decision that must include findings of fact on whether the sewer extension proposal is inconsistent with adopted municipal plans and ordinances regulating land use. The decision of the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry constitutes final agency action.
40 41	D. Notwithstanding section 1, if the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry determines that the sewer extension proposal is not inconsistent with

1adopted municipal plans and ordinances regulating land use, the Department of2Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry shall issue written assurance that the proposal3is consistent with adopted municipal plans and ordinances regulating land use and the4sewer district may construct the sewer extension.

This section is deemed to be incorporated into the private and special laws governing a sewer district, and any part of a sewer district charter not in conformity with this section is void, unless the sewer district's charter expressly references this section or former section 1252, subsection 7 and specifically provides that this subsection or former section 1252, subsection 7 does not apply.

10 §1043. Conditions for carrying out work

11 When a standard district enters, digs up or excavates any public way or other land to 12 lay or maintain its sewers, drains or pipes, constructing manholes or catch basins or other 13 appurtenances or for any other purpose, the work must be done expeditiously. On 14 completion of the work the standard district shall restore the public way or land to its 15 condition prior to such work or to a condition equally good. If the work is being 16 undertaken in a municipality and could potentially endanger travel on a public way, the 17 municipal officers of the municipality in which the work is being done may order a 18 temporary closing of the public way and of any intersecting way. Upon request of the 19 standard district, the public way must remain closed to public travel until the municipal 20 officers of the unit of local government determines the public way is restored to a 21 condition safe for traffic. If the work is being undertaken in an unorganized territory and 22 could potentially endanger travel on a public way, the commissioners of the county where 23 the public way is located may order a temporary closing of the public way and of any 24 intersecting way. Upon request of the standard district, the public way must remain 25 closed to public travel until the county commissioners determine the public way is 26 restored to a condition safe for traffic.

27 **§1044.** Contracts

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A standard district, through its trustees, in order to carry out the purposes of its
 incorporation, may contract with a person, standard district, utility or corporation or with
 a municipality, the State or other governmental entity.

31 §1045. Lease of property; applicable to all sewer districts

A sewer district may enter into a lease and leaseback transaction with respect to some
 or all of its real or personal property, other than land, and may take all other necessary
 action, including, but not limited to, the granting of mortgages and liens, to effectuate the
 transaction. For purposes of this section, "lease" includes a lease of any length, including
 leases that may be defined as sales for income tax purposes.

1 §1046. Enforcement

2 <u>Sewer districts have enforcement powers as specified in this section.</u>

1. Violation of standards by an industrial user; applicable to all sewer districts.
 A sewer district may seek in a civil action injunctive relief from an industrial user that
 violates a pretreatment standard or requirement, administered by the sewer district. The
 sewer district may seek a civil penalty of up to \$1,000 per day for each violation by an
 industrial user of a pretreatment standard or requirement.

8 This subsection is deemed to be incorporated into the private and special laws governing 9 a sewer district, and any part of a sewer district charter not in conformity with this 10 subsection is void, unless the sewer district's charter expressly references this subsection 11 or former section 1252, subsection 8 and specifically provides that this subsection or 12 former section 1252, subsection 8 does not apply.

13 2. Injury to property of standard districts. A person may not place, discharge or
 14 leave any offensive or injurious matter or material on or in the conduits, catch basins or
 15 receptacles of a standard district formed under this chapter contrary to its regulations or
 16 knowingly injure any conduit, pipe, reservoir, flush tank, catch basin, manhole, outlet,
 17 engine, pump or other property held, owned or used by the standard district.

A person who violates this subsection is liable to pay twice the amount of the damages to
 the standard district to be recovered in any proper action and is subject to a civil penalty
 not to exceed \$2,500 for each violation, payable to the standard district. The civil penalty
 is recoverable in a civil action.

22 **3. Required connection.** Except as provided in subsection 4, upon receiving a 23 request from a standard district to connect a building located in the territory of the 24 standard district that is accessible to a sewer or drain of the standard district and that is 25 intended for human habitation or occupancy or that has facilities for discharge or disposal 26 of waste water or commercial or industrial waste, the owner of that building shall arrange 27 to have the building connected through a sanitary sewer or drainage system to the 28 standard district's accessible sewer or drain in the most direct manner possible. If 29 feasible, each building requiring connection must have its own separate connection. The 30 connection must be completed within 90 days of the receipt by the owner of the request, 31 or within any extended period requested by the owner and agreed to by the trustees. For 32 purposes of this subsection, "owner" includes the owners of record or any person against 33 whom property taxes on the building are assessed.

