Amidst this crisis, recovery community centers like PRCC have emerged as beacons of hope, offering peer recovery services, mutual aid meetings, and invaluable social support. These centers, often operating with scant or non-existent public funding, are pivotal in bridging the gaps within Maine's substance use disorder treatment ecosystem.
