Testimony in support of LD 2007, An Act to Advance Self-determination for  
Wabanaki Nations

Dear Senator Carney, Representative Moonen, and members of the Judiciary  
Committee,

My name is Molly DellaRoman and I live in Brooklin, ME. I am the co-owner of 5  
Star Nursery and Orchard; a MOFGA certified organic heirloom apple orchard and  
native plant nursery. I am also the chair of Brooklin's Comprehensive Plan  
Committee, serve on Brooklin's Planning Board and am the founder and Chair of the  
Brooklin Food Corps. I am writing to testify in support of LD 2007.

I firmly stand with the Wabanaki people, over 100 bipartisan Maine legislators,  
hundreds of businesses and organizations and thousands of individuals that LD 2007  
is about fairness and equity and that Tribal Sovereignty must be restored to the  
Wabanaki tribes of Maine. In this time of climate change crisis and severe loss of  
biodiversity, including sources of healthy food, we need everyone at the table and we  
need leaders that have been stewarding the land for millennia. The wild, beautiful and  
abundant sea landscapes of Maine are still in existence because of the Wabanaki. As  
someone that owns and farms land in Maine and also works with organizations that  
both protect and make future plans for our land, I recognize every day the importance  
of the relationship that the Wabanaki have forged with this land long before we ever  
came here. I, like many other farmers and folks that practice and teach others to  
harvest food and protect the land, find ways to raise up and support the voices of the  
Wabanaki. But for the last 40 years, the Wabanaki have had to grapple and suffer with  
severe poverty rates and severely stunted economic growth compared to the 570 other  
Federally recognized tribes that have benefitted from over 150 laws that Maine's  
tribes do not have access to. The people of Maine know first-hand that when the  
Wabanaki thrive, we all thrive. From economic growth to the enactment and  
enforcement of conservation and environmental quality controls, we need the  
Wabanaki to have access to all rightfully-owed tools and resources for them to be able  
to thrive first and foremost. It is well past time for this to happen in this State and is a  
great stain until we begin to right this grave injustice.