A person who receives a notice in accordance with this subsection to connect to a building and fails to connect to the building in accordance with this subsection is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$2,500, payable to the standard district. This penalty is recoverable in a civil action.

38 4. Connections not required; applicable to all sewer districts. An existing 39 building that is already served by a private sewer system is not required to connect with a 40 sewer or drain of a sewer district as long as the private sewer or drainage system 41 functions in a satisfactory and sanitary manner and does not violate applicable law or 42 ordinance applicable to the connection with a sewer or drain or a sewer district or any

Trustees may reduce the impact fee or connection fee, as those terms are defined 4 in Title 30-A, section 5061, for sewer service to newly constructed affordable housing in accordance with Title 30-A, chapter 202-A. 5 6 This paragraph is deemed to be incorporated into the private and special laws 7 governing a sewer district, and any part of a sewer district charter not in conformity 8 with this paragraph is void, unless the sewer district's charter expressly references this 9 paragraph or former section 1252, subsection 12 and specifically provides that this 10 paragraph or former section 1252, subsection 12 does not apply. 11 2. Multidistrict rates. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a standard 12 district that shares supplies or contracts for services with another standard district shall 13 establish rates mutually agreeable to the trustees of each participating standard district. 14 3. Readiness to serve. A standard district's rates may include readiness to serve 15 rates charged against owners of real estate abutting or accessible but not connected to 16 sewers or drains of the standard district, whether or not the real estate is improved. 17 4. Interest on late payments. A standard district may charge and collect interest on 18 delinquent accounts at a rate not to exceed the highest lawful rate set by the Treasurer of 19 State for municipal taxes. 20 5. Adoption of rate schedule. Prior to the adoption of a new rate schedule, the 21 trustees shall hold a public hearing regarding the proposed rate schedule. The trustees 22 shall publish the proposed rates and notice of the hearing not less than once in a 23 newspaper having a general circulation in the district not less than 7 days prior to the 24 hearing. The standard district shall mail to each ratepayer a notice of the public hearing 25 and the proposed rate at least 14 days prior to the hearing. 26 This subsection is deemed to be incorporated into the private and special laws governing 27 a sewer district, and any part of a sewer district charter not in conformity with this 28 subsection is void, unless the sewer district's charter expressly references this subsection 29 or former section 1252, subsection 1 and specifically provides that this subsection or 30 former section 1252, subsection 1 does not apply. 31 **6.** Revenue from rates. Rates established by the trustees in accordance with this 32 chapter must be fixed and adjusted so as to produce in aggregate revenue at least 33 sufficient, together with any other revenues, to: 34 A. Pay the current expenses of operating and maintaining the sewerage, drainage and 35 treatment system of the standard district; 36 B. Pay the principle of, premium, if any, and interest on all bonds and notes issued 37 by the standard district under this chapter as they become due and payable; 38 C. Create and maintain reserves as may be required by any trust agreement or 39 resolution securing bonds and notes;

Rates in an unorganized territory. If a standard district encompasses 7 unorganized territory, rates applicable to real estate in that unorganized territory must be 8 charged against the person or entity in possession of the real estate. 9 8. Civil action for unpaid rates. If rates under this section are not paid, and a 10 standard district does not collect unpaid rates as a qualified sewer district under section 11 1050, then the standard district may maintain a civil action against the person who has not 12 paid rates for the amount of the unpaid rates plus 10% interest. 13 §1049. Waiver of sewer district lien foreclosure 14 A sewer district, including but not limited to a qualified sewer district subject to section 1050, may use the following provisions to waive a lien foreclosure. 15 16 1. Waiver. The treasurer of a sewer district, including a qualified sewer district, 17 when authorized by the trustees of the sewer district, may waive the foreclosure of a 18 sewer district lien mortgage created pursuant to the sewer district's charter by recording in 19 the registry of deeds a waiver of foreclosure before the period for the right of redemption 20 from the lien mortgage has expired. Qualified sewer districts; collection of unpaid rates 33 The provisions of this section apply only to a qualified sewer district. 1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the 34 35 following terms have the following meanings. 36 A. "Eligible sewer district" means a sewer district whose charter does not establish, 37 or authorize the district to establish, a lien on real estate served by the district.

