18 19 20	1-A. Membership. The Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election Practices, established by Title 5, section 12004-G, subsection 33 and referred to in this chapter as the "commission," consists of 5 members appointed as follows.
21 22 23 24 25 26	A. By December 1, 2001 and as needed after that date, the appointed leader from each political party in the Senate <u>caucus leaders</u> and the appointed leader from each political party in the House of Representatives <u>House caucus leaders</u> jointly shall establish and advertise a 30-day period to allow members of the public and groups and organizations to propose qualified individuals to be nominated for appointment to the commission.

By January 1, 2002 and as needed after that date, the appointed leader from each political party in the Senate <u>caucus leaders</u> and the appointed leader from each political party in the House of Representatives <u>House caucus leaders</u> each shall present a list of 3 qualified individuals to the Governor for appointment of 4 members to the commission. The appointed leadership from each party in both bodies of the Legislature <u>Senate caucus leaders</u> and <u>House caucus leaders</u> jointly shall present a list of 3 qualified individuals to the Governor for appointment of a 5th member to the commission.

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C. By March 15, 2002, the Governor shall appoint the members of the commission selecting one member from each of the lists of nominees presented in accordance with paragraph A. These nominees are subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over legal affairs and confirmation by the Legislature. No more than 2 commission members may be enrolled in the same party.

D. Two initial appointees are appointed for one-year terms, 2 are appointed for 2year terms and one is appointed for a 3-year term, according to a random lot drawing under the supervision of the Secretary of State. Subsequent appointees are appointed to serve 3-year terms. A person may not serve more than 2 consecutive terms, except that if a person is appointed to fill the unexpired portion of a term to fill a vacancy under paragraph F and that portion is less than 2 years, the person may serve 2 consecutive full terms thereafter.

14 E. The commission members shall elect one member to serve as chair for at least a 2-15 year term.

16 F. Upon a vacancy during an unexpired term, the term must be filled as provided in this paragraph for the unexpired portion of the term only. The nominee must be 17 appointed by the Governor from a list of 3 qualified candidates provided by the 18 Senate caucus leader or House caucus leader of the party from the body of the 19 Legislature that suggested the appointee who created the vacancy. If the vacancy 20 during an unexpired term was created by the commission member who was appointed 21 from the list of candidates presented to the Governor by the leaders of each party of 22 each body of the Legislature Senate caucus leaders and House caucus leaders jointly, 23 the nominee must be appointed from a list of 3 qualified candidates provided jointly 24 25 by the leaders of each party of each body of the Legislature Senate caucus leaders and House caucus leaders. If the list of 3 qualified candidates required by this paragraph 26 to be presented to the Governor jointly by the leaders of each party from each body of 27 the Legislature Senate caucus leaders and House caucus leaders is not produced 28 within 60 days after the vacancy is created, then the leaders of each party from both 29 30 bodies of the Legislature each Senate caucus leader and House caucus leader shall present within the subsequent 15 days a separate list of 3 qualified candidates to the 31 Governor, who shall appoint a candidate from these lists within 30 days of receiving 32 the lists. Nominees appointed pursuant to this paragraph are subject to review by the 33 joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over election practices 34 and legislative ethics and to confirmation by the Legislature. 35

36 G. Upon a vacancy created by an expired term, the vacancy must be filled as 37 provided in this paragraph. The nominee must be appointed by the Governor from a list of 3 qualified candidates provided by the Senate caucus leader or House caucus 38 leader of the party from the body of the Legislature that suggested the appointee 39 whose term expired. When a vacancy is created by an expired term of the 40 commission member who was appointed from the list of candidates presented to the 41 Governor by the leaders of each party of each body of the Legislature Senate caucus 42 leaders and House caucus leaders jointly, the nominee must be appointed from a list 43 of 3 qualified candidates provided jointly by the leaders of each party of each body of 44 the Legislature Senate caucus leaders and House caucus leaders. If the list of 3 45 qualified candidates required by this paragraph to be presented to the Governor 46

jointly by the leaders of each party from each body of the Legislature Senate caucus 1 2 leaders and House caucus leaders is not produced within 60 days after the vacancy is 3 created, then the leaders of each party from both bodies of the Legislature each Senate caucus leader and House caucus leader shall present within the subsequent 15 4 days a separate list of 3 qualified candidates to the Governor, who shall appoint a 5 candidate from these lists within 30 days of receiving the lists. Nominees appointed 6 pursuant to this paragraph are subject to review by the joint standing committee of 7 8 the Legislature having jurisdiction over election practices and legislative ethics and to confirmation by the Legislature. 9

H. For the purposes of this subsection, "political party" has the same meaning as
"party" as defined by Title 21-A, section 1, subsection 28 "Senate caucus leader" has
the same meaning as in Title 21-A, section 1053-C, subsection 1, paragraph D and
"House caucus leader" has the same meaning as in Title 21-A, section 1053-C,
subsection 1, paragraph A.'

