LD 2001: An Act to Establish the African American Studies Advisory Council and Require Funding for African American Studies

The Council has seven mainline Protestant member-denominations and two associate member congregations who represent more than 400 local churches in Maine with over 50,000 parishioners in their care. I am testifying on behalf of the Council in **SUPPORT of LD 2001.**

In the sacred texts in which our seven traditions are rooted, Hebrew and Christian scripture, two of the central values are truth-telling and solidarity with the marginalized and oppressed. LD 2001 would help Maine make progress toward both.

When Maine's students and teachers have a deeper understanding of and appreciation for the history and contributions of Black Americans, we will be better able to build an accepting, more cohesive, and inclusive community for tomorrow. Telling the truth, both about the long history of oppression <u>and</u> the long history of resilience and resistance of Black Americans of African descent is an essential element in a rigorous education program that engenders cultural awareness and respect.