1 2 3	B. "Qualified sewer district" means an eligible sewer district that has satisfied the requirements of subsection 4; or a standard district that includes this section in its charter.

Paying any necessary expenses and liabilities incurred under this chapter, including organizational and other necessary expenses and liabilities, whether incurred by the standard district or any municipality within the standard district or any person residing in unorganized territory encompassed by the standard district. The standard district may reimburse any municipality within the standard district or any person residing in unorganized territory encompassed by the standard district or any person residing in unorganized territory encompassed by the standard district for any person residing in unorganized territory encompassed by the standard district for any expenses incurred or paid by the municipality or person;

Paying costs directly or indirectly associated with acquiring properties, paying damages, laying sewers, drains and conduits, constructing, maintaining and operating sewage and treatment plants or systems and making renewals, additions, extensions and improvements to the same and to cover interest payments during the period of construction and for any period after construction as the trustees may determine;
35 36 37 38	 D. Providing reserves for debt service, repairs and replacements or other capital or current expenses as may be required by a trust agreement or resolution securing bonds; and E. Any combination of these purposes.

1 Bonds may be issued under this section as general obligations of the standard district or 2 as special obligations payable solely from particular funds. The principal of, premium, if 3 any, and interest on all bonds are payable solely from the funds provided for that purpose 4 from revenues. For purposes of this section, "revenues" means and includes the proceeds 5 of bonds, all revenues, rates, fees, entrance charges, assessments, rents and other receipts 6 derived by the standard district from the operation of its sewer system and other 7 properties, including, but not limited to, investment earnings and the proceeds of 8 insurance, condemnation, sale or other disposition of properties. All bonds issued by a 9 standard district under this section are legal obligations of the standard district, and a 10 standard district whose charter includes this section is declared to be a quasi-municipal 11 corporation within the meaning of Title 30-A, section 5701. Bonds may be issued under 12 this section without obtaining the consent of any commission, board, bureau or agency of 13 the State or of any municipality encompassed by the district and without any other 14 proceedings or the happening of other conditions other than those proceedings or 15 conditions that are specifically required by the standard district's charter or other applicable law. Bonds issued under this section do not constitute a debt or liability of the 16 17 State or of any municipality encompassed by the standard district or a pledge of the faith 18 and credit of the State or any such municipality, but the bonds are payable solely from the 19 funds provided for that purpose, and a statement to that effect must be recited on the face 20 of the bonds.

21 2. Notes. A standard district may provide by resolution of its trustees, without 22 district vote, for the issuance from time to time of notes in anticipation of bonds 23 authorized under this section and of notes in anticipation of the revenues to be collected 24 or received in any year or in anticipation of the receipt of federal or state grants or other 25 aid. The issue of these notes is governed by the applicable provisions of this chapter 26 relating to the issue of bonds, except that notes in anticipation of revenue must mature no 27 later than one year from their respective dates and notes issued in anticipation of federal 28 or state grants or other aid and renewals of grants or aids must mature no later than the 29 expected date of receipt of those grants or aid. Notes in anticipation of revenue issued to 30 mature less than one year from their dates may be renewed from time to time by the issue 31 of other notes, except that the period from the date of an original note to the maturity of 32 any note issued to renew or pay the original note or the interest on a note may not exceed 33 one year.

A standard district is authorized and empowered to enter into agreements with the State or the United States, or any agency of either, or any municipality, corporation, commission or board authorized to grant or loan money to or otherwise assist in the financing of projects of the type that that district is authorized to carry out and to accept grants and borrow money from any government, agency, municipality, corporation, commission or board as may be necessary or desirable to accomplish the purposes of the standard district.

41 3. Maturity; interest; form; temporary bonds. The bonds issued under this 42 section must be dated, must mature at such time or times not exceeding 40 years from 43 their date or dates and must bear interest at such rate or rates as may be determined by the 44 trustees, and may be made redeemable before maturity, at the option of the standard 45 district, at the price or prices and under the terms and conditions as fixed by the trustees 46 prior to the issuance of the bonds. The trustees shall determine the form of the bonds,

1 including any interest coupons to be attached to the bonds, and the manner of execution 2 of the bonds and shall fix the denomination or denominations of the bonds and the place 3 or places of payment of principal and interest, which may be at any bank or trust 4 company inside or outside the State. Bonds must be executed in the name of the standard 5 district by the manual or facsimile signature of the officer or officers as authorized in the 6 resolution to execute the bonds, but at least one signature on each bond must be a manual 7 signature. Coupons, if any, attached to the bonds must be executed with the facsimile 8 signature of the officer or officers of the standard district designated in the resolution. In 9 case any officer, whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature appears on any bonds 10 or coupons, ceases to be such officer before the delivery of the bonds, the signature or its 11 facsimile is valid and sufficient for all purposes as if the officer had remained in office 12 until the delivery.

