Testimony of the Cumberland County Food Security Council in Support of LD 2093 - An Act to Address Food Insecurity by Helping Maine Residents Access Locally Produced Food

Members of the Committee on Agriculture, Conservation, and Forestry,

The Cumberland County Food Security Council (CCFSC) supports LD 2093, an essential legislative initiative that addresses food insecurity and promotes resilient food systems in Maine. CCFSC is part of a diverse network of organizations which build nutrition security through local food.
