My name is Olivia Montoya and I am a junior in college. I am submitting this testimony in support of LD 2166 "An Act to Establish a Grant Program to Increase Postsecondary Educational Opportunities for Students with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities or Autism Spectrum Disorder."

Relationships between people with and without I/DD and/or ASD are so enriching for both parties; unfortunately, they are so rare because of barriers constructed needlessly before things like postsecondary education. I hope that this bill can help remove that barrier so that we may all learn from each other and grow stronger as a result.

In my experience, equal access for one person benefits everyone. The privilege of meeting and conversing with individuals with I/DD and/or ASD, including Sami, has widened my understanding of the world and enriched my perspective on what it means to be inclusive and understanding. Sami's friendship with me has taught her about the world and herself, too. These relationships have power and students everywhere deserve to experience them. If one student with I/DD and/or ASD can go to college and make a friend, and they learn something from each other, I will consider this bill a success.

It is my hope that through this testimony, and the testimonies of others, that you will support this bill and it will serve as a stepping stone toward a more equitable and accessible future for all, in education and beyond.