13 Notwithstanding any of the other provisions of this chapter or any recitals in any bonds 14 issued under this section, all bonds issued under this section are negotiable instruments 15 under the laws of this State. The bonds may be issued in coupon or registered form, or 16 both, as the trustees may determine, and provision may be made for the registration of 17 any coupon bonds as to principal alone and as to both principal and interest and for the 18 reconversion into coupon bonds of any bonds registered as to both principal and interest. 19 The trustees may sell bonds, either at public or private sale and for the price as they 20 determine to be for the best interests of the standard district. The proceeds of the bonds 21 of each issue must be used solely for the purpose for which those bonds have been 22 authorized and must be disbursed in the manner and under the restrictions, if any, that the 23 trustees provide, in the resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds or in the trust 24 agreement securing the bonds. The resolution providing for the issuance of bonds and 25 any trust agreement securing the bonds may contain limitations upon the issuance of 26 additional bonds as the trustees determine proper, and these additional bonds must be 27 issued under such restrictions and limitations prescribed by that resolution or trust 28 agreement. Prior to the preparation of definitive bonds, the trustees may, under the same 29 restrictions, issue interim receipts or temporary bonds, with or without coupons, 30 exchangeable for definitive bonds when those bonds are executed and are available for 31 delivery. The trustees may provide for the replacement of any bond that is mutilated, 32 destroyed or lost.

4. Pledges and covenants; trust agreement. In the discretion of the trustees of a
 standard district, each or any issue of bonds may be secured by a trust agreement by and
 between the standard district and a corporate trustee, which may be any trust company
 located within or outside the State.

37 A. The resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds or the trust agreement may 38 pledge or assign, in whole or in part, the revenues and other money held or to be 39 received by the standard district and any accounts and contract or other rights to 40 receive the revenues of the money, whether then existing or coming into existence 41 and whether then held or acquired by the standard district, and the proceeds of the 42 revenues or the money, but may not convey or mortgage the sewer system or any 43 other properties of the standard district. The resolution may also contain provisions 44 for protecting and enforcing the rights and remedies of the bondholders that are 45 reasonable and proper and not in violation of law, including, but not limited to, 46 covenants setting forth the duties of the standard district and the trustees in relation to

1 the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, 2 operation and insurance of its sewer system or any of its other properties, the fixing 3 and revising of rates, fees and charges, the application of the proceeds of bonds, the 4 custody, safeguarding and application of revenues, defining defaults and providing 5 for remedies in the event of defaults that may include the acceleration of maturities, the establishment of reserves and the making and amending of contracts. The 6 7 resolution or trust agreement may set forth the rights and remedies of the bondholders 8 and of the trustee, if any, and may restrict the individual right of action by 9 bondholders as is customary in trust agreements or trust indentures securing bonds or 10 debentures of corporations. In addition, the resolution or trust agreement may contain 11 such other provisions as the trustees determine reasonable and proper for the security 12 of the bondholders. All expenses incurred in carrying out the resolution or trust 13 agreement may be treated as a part of the cost of operation. The pledge by any 14 resolution or trust agreement is valid and binding and is deemed continuously perfected for the purposes of the Uniform Commercial Code from the time when the 15 16 pledge is made. All revenues, money, rights and proceeds so pledged and received 17 by the standard district are immediately subject to the lien of the pledge without any 18 physical delivery or segregation of the revenues and proceeds or further action under 19 the Uniform Commercial Code or otherwise, and the lien of the pledge is valid and 20 binding as against all parties having claims of any kind in tort, contract or otherwise 21 against the standard district irrespective of whether those parties have notice of the 22 lien. 23 B. The resolution authorizing the issuance of bonds under this section or any trust agreement securing those bonds may provide that all or a sufficient amount of

24 25 revenues, after providing for the payment of the cost of repair, maintenance and 26 operation and reserves as may be provided in the resolution or trust agreement, must 27 be set aside at regular intervals as provided in the resolution or trust agreement and 28 deposited in a fund for the payment of the interest on and the principal of bonds 29 issued under this section as the interest and principle become due and for the 30 redemption price or purchase price of bonds retired by call or purchase. The use and 31 disposition of money of the fund are subject to any regulations provided in the 32 resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds or in the trust agreement securing the 33 bonds and, except as may otherwise be provided in the resolution or trust agreement, 34 the fund must be a fund for the benefit of all bonds without distinction or priority of 35 one over another.

