LD2065 needs work.

Changing the number of people required to request a hearing from 5 to 25 exposes the extreme bias of the State toward the agenda of aquaculture. "Lets make it as easy as we can for aquaculture." The original number wasn't just increased or even doubled, it was multiplied by a factor of 5. I'd love to know who spun the wheel that landed on this number. This idea reeks.
