Senator Rafferty, Representative Brennan, and distinguished members of the Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs, my name is Joe Anderson. I am a resident of Portland, a hospital-based pediatrician working in Lewiston, and I serve on the board of the Maine Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics. I am writing today in support of LD 254: An Act to Update the Sex Education and Consent Curriculum.

As pediatricians, we understand the importance of comprehensive sex education. The American Academy of Pediatrics' clinical report titled *Sexuality Education for Children and Adolescents* states the following:

Developmentally appropriate and evidence-based education about human sexuality and sexual reproduction over time provided by pediatricians, schools, other professionals, and parents is important to help children and adolescents make informed, positive, and safe choices about healthy relationships, responsible sexual activity, and their reproductive health. Sexuality education has been shown to help to prevent and reduce the risks of adolescent pregnancy, HIV, and sexually transmitted infections for children and adolescents with and without chronic health conditions and disabilities in the United States.¹

When comprehensive sex education is offered in schools, research has shown numerous desirable outcomes, including^{1,2}:

- A delay in the initiation of sexual intercourse
- Reduced sexual activity
- Reduced number of sexual partners
- Reduced frequency of unprotected sex
- Increased condom & contraceptive use

Comprehensive sex education has benefits beyond risk reduction measures of reducing rates of sexual activity, sexual risk behaviors, sexually transmitted infections, and unintended pregnancy. By covering a broader range of content, comprehensive sex education also helps children and adolescents to learn how to build and maintain healthy and safe relationships, to engage in healthy communication and decision-making around sex, and to understand how to access care to support their sexual and reproductive health.²