36 5. Trust funds. Notwithstanding any other law, all funds received pursuant to the 37 authority of a standard district's charter are trust funds, to be held and applied solely as 38 provided in the charter of the standard district. The resolution authorizing the issuance of 39 bonds or the trust agreement securing the bonds must provide that any officer to whom, 40 or bank, trust company or other fiscal agent to which, the funds are paid must act as 41 trustee of the funds and must hold and apply the funds for the purposes of the standard 42 district in accordance with its charter, subject to any regulations as may be provided in 43 the resolution or trust agreement or as may be required by the charter of the standard 44 district.

45 **6. Remedies.** A holder of bonds issued under this section or of any of the coupons 46 appertaining to the bonds, and the trustee under a trust agreement, except to the extent the

1 rights given may be restricted by the resolution authorizing the issuance of those bonds or 2 trust agreement, may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other 3 proceeding, including proceedings for the appointment of a receiver to take possession 4 and control of the properties of the standard district, protect and enforce all rights under 5 the laws of the State, including this section, or under the resolution or trust agreement. A 6 holder of bonds issued under this section or of any of the coupons appertaining to the 7 bonds and the trustee under a trust agreement may enforce and compel the performance 8 of all duties required by the standard district charter or by the resolution or trust 9 agreement to be performed by the standard district or by any officer of the standard 10 district, including the fixing, charging and collecting of rates, fees and charges for the use 11 of or for the services and facilities furnished by the standard district.

12 7. **Refunding bonds.** A standard district by resolution of its board of trustees, 13 without district vote, may issue refunding bonds for the purpose of paying any of its 14 bonds at maturity or upon acceleration or redemption. The refunding bonds may be 15 issued at a time prior to the maturity or redemption of the refunded bonds that the board 16 of trustees determines to be in the public interest. The refunding bonds may be issued in 17 sufficient amounts to pay or provide the principal of the bonds being refunded, together 18 with any redemption premium, any interest accrued or to accrue to the date of payment of 19 the bonds, the expenses of issue of the refunding bonds, the expenses of redeeming the 20 bonds being refunded and any reserves for debt service or other capital or current 21 expenses from the proceeds of the refunding bonds that may be required by a trust 22 agreement or resolution securing bonds. The issue of refunding bonds, the maturities and 23 other details of those bonds, the security for those bonds, the rights of the holders and the 24 rights, duties and obligations of the standard district in respect to those bonds are 25 governed by the applicable provisions of the standard district charter relating to the issue of bonds other than refunding bonds. 26

8. Tax exemption. All bonds, notes or other evidences of indebtedness issued under
 the standard district's charter and the transfer of and the income from those bonds, notes
 or other evidences of indebtedness, including any profit made on the sale, are exempt
 from taxation in the State.

31 9. Bonds declared legal investments. Bonds and notes issued by a standard district 32 under this section are securities in which all public officers and public bodies of the State 33 and its political subdivisions, all insurance companies and associations and other persons 34 carrying on an insurance business, trust companies, banks, bankers, banking associations, 35 savings banks and savings associations, including savings and loan associations, credit 36 unions, building and loan associations, investment companies, executors, administrators, 37 trustees and other fiduciaries, pension, profit-sharing, retirement funds and other persons carrying on a banking business, and all other persons authorized to invest in bonds or 38 39 other obligations of the State may properly and legally invest funds, including capital in 40 their control or belonging to them. The bonds and notes are securities that may properly 41 and legally be deposited with and received by any state, municipal or public officer, or any agency or political subdivision of the State, for any purpose for which the deposit of 42 43 bonds or other obligations of the State is authorized by law.

