Re: Support for LD 2007, An Act to Advance Self-determination for Wabanaki Nations

Sen. Carney, Rep. Moonen and members of the Judiciary Committee, my name is Kale Vonderau and I live in Corinth, Maine. I am writing to testify in support of LD 2007.

After taking some time to reflect on what the passing of the bill would mean to the Wabanaki Nations, it is a no brainer to support the LD 2007 bill that ensures equity and fairness, which is long overdue since the restrictions imposed by the 1980 Maine Indian Claims Settlement Act. Since the MICSA was passed it has severely hindered economic growth for the Wabanaki Nations and creates a barrier for the continuation of maintaining sustainable environmental practices in their lands and the State of Maine as a whole.

Passing LD 2007 would also bring in significant revenue to the state of Maine, as stated in a Harvard Report, "self-government for the tribes would likely mean an additional \$330 million a year in Maine's Gross Domestic Product, more than 2,700 jobs, and \$39 million a year in state and local tax revenue.' Meaning rural Maine and Wabanaki Nations working together and creating an environment for all to thrive in. Support not only provides autonomy of the Wabanaki Nations and upholds their inherent rights as a sovereign nation to grow economically, additionally, it would significantly lower the poverty rates that are severely impacting Wabanaki communities and children, with a range from a low of 40% at the Passamaquoddy Tribe at Motahkomikuk community to a high of 77% for the Mi'kmaq Nation in Aroostook County. Think about these statistics not as numbers but as living, breathing children and their families being affected, in comparison, Maine's childhood poverty rate for the same period is 15%, a gross imbalance.

A heartfelt and sincere thank you to Sen. Carney, Rep. Moonen and members of the Judiciary Committee, for your time and care going into the deliberation of this bill. Remember, supporting the children and families of the Wabanaki people, the environment that makes Maine such a beautiful place to live, and upholding the rights of the Wabanaki Nations is reason enough to pass the bill, but a drastic increase in economic growth for the Wabanaki Nations means growth for the whole state of Maine.