27 <u>1. Definitions.</u> As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the
 28 <u>following terms have the following meanings.</u>

A. "House caucus leader" means a member of a political party in the House of
 Representatives who has been elected the leader of that political party in the House of
 Representatives. For purposes of this paragraph, if the Speaker of the House of
 Representatives is a member of a political party, the Speaker of the House of
 Representatives is deemed the House caucus leader of that political party.

B. "House unenrolled leader" means a member of the House of Representatives who
is not enrolled in a political party and who has been elected the leader of the members
of the House of Representatives who are not enrolled in a political party. For
purposes of this paragraph, if the Speaker of the House of Representatives is not
enrolled in a political party, the Speaker of the House of Representatives is deemed
the House unenrolled leader.

"Senate unenrolled leader" means a member of the Senate who is not enrolled in a

For purposes of this paragraph, if the President of the Senate is not enrolled in a political party, the President of the Senate is deemed
 the Senate unenrolled leader.

2. Designation of caucus political action committee. Each Senate caucus leader
 and each House caucus leader may designate one caucus political action committee to
 promote the election of nominees of the caucus leader's political party to the body of the
 Legislature of which the caucus leader is a member. The designation must be made in a
 letter to the commission and remains effective until a new designation is made in a letter
 to the commission from the caucus leader of the same political party and same body of
 the Legislature.

3. Designation of unenrolled political action committee. The Senate unenrolled leader and the House unenrolled leader may each designate one unenrolled political action committee to promote the election of unenrolled candidates to the body of the Legislature of which the unenrolled leader is a member. The designation must be made in a letter to the commission and remains effective until a new designation is made in a letter to the commission from the unenrolled leader of the same body of the Legislature.'

23 Amend the bill by inserting after section 4 the following:

Amend the bill in section 5 in subsection 6-F in the blocked paragraph in the 5th line (page 2, line 5 in L.D.) by inserting after the following: "committee," the following: 'an unenrolled political action committee,'

30 Amend the bill by relettering or renumbering any nonconsecutive Part letter or 31 section number to read consecutively.

SUMMARY

33 This amendment, which is a minority report of the committee, clarifies the process for the designation of caucus political action committees by specifying that each Senate 34 caucus leader and each House caucus leader may designate one caucus political action 35 committee to promote the election of nominees of the caucus leader's political party to the 36 body of the Legislature of which that caucus leader is a member. Under the amendment, 37 a caucus leader is a member of a political party in a body of the Legislature who has been 38 39 elected the leader of that political party in that body of the Legislature. If the President of the Senate or the Speaker of the House is a member of a political party, the President of 40 the Senate or Speaker of the House is the caucus leader of that political party in the 41 respective body of the Legislature. 42

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT " " to S.P. 654, L.D. 1902

The amendment also makes technical changes to the law governing the appointment of members of the Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election Practices. Specifically, in the provisions outlining who has the authority to propose individuals for appointment to the commission, the phrases "appointed leader from each political party in the Senate" and "appointed leader from each political party in the House of Representatives" are replaced with the newly defined terms "Senate caucus leader" and "House caucus leader."

The amendment further allows the unenrolled members of the Senate and the 8 unenrolled members of the House of Representatives to elect a leader who may designate 9 an unenrolled political action committee to promote the election of unenrolled candidates 10 to that body of the Legislature. Like a caucus political action committee, an unenrolled 11 12 political action committee may make unlimited donations to a candidate to fund a recount. In addition, although Maine Clean Election Act candidates are generally 13 prohibited from serving as the treasurer, principal officer, primary fund-raiser or primary 14 15 decision maker for a political action committee, the amendment authorizes Maine Clean Election Act candidates to engage in fund-raising or decision making for an unenrolled 16 political action committee to the same extent that Maine Clean Election Act candidates 17 may engage in such activities for a caucus political action committee. 18