1 §1053. Debt limit; approval by voters of a standard district

2 **1.** Debt limit proposed. Prior to issuing on behalf of a standard district any bond, 3 note or other evidence of indebtedness payable within a period of more than 12 months 4 after the date of issuance, the trustees shall propose a debt limit for the standard district 5 that the trustees must submit for approval in a district wide referendum. The referendum 6 must be called, advertised and conducted according to the law relating to municipal 7 elections in Title 30-A, chapter 121, except the standard district's registrar of voters is not 8 required to prepare or the clerk to post a new list of voters. The referendum may be held 9 outside the territory of the standard district if the usual voting place for persons located in 10 the standard district is located outside the territory of the standard district. For the 11 purpose of registering voters, the registrar of voters must be in session on the regular 12 workday preceding the election. The question presented must be in substantially the 13 following form:

- 14"Do you favor establishing the debt limit of the (insert name of standard district) at15(insert amount)?"
- 16The voters shall indicate by a cross or check mark placed against the word "Yes" or "No"17their opinion on the question.

2. Results declared. The results of the referendum held under subsection 1 must be
 declared by the trustees and entered upon the standard district's records. Due certificate
 of the results must be filed by the clerk with the Secretary of State.

3. Effective date. A debt limit proposal becomes effective upon its acceptance by a majority of the legal voters within the standard district voting at the referendum. Failure of approval by the majority of voters voting at the referendum does not prevent subsequent referenda from being held for the same purpose. The costs of referenda are borne by the standard district.

4. Total debt. Trustees may not issue any bond, note or other evidence of
 indebtedness payable within a period of more than 12 months after the date of issuance
 unless the total amount of the debt issued by the trustees is no more than the amount
 approved by referendum under this section.

30 §1054. Authority to increase debt limits; sewer districts

31 **1. Debt limit.** Notwithstanding any provision of a sewer district's charter to the 32 contrary, a sewer district may increase its debt limit by referendum in accordance with 33 this section. A sewer district is not required to use the procedure provided by this section 34 and may seek to increase its debt limit by any other lawful means, including pursuant to 35 any other means described in the sewer district's charter or by seeking legislative 36 amendment to its charter.

37 2. Referendum. If a sewer district chooses to increase its debt limit pursuant to this
 38 section, the governing body of the sewer district shall propose a new debt limit and
 39 submit the proposal for approval at a districtwide referendum. The referendum must be
 40 called, advertised and conducted according to the law relating to municipal elections in
 41 Title 30-A, chapter 121, except the registrar of voters is not required to prepare or the

1 clerk to post a new list of voters. The referendum may be held outside the territory of the 2 sewer district if the usual voting place for persons located within the sewer district is 3 located outside the territory of the sewer district. For the purpose of registering voters, 4 the registrar of voters must be in session on the regular work day preceding the election. The question presented must conform to the following: 5 6 "Do you favor changing the debt limit of the (insert name of sewer district) from (insert current debt limit) to (insert proposed debt limit)?" 7 8 The voters shall indicate by a cross or check mark placed against the word "Yes" or "No" 9 their opinion on the question. 10 The results must be declared by the governing body of the sewer district and entered upon the sewer district's records. Due certificate of results must be filed by the clerk with the 11 12 Secretary of State. 13 **3.** Approval. A debt limit proposal becomes effective upon its acceptance by a 14 majority of the legal voters within the sewer district voting at the referendum. Failure of approval by the majority of legal voters voting at the referendum does not prevent 15 subsequent referenda from being held for the same purpose. The cost of referenda are 16 17 borne by the sewer district. 18 §1055. Mutual funds; sewer districts 19 A sewer district may invest its funds, including sinking funds, reserve funds and trust 20 funds, to the extent that the term of any instrument creating the funds does not prohibit the investment, in shares of an investment company registered under the federal 21 22 Investment Company Act of 1940, whose shares are registered under the United States Securities Act of 1933, only if the investments of the investment company are limited to 23

obligations of the United States or any agency or instrumentality, corporate or otherwise,
 of the United States or repurchase agreements secured by obligations of the United States
 or any agency or instrumentality, corporate or otherwise, of the United States. This
 section is in addition to, and not in limitation of, any power of a sewer district to invest its
 funds.

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SUMMARY

This bill creates a model standard sewer district charter in statute. It includes standard language for the common provisions included in a sewer district charter. It also includes the mandatory requirements of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 38, chapter 12, except the requirement that a new sewer district be formed under the Sanitary District Enabling Act and that a proposed amendment to extend the boundaries of a sewer district be approved by referendum before the amendment is presented to the Legislature.
